CHICAGO BEARS SWAMP GREEN BAY PACKERS, SCORE 21 TO 0

Local Professional Eleven Suffers Worst Defeat In a Number of Years; Buck Hurt

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(CHICAGO) - The Packers bit the dust to the tune of 21 to 0 at the hands of the Chicago Bears before exactly 6,898 paid admissions at Cubs park here Sunday afternoon. The Big Bay Blues did not look very much like a championship team, nearly all the skirmishing was in the Packers' territory, and the "Leambeausless" Bays were never even dangerous. It was the worst upset in the Packers' history. Something was wrong with the Green Bay machine. True enough they battled stubbornly on the defense but the offense was not even a one lungner. The Packers probably did not make five first downs during the game.

BEARS UNBEARABLE

A few minutes after the game started, it was plainly seen that the Bays were not hitting on all eleven. But it was a different story for the Bears. Sport scribes in the press box claimed that they never had seen the Bruins function in such a splendid manner. Their interference was wonderful as the runner was given ample protection at all times. The Chicagoans sprung a nice forward attack which was deceptive and it caused a lot of trouble in the closing quarters. There was not a team in the country that could have whipped the Bears on Sunday, and that is no alibi. The Bears broke the ice in the second quarter when Mohardt slashed over the right side of the line for a clean cut touchdown and Sternaman kicked the goal. There was no scoring in the third period but in the last quarter the Bruins came through twice. Joe Sternaman got one of the counters and Knop came through with the other. As usual Little Joe added the extra point. Maybe Red Grange jinxed the Packers. The peerless one who has been receiving more publicity than President Coolidge the past few days sat on the bench. Between halves Grange made his bow to the multitude and he got a hand that must have been heard in Green Bay. The famous Red, furcoat and all looked every inch the college hero and whenever he moved there was about a thousand hero worshippers at his heels.

OFFICIATING GOOD

The officiating was the best the Packers have bumped into this season. The officials were on the job every minute and there was not a cause for complaint of any kind. The Packers left here at 8 o'clock Sunday evening for Harrisburg, Pa., where they will practice until Wednesday, in preparation for their battle with the Pottsville Maroons on Thanksgiving Day. Despite the fact that several of the Green Bay men were banged up it is thought that virtually all of them will be ready for the whistle Thursday.

Packers Start Practice at Harrisburg for Pottsville Game; Hospital List Is Big

GREEN BAY ELEVEN BADLY CRIPPLED IN BEAR GAME SUNDAY

NOV 24 (Harrisburg, PA) - With a hospital list that would do credit to St. Mary's, the Packers arrived here Monday afternoon after a twenty-four ride from Chicago. Practice was held Tuesday morning at the Harrisburg park and the players who could don uniforms chased the cowhide with a vengeance. The fame of the Packers had protected them and when word was noised around that the Green Bay team was working out, quite a few persons made a pilgrimage to the park to look them over. They didn't seem to do much but routine work because it was tipped off that the Pottsville Maroons had a scout camping on the Bays' trail...LONG HOSPITAL LIST: A check of the hospital list shows Larson with a bad elbow on his passing arm, Moose Gardner has several fingers worse for wear, Buck's knee has gone bad on him he can hardly hobble and it is doubtful if he will see any action before the Providence game. George Vergara has an injured arm and shoulder and doctors have as yet been unable to decide what is wrong. George is also decorated with a discolored optic that can be seen about a mile away. Basing sprung a charley horse which is apt to prove troublesome, and Marty Norton's ankle is again on the blink. The Bear game was no parlor match and many of the Packers claim that never during their football careers had they every faced such terrific blocking...OUTLOOK NOT ENCOURAGING: The outlook for Thursday's game with Pottsville isn't very encouraging but just the same, the Boys still have a lot of fight left in them and they are determined to best Pottsville's record of winning all but one game at home. It is possible that Captain Lambeau may get in this game but if either Basing or Norton shake off their injuries, the Bay leader may stay out so as to be in the pink for Philadelphia on Saturday when he will be paired with Jimmie Crowley. Crowley is slated to arrive in Quakertown on Friday night. He got the Packers' signals and formations by mail and will be ready to step into the lineup. And he sure will be needed. The way things look now, the Packers will start against Pottsville with Wilkins and O'Donnell at the ends, Jean and Earpe tackles, Woodin and Abramson, guards, Larson, center, Mathys, quarter, Kotal and Lewellen, halfbacks, and Harris, full.

WISCONSIN PRO ELEVEN HOLDS ISLAND PRACTICE

NOV 24 (Harrisburg Evening News) - The Island sod, which has been scarred by the hurrying cleats of scholastic and collegiate warriors this season, yesterday was pounded in a professional manner by members of the the Green Bay Packers of Wisconsin, a member of the NFL. The western team stopped off here to await its Thanksgiving Day game with the Pottsville Maroons. Another practice is scheduled for today. Green Bay is occupying fifth place in the league race, having won eight out of eleven games this season.

CHAMPIONS IN WORKOUT HERE

NOV 24 (Harrisburg Telegraph) - Making one of the longest football trips ever attempted by a pro team, the Green Bay, Wis., Packers are stopping off here two days en route to Pottsville, Philadelphia, Providence, R.I., and New York. This team, which has held the championship of Wisconsin since 1918, is placing fifth up in the pro league percentages and the Packers are still considered as a championship possibility. The Green Bay club worked out at Island Park this morning and they will stage another practice drill Wednesday before leaving for Pottsville where on Thanksgiving Day, they battle with the Maroons...COLLEGE STARS: The Packer squad is composed entirely of former collegians: Vergara, Notre Dame; Wilkins, Indiana and O'Donnell, Minnesota, play the ends; Buck, Wisconsin, Earpe, Monmouth, and Jean, Missouri, tackles; Gardner, Wisconsin, Woodin, Marquette, and Abramson, Minnesota, guards; Larson, Notre Dame, center; Mathys, Indiana, quarterback; Kotal, Lawrence, Lambeau, Notre Dame, Lewellen, Nebraska, Norton, Minnesota, halfbacks; Basing, Lawrence, and Harris, Wisconsin, fullback. This is the Green Bay's eleven first invasion of the east. They recently completed a long stay at home, winning eight games in a row. Notable among the victories were wins over Rock Island, Hammond, Chicago Bears, Milwaukee, Rochester, N.Y., and Dayton...CROWLEY ON TEAM: Jimmy Crowley, one of Knute Rockne's famous Four Horsemen at Notre Dame in 1924, will join the Packers when they play in Philadelphia on Saturday. Crowley is a graduate of East Green Bay high and during his prep school days was coached by Lambeau, who is captain of the Packers. During the fall Crowley had been coaching at Georgia University, but his season closes on Thanksgiving Day and he will join the Packers immediately.

PACKERS BATTLE POTTSVILLE MAROONS ON THANKSGIVING DAY

NOV 25 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packer squad, after two practices in Harrisburg, hit the trail for Pottsville Wednesday afternoon a bit more hopeful about the Thanksgiving Day game with the Maroons as the hospital list is about 50 percent smaller than when the team boarded the train at Chicago after the Bear rout. All the players except Vergara and possibly Buck will be ready for action in Pottsville. If Cub continues to improve rapidly overnight it is very likely that he will start. Vergara is out of the question. Some of the nerve connections in his left arm seem to be shattered and it is doubtful he will be in shape to play again this season with the Bays...LAMBEAU TO START: Captain Lambeau is going to start against the Maroons and it is the intention of the Green Bay captain to lose little time in uncorking his dazzling air attack. Lambeau's leg may not stand up all during the game but while he is in the Blues are going to chance their fortunes on an air drive. The Green Bay team got the best of treatment in Harrisburg. City officials gave the Packers a warm welcome, the Municipal stadium was opened for use by the team "from the west", as the Bays are called by a newspaper. Both the Harrisburg papers had their sport scribes on the job and half column writeups appeared in each publication. Around the hotel the big fellows were the center of much attention. Due to the fact that President Joe Carr underwent an operation for appendicitis in a Columbus hospital, assignment of officials for Thursday's game were not received until Wednesday noon. Donahue, Tomlin and Powell, three non-Pottsville men, are to handle the game...LEAVE POTTSVILLE THURSDAY: According to the present traveling schedule, the Packers will leave Pottsville Thursday evening at 6:50 o'clock for Philadelphia where they will be quartered at the Robert Morris hotel for a week. Jimmy Crowley is slated to join the Bays in Quakertown on Saturday morning.

PACKERS AND POTTSVILLE TANGLE TODAY; FIELD SLIPPERY

NOV 26 (Pottsville) - The Packers climbed the mountains safely into Pottsville and they are ready for the battle with the Maroons this afternoon. All the players except Buck and Vergara will be in the lineup, and there is a chance that Cub may get in for awhile. Pottsville takes its football just as seriously as Green Bay does. Talk around the hotel last night indicated that the natives considered their team unbeatable at home. Many of the townspeople visited the hotel and gave the boys the once over. The Maroons pulled a fast one at the eleventh hour. Sauers, the big Dayton guard who played against Lambeau and company in Green Bay several weeks ago, has been taken on by Pottsville. He has practiced with them for two days and, according to rumors, he told them all about the Bays' air drive which knocked off his Triangle club, 7 to 0, in a last minute rally. Weather conditions are not suitable for the Packers as the field will probably be soft. A regular old fashioned blizzard swept Pennsylvania on Wednesday and left a snow blanket. The Pottsville management is having the field scraped this morning but the turf is liable to be pretty slippery. There is a lot of interest over the game and Doc Etriemel, the Pottsville manager, is looking for a big crowd. He claims the folks in the mining region are more than anxious to see the team that put Wisconsin on the pro football map. The Packers leave Pottsville for Philadelphia at 6:30 tonight.

Old-Fashioned Blizzard Puts Field In Poor Shape; Lambeau to Play; Expect Large Crowd

PLAY BY PLAY

First Period

Green Bay is to receive the kick-off. Joe Sternaman kicked off to Harris on his 10-yard line and he returned 25 yards down the center of the field to Green Bay's 35-yard line. Lewellen punted 40 yards to Chicago's 23-yard line, where the ball was downed by O'Donnell. Walquist got a yard at left tackle. Walquist gained 2 yards on a short left end run. Hanny punted to Green Bay's 41-yard line, where the ball was allowed to roll dead. Harris gained 2 yards through left tackle. Harris got a yard through the left side of the line. Lewellen punted over Chicago's goal line. Chicago's ball, first down. Mohardt failed to gain at the left side of the line. Walquist gained 5 yards through Cub Buck. Hanny punted to Green Bay's 25-yard line, where the ball rolled dead. Norton is playing left half. Harris made three yards through the left side of the Bear line. Norton failed to gain on a wide end run. Lewellen punted to Joe Sternaman who returned 20 yards to the 50-yard line.

Sternaman gained 2 yards on a right end run and cutting back through the line. Time out for Chicago. Mohardt gained 3 yards on a wide right end run. E. Sternaman gained five yards making it first down on Green Bay's 39-yard line. Joe Sternaman gained about a half a yard on a center rush. Walquist gained 5 yards at right tackle. Joe Sternaman got a yard and a half on a left end run. Bears penalized 15 yards for holding, putting the ball on Green Bay's 41-yard line. A short forward pass Joe Sternaman to Healy gained 3 yards. Hanny punted to Green Bay's 4-yard line, where the ball was downed by Halas. Lewellen punted 70 yards placing the ball out of bounds on Chicago's 43-yard line. This was a perfect kick being booted from behind the Packers' goal line. Dutch Sternaman was replaced by Knop at fullback. Walquist picked up 9½ yards around left end. Mohardt gained 3 yards at left tackle, making it first down on Green Bay's 45-yard line. Knop gained 2 yards through center. Joe Sternaman gained 15 yards around left end, throwing off three tacklers, putting the ball on Green Bay's 28-yard line. Mohardt got 3 yards around right end, putting the ball in the center of the field. Mohardt picked up a yard through left guard. Sternaman gained another yard, putting the ball on Green Bay's 23 yard line.

Mohardt tried a left end run and made first down on Green Bay's 19 yard line. Joe Sternaman was held for no gain. Sternaman was thrown for a three yard loss by Jack Harris at left end. J. Sternaman forward passed to Mohardt for no gain. Fourth down, 13 to go. Joe Sternaman's goal kick from Green Bay's 33 yard line was no good, going wide by a big margin. Lewellen punted to Mohardt who returned the ball 10 yards to Green Bay's 38 yard line. Time out for Green Bay. Buck is injured. Buck resumes play. This was the first time that Buck was ever knocked out of commission in a professional football game. Walquist failed to gain, Buck knocking him down on the scrumage line. Mohardt went around right end for 11 yards, putting the ball on Green Bay's 27 yard line, just as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Walquist lost a yard around Vergara's end. Second down, 11 to go. Mohardt went around left end for 2 yards. Mohardt lost a yard, Vergara and Earpe tackling him. Joe Sternaman's attempt at a field goal was wide. Green Bay's ball on their own 29 yard line. Jean went in at tackle in place of Cub Ruck. Lewellen failed to gain at right guard. Harris failed to gain through the left side of the line. Lewellen punted to Mohardt who returned the ball 5 yards to Green Bay's 36 yard line. The Packers were kicking against the wind. Mohardt gained a yard at left end. Knop gained 3 yards at center. Halas was replaced by Mullen at left end. A forward pass J. Sternaman to Mullen gained 15 yards, putting the ball on Green Bay's 16 yard line. Walquist goes through right tackle for nine yards. Ball on Green Bay's 7 yard line. Mohardt gained 2 yards for a first down on Green Bay's 5 yard line. Mohardt went around left end putting the ball about three inches from goal. Walquist goes through for a touchdown. Score: Bears, 6; Green Bay, 0.

Joe Sternaman kicked the extra point. Score: Bears, 7; Green Bay, 0.

Woodin kicked off to Walquist who returned the ball 5 yards to Chicago's 28 yard line. Jean getting the tackle. Healy made 2 yards on a wide end run. McMullen was replaced by Scott. Walquist went around left end for 10 yards, making it first down on Chicago's 40 yard line. Time out for Chicago. Mohardt on a wide left end run, got 3 yards. Mohardt is held for no gain at the left side of the line. Walquist went around left end for a yard and a half. Romney replaced Walquist. Mathys signalled for a fair catch of Hanny's punt but was tackled by Chicago. Chicago is penalized 15 yards, putting the ball on Green Bay's 36 yard line.

Norton gained 4 yards through the left side of the line. Norton failed to gain on a cutback. Lewellen punted to J. Sternaman, who returned 8 yards to Chicago's 30-yard line. Romney gained a yard through right tackle. Mohardt picked up 2 yards at left end. Hanny punted to Mathys who returned the ball 18 yards to Green Bay's 38-yard line. Time out for Chicago. Lewellen gained 5 yards around right end. Norton gained 3 yards through right tackle, third down 2 to go. Lewellen gained a half-yard on an end run. Lewellen punted to Chicago's 33-yard line, where the ball was downed by O'Donnell. On a criss-cross, Mohardt to J. Sternaman lost 7 yards. Moose Gardner got that last tackle. Mohardt got 3 yards at left end Hanny kicked out of bounds on Green Bay's 34-yard line. Green Bay's ball first down. Norton goes through center for 4 yards. Lewellen on a criss-cross failed to gain. Harris passed to Mathys for first down on the 50-yard line. A pass from Harris was intercepted by Knop on Chicago's 38-yard line. Chicago's ball, first down. A criss-cross Romney to J. Sternaman gained 2 yards just as the half ended.

Third Quarter

E. Sternaman, Mohardt and Romney and J. Sternaman will be the Bear backfield. Packers kicking off to Chicago. Woodin kicked off to E. Sternaman who return from his 10-yard line to his 31-yard line. Mohardt circled left end for 14 yards running out of bounds on the west side of the field. First down Bears on their 45-yard line. Mohardt failed at left tackle. E. Sternaman makes two on a left end run. Mohardt made no gain on a wide end run. E. Sternaman back to kick. He punts to Green Bay's three-yard line where the ball rolled dead. Harris gains one yard through left tackle. Lewellen punts to Joe Sternaman who is downed on Green Bay's 28-yard line. Time out for Vergara. Halas goes in at left end for the Bears. Harris replaces Vergara and Basing replaces Harris at full. Romney gained two at left end. J. Sternaman held for no gain at right end. A pass, Joe Sternaman to Hanny put the ball on Green Bay's 11-yard line. A short pass over the center of the line J. Sternaman was incomplete. Mohardt makes two at left end. Romney makes four at Green Bay's guard. Joe Sternaman on a left end run flopped by Norton for a six-yard loss. Green Bay's ball on their own ten-yard line. Norton lost five on a wide left end run. Second down fifteen. Lewellen back of his goal to punt. Lewellen punts to Bears but ball was called back and Bears penalized 15 yards for holding. Packers ball 10 to go on their own 20-yard line. Norton gains one on a left end run. Lewellen gains two yards at right tackle. Lewellen punts out of bounds on Packers' 45-yard line. Romney makes one yard at right tackle. A pass, Walquist to Romney was knocked down by Jug Earpe. Another pass, Walquist to Halas, knocked down by Basing. Hanny punted to Mathys who fair caught on his own nine-yard line. Lewellen gained two at right tackle. Lewellen back to kick. Lewellen kicks to Mohardt who returns ball to Green Bay's 39-yard line. Mohardt is thrown by Harris for a three-yard loss at right end. A pass was intercepted by Basing who returns 20 yards to Bears 41-yard line. Norton gains two through left tackle. Norton goes around left end for four yards. Ed. Sternaman goes out and he is replaced by Knop at full.

A pass from Lewellen was intercepted by Mohardt who runs it back to his own 40 yard line. Romney was held for a one yard gain at right guard. Joe Sternaman was thrown for a two yard loss by Earpe. Hanny punts to Mathys who is downed on Green Bay's 28 yard line. Basing goes through tackle for five yards. Basing makes three at left guard. The quarter ended with the ball on Packers 35 yard line.

Basing held at center for no gain. Fourth down two. Lewellen back to kick. He punts to Joe Sternaman who returns five to his own forty yard line. Mohardt makes three through left side of line. Earpe getting the tackle. Romney makes four yards through left side of line. Earpe get-

ting the tackle. Romney makes four yards through left guard. Knop made two at right end. Fourth down a few inches to go. Knop makes it first down, on Packers' 49 yard line. J. Sternaman makes a five yard gain at left end. Romney makes two at left end. Romney goes through left tackle for three yards and first down on Packers' 36 yard line. Kotal replaces Mathys. Hanny back to punt. Kotal catches on the 45 yard line. Both teams were off-side and the ball was brought back. Hanny back to punt. Hanny punts to his 49 yard line where the ball rolled dead. Norton on a forward pass was flopped for a ten yard loss. He was smothered before he could deliver the ball. A pass was intercepted by Walquist who returned it to Packers' 33 yard line. Time out Packers. Green Bay penalized five yards for having time out five times. A pass, J. Sternaman to Mohardt was good for 20 yards just as the time expired.
