



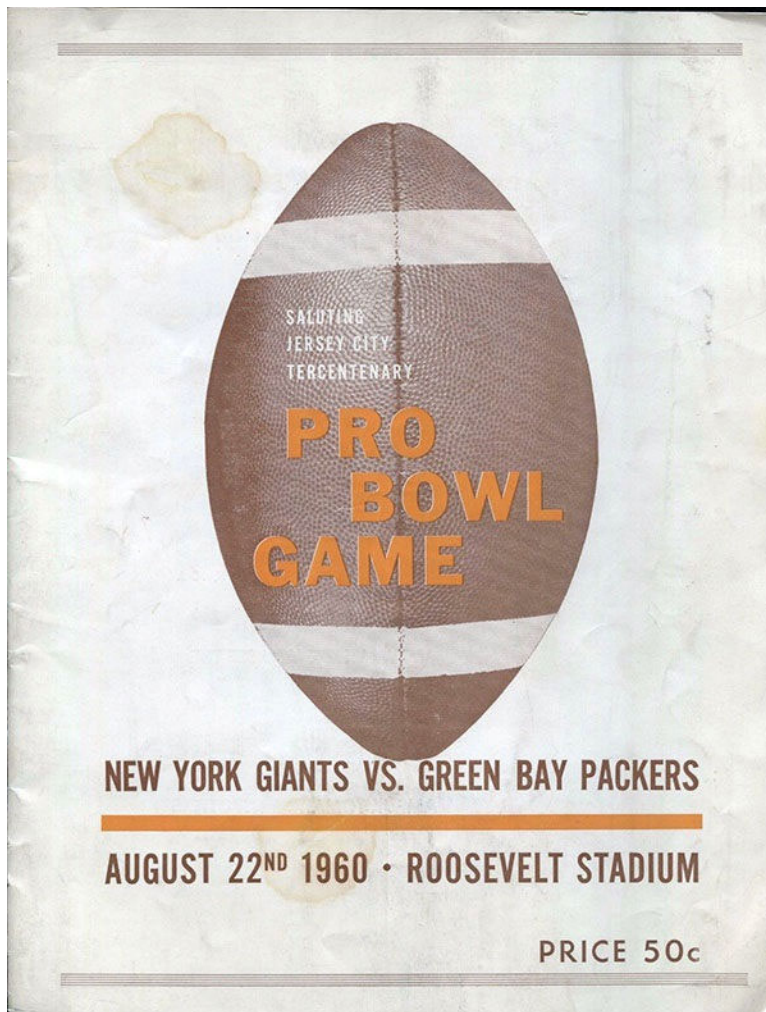

Packers Whip Giants 16 to 7

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(JERSEY CITY, NJ) - The Packers put their best foot forward before Coach Vince Lombardi's home folks and walked off with a hard-fought 16 to 7 non-championship victory over the New York Giants in Roosevelt Stadium here Monday night.

This was a battle of iron defenses and the Packers had enough offensive edge to win it. Each team scored a touchdown in the first quarter and then the Packers slammed the door shut. But the Green Bay fighters crept close enough to allow Paul Hornung to connect on field goals of 23, 20 and 11 yards. It wasn't a particularly brilliant test, what with 21 penalties for 202 yards on both clubs, three interceptions, four fumbles and 10 punts. But the offensive display the Packers presented a surprise crowd of 26,500 in this baseball park added up to 296 yards, including 151 on passing. This is a good total against the best-defense Giants - especially at this stage of the warmup season. This was sort of a must-win battle for both clubs. The Giants, with an opposing pro team in New York, wanted to salt this one away for propaganda purposes. The Packers figured Coach Lombardi would like to whip his old club - especially after two lickings last year. What's more, Lombardi hails from these parts. Honored as coach of the year during ceremonies between halves, Lombardi was given the game ball on the field after the game by Capt. Jim Ringo. The Packers now have completed their 12-day swing away from friendly Green Bay on a happy note. They won the opener 20-13 over the Steelers in New Orleans and the Bays now have won six straight games, counting the four league wins at the close of 1959. Green Bay threatened to score throughout the battle of Jersey, with both Lamar McHan and Bart Starr at the controls. McHan started and worked up 10 points, Starr getting the other six in the second half. The Giants, who used Chuck Conerly at quarterback in the first



quarter, followed with George Shaw the second and third, and then finished with Lee Grosscup in the fourth, never penetrated beyond the 50 except but twice all night, once on the TD and the other time late in the game. Both touchdowns came on passes and both came at the end of 60-yard drives. McHan hurled a high 22-yard pitch to Boyd Dowler, who skyhooked the ball from among three Giant defenders in the end zone. This gave the Pack a 7-0 lead. The Giants scored the next time they had their hands on the ball. Conerly and Kyle Rote did it practically all themselves. They worked a 35-yard aerial, with Rote making a circus catch, and two plays later performed a five-yard TD duet in the end zone to tie the game.

The Packers got a good look at two untested backs - Dick Pesonen and Tom Moore, and additional looks at previously tested newcomers. Moore, with less than a week of drills, got 24 yards in three tries and launched the first field goal drive with a 19 yard rip. Pesonen had 9 yards in two trips, but lost ten yards on plays killed by penalties. Starr and McHan each completed six passes and the big receiver of the game was Dowler, who bagged five for 66 yards and generally had the Giants' defense a little unhappy. The second field goal was set up on a fumble recovery by Willie Davis on the Giants' 40 and 25 yards gained on three runs by Jim Taylor. The last field goal was pretty much a gift, a fumble recovery by Jim Temp on the Giants five. Taylor was named the outstanding back on the field by the writers who also tabbed Davis as the Packers' top defensive player. The Packer defense, getting tougher by the week, indicated that it came to play right at the start. Jim Temp hurled Morrison for a 10-yard loss on the first play of the game. Six plays later, after a roughing the kicker penalty gave the Giants new life, Bill Forester recovered Gifford's fumble on the Giants' 28-yard line and the Packers had a shot. The Giants held, however, and forced the field goal, the boot sailing wide from the 33. The Bays got the ball right back on a fumble recovery by Em Tunnell, but the Packer gave it away, too, when Nolan intercepted McHan's throw at midfield. The Packer defense forced a punt and the Green Bays launched their touchdown drive. A 17-yard draw run and an interference penalty by Patton and Nolan on Meilinger who lost his helmet in the process set the ball on the 28. Taylor and Hornung made six and on third down McHan and Dowler connected in the end zone. Hornung's kick made it 7-0 with about half the period (no clock here) gone. The Giants came right back in six plays to knot the score. Rote worked behind Jess Whittenton and made a circus catch of a sky-high Conerly toss on the 14. Morrison then ran to the five and Rote ran out wide in the end zone to take Conerly's throw. Summerall added the extra point for a 7-7 score.

STALLED ON 20

The Packers made like they were on their way to another TD when McHan and Dowler hooked up on a 30-yard pass gain to the Giants' 45 but the attack stalled on the Giants 20, and Hornung tried a field goal from the 49. It fell short and dead on the two. George Shaw made his first appearance at this point and other than a first down he ran into a punt situation. Shaw couldn't gain and the Packers forced Chandler to punt three times in the next 10 minutes. Pesonen and Moore made their debuts and McHan got three first downs in one series, with Pesonen running 11 yards and Moore seven. Along the way, Patton intercepted two McHan passes, setting the stage for the Packers' field goal drive just before the half.

GIANTS GET FUMBLE

Moore ran 19 to start the show and then McGee ran hard after a pass from McHan to add up 46 yards to the Giants' 16. Three passes fell incomplete and then Hornung booted a field goal from the 23 for a 10-7 lead. Starr opened the second half with two first downs but the Giants recovered Taylor's fumble to set off a series of punts by Chandler and Dowler. Just before the third period ended, Willie Davis recovered Morrison's fumble on the Giant 40 and from there the Pack went in for another field goal. Taylor gained 25 yards in three straight trips to the Giants' 15, but the New Yorkers then shut the door. Hornung booted the Pack into a 13-7 lead from the 22 on the second play of the fourth period. The defenses again took over and Dowler and Chandler got punting practice until the last few minutes when the Packers and Dowler moved the Giants back to their own 12. On third down, Dave Hanner knocked the ball out of Grosscup's hand and Temp recovered the fumble on the Giants' five. Another TD seemed sure but the Giants are murder on defense. Livingston broke through and nailed Taylor back six yards and Hornung, in two tries, got to the four. Hornung then booted a three-pointer from the 11 for the final count. The Giants came up field at the end, but the Packer defense was tough, too, and the Bays took the ball on downs. Now it's the Bears in Milwaukee Saturday night.

WIN OVER GIANTS SWEET REVENGE FOR LOMBARDI

AUG 23 (Jersey City, NJ-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The biggest grin in the dressing room after last night's Packer victory was worn by Coach Vince Lombardi, who had to take two whippings from the Giants last year. "We were both sloppy. I don't know what was the matter with our offense, but we couldn't get going," Vince laughed. Lombardi agreed that maybe the Giants' tough defense might have had something to do with the Packers' offensive shortcomings. Vince said he was pleased with the Packers' defensive play...The Packers were scheduled to arrive at Austin Straubel Field about 1 o'clock today with Green Bayite Don Smith piloting the club's chartered United Airlines plane. Joining the Bays in Green Bay will be two new backs - Bob Jarus, obtained from Cleveland, and Don Brown, who comes from the St. Louis Cardinals.

Packer Offense Still Off Key: Lombardi

PACKER OFFENSE STILL OFF KEY: LOMBARDI

AUG 24 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers have won two games (against no losses) with a minimum of offense. That's a credit to the defense, which allowed only 20 points - an average of 20 - in the 20-13 victory over Pittsburgh and the 16-7 edging of New York. The offense has averaged 18 points in

each of the two wins. Compare that with the average of 29.75 points the Packers scored in posting the four straight wins at the close of last season and you get an idea of the job ahead for the 1960 offense. While the pointmakers rolled up 206 yards against the Giants, including 151 by passing, Coach Vince Lombardi felt that "we didn't look good on offense. We were sloppy." The Bays' two quarterbacks, who each worked half the game, weren't writing letters home about their showing in Jersey City Monday night. Lamar McHan, who started and played the first half, figured "the defense is ahead of the offense right now but us pitchers will start catching up to the batters pretty soon." Bart Starr, who worked the second half, said he "couldn't get a thing going. We made too many mistakes and nothing seemed to work." While Packer offensive folks won't flare it out, it must be reported that the Giants' defense is certainly one of the best in pro football and some of the Pack's offensive problems can be attributed to that group. Incidentally, the TD was the first scored by the Packers on the Giants in three games. New York won 14-0 and 20-3 last year. The Giants threw up their best defense, making few substitutions. The club's defensive ringleader, Sam Huff, wasn't even supposed to play but went practically the entire defensive distance. He was reportedly injured. Green Bay now faces a new problem - the Chicago Bears - in the annual Shrine contest in Milwaukee County Stadium Saturday night. While the Packers' big objective will be to juice up the offensive point production, Lombardi still wants to continue testing of new offensive material - such as the new backs, Tom Moore, Dick Pesonen, Paul Winslow, Bob Jarus and Don Brown. In addition, the coach plans to test Garney Henley, guards Mike Falls and Andy Cvercko, center Ken Iman and tackle Ron Ray. It is interesting to note that at least three rookies were on hand when the Packers drove for their lead field goal just before the half vs. the Giants. Moore and Pesonen were the running backs and Henley was at flanker. Pesonen ran 10 yards but lost the gain on a holding penalty and Moore raced 19 yards along the way. The big blast setting up Paul Hornung's 23-yard field goal was McHan's 46-yard pass to Max McGee...Two players were

placed on waivers and another, guard Kirk Phares, was traded to the Dallas Cowboys for an undisclosed draft choice. South Carolina Phares was the Bays' seventh draft choice. Dispatched via waivers were end Earl Cornish, a free agent who was trying out for the defensive secondary, and offensive halfback Don Herndon, who had been obtained from the Giants in a trade for Jon Gilliam, a linebacker. With Cornish gone, the defense squad now has only two rookies - halfback Willie Wood and linebacker Joe Hergert. This drops the camp roster down to 43 players, including the new halfbacks, Brown and Jarus. The Packers, facing another game in four days, worked out this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Other drills are scheduled for Thursday and Friday morning...BRIEFS: Jarus was selected by the Browns on the fifth choice the Packers owed that club for Bob Freeman. The Packers have four members of the draft left - Tom Moore, Ron Ray, Paul Winslow and Garney Henley...The Packers came out of the Giant game with two injuries and both of them were thumb cases - Pesonen and Freeman...With Phares gone, rookie center Ken Iman may be schooled some at offensive guard. Backing up veterans Fred Thurston and Jerry Kramer are two second-year rookies, Andy Cvercko and Mike Falls.

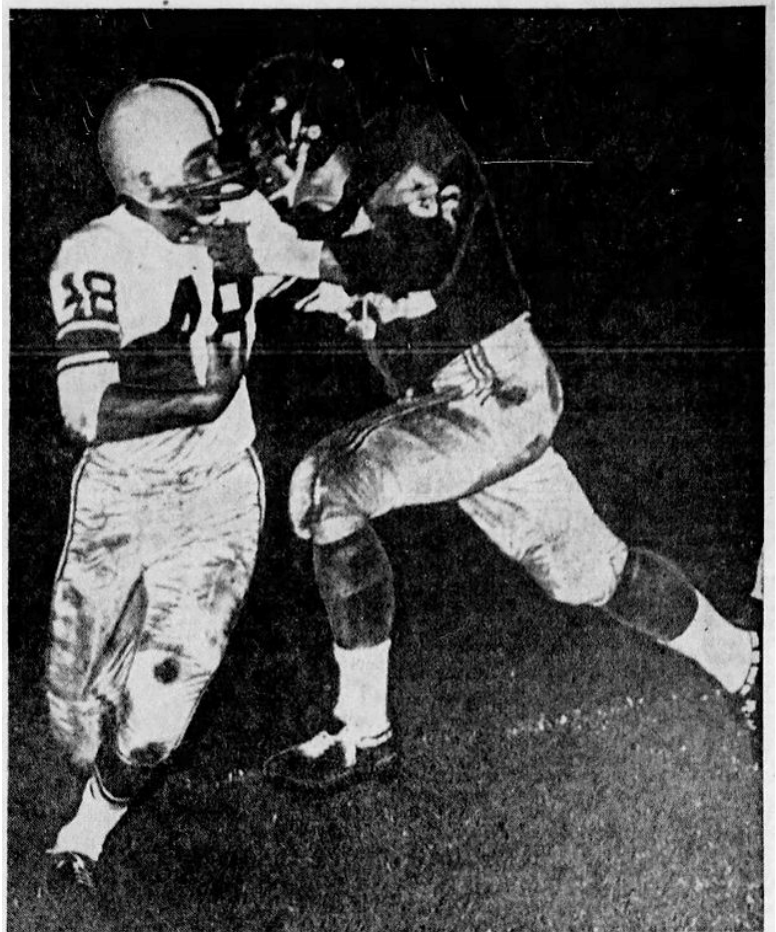
PACKERS WILL MEET BEARS UNDER UNFAVORABLE CONDITIONS

AUG 25 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers are meeting the Bears under unfavorable conditions in Milwaukee County Stadium Saturday night. But the situation could well be reversed come next December. Right now, the Packers could use an extra day or two

of practice, facing this Shrine Classic Saturday - just five days after a tussle with the New York Giants. The Bears, on the other hand, will go into the fray with a dozen days of drills, having last played Aug. 15 against these same Giants. This will be the first of three meetings between football's oldest and bitterest rivals. But this one really doesn't count since the winner will only get a flashy smile from the head coach - be it George Halas of the Bears or Vince Lombardi of our Packers. Green Bay and Chicago (that's right, the Cardinals are in St. Louis) start the NFL season in City Stadium Sept. 25. The rematch is carded for Wrigley Field in Chicago Dec. 4. which is a month later than usual. The Packers will get the "long rest" for this one, the 10th game of the season, since Game 9 will be the Thanksgiving show vs, the Lions Nov. 24. The Bears will stay in the regular routine, hosting Dallas Nov. 27. Meeting the Bears at any time measures up to a most difficult job for the Green Bays. This is the second time the Packers have played them on an exhibition basis, the first being in 1959 when the Bears won in the final 20 seconds. That was the opener for each club. Saturday's game could be stickier, as it were, since both teams are in the more advanced phase of training. Lombardi was wondering about the "advance" of the two-win-no-loss Bays. He sent the 43 athletes through their paces Wednesday and discovered that the drill fell slightly flat. It was like a Tuesday after a Sunday game - a long time cranking up. The sprints followed the offensive-defensive workout and Don Brown, the new back obtained from the St. Louis Cardinals, remarked: "That's the most running I've had all season." He added: "We hadn't been working very hard. A year ago, it was just the opposite." Brown, former star at Houston U, is a second year rookie. He underwent surgery on his knee before the league campaign started. He packs about 200 pounds. Bob Jarus, the other new back in camp, got a little "home work" in his first drill - a lap around the field after practice. If Lombardi feels an athlete isn't extending himself enough in the sprints, he is ordered to take that extra lap. Jarus, obtained from the Browns, had a famous partner, the honorable Emlen Tunnell, who drew a lap. Em, incidentally, went the defensive route against the Giants, his former teammates. The Bays, who carded morning workouts today and Friday, will leave for Milwaukee after dinner Friday night.

FIGHT BREWING IN PACK OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

AUG 26 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers have a first class fight a-brewin' in the offensive backfield. And it could come to a head in the Shrine Classic against the Bears in Milwaukee Saturday night. At least, there might be a trend. Coach

Fight Brewing in Pack Offensive Backfield

Vince Lombardi and his offensive backfield aide, Red Cochran, have eight running backs (left halfbacks and/or fullbacks) on the premises and three of them are well known veterans - Jim Taylor, Paul Hornung and Lew Carpenter. Discount that trio. The fight is among five rookies - Tom Moore, Paul Winslow, Dick Pesonen, Bob Jarus and Don Brown. One or two have a

chance to make the pay window come the day after the for-keeps opener against the Bears in Green Bay Sept. 25. Jarus and Browns are thoroughly untested. "It's too early for me to judge them. They haven't been here long and don't know their plays well enough yet. They do look like good football players," Lombardi observed. Both joined the club Tuesday, the result of trades for undisclosed draft choices, which would be payable if the athlete makes the club. Jarus, a 212-pounder out of Purdue, is a fullback. He came from the Browns. Brown, who packs around 200, is a halfback from the Cardinals. The former Houston star almost died after running into a Colt Clothesline in the All Star game a year ago. But what really

floored him was a knee operation before the Card season opened. He opened the current campaign in the Card camp. The other three rookies have shown some possibilities and undoubtedly will get additional tests Saturday. Moore, the Bays' No. 1 draft choice, reported late due to the All Star game. Despite only a week of practice, he ran his plays well in the 16-7 victory over the Giants, getting 24 yards in three trips. Tom is an elusive and strong 210 pounds. Winslow seems to get faster by the week. A 200-pounder, he can streak. He picked up 29 yards in two carries in the win over Pittsburgh and both times eluded tacklers en route. Pesonen, the Duluth Branch, University of Minnesota, product, is strictly a darkhorse in the halfback race. He has shown enough to warrant additional looks and ran exceptionally hard vs. the Giants, getting nine yards in two trips. He came out with rib injuries and may not play against the Bears. Taylor seems on the fringe of a great year. The Bayou Blaster leads the club with 160 yards in 24 carries. Hornung hasn't hit his stride yet, with 77 yards in 29 trips. Carpenter didn't carry vs. the Giants and was limited to four yards in four trips against Pitt... The Packers will leave for Milwaukee via two Greyhound buses at 6:45 this evening and headquarter at the Astor Hotel. They will return via the same transportation at 1:15 Sunday afternoon... The search for a kickoff man to replace Hornung and Jerry Kramer continued after practice yesterday. Willie Wood, wearing a brand new kicking shoe, tried his hand (er, foot) under the watchful eye of Lombardi and Coach Norb Hecker and reached the three-yard line several times. Wood then passed the shoe to Taylor and the strong-legged fullback, taking only a couple of steps, reached the five-yard line. It doesn't necessarily follow that if a couple of steps get the ball to the five a dozen steps (on the approach) will place the ball in the grandstand. Taylor discovered that. Anyhow, kickoff practice will continue almost every day and anyone with a Packer contract is welcome to try out... Big Bill Quinlan, floored at Bear Mountain last week with a pesty virus, was released from St. Vincent Hospital Thursday and reported for practice this morning. He was held out of the Giant game. Earlier today, Bill's wife presented him with their third child, a son, who has been christened Shaun Michael.

GOV. NELSON TO MAKE AWARDS AT PACK-CARD GAME

AUG 26 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Gov. Nelson will attend the Packer-St. Louis Cardinal game at City Stadium Labor Day and present two awards between halves. He will present the coach of the year award to Coach Vince Lombardi and the rookie of the year award to Boyd Dowler. Lombardi and Dowler both were shoo-ins for their honors from the Associated Press and United Press International. Kickoff for the game is set for 4 p.m.

PACKERS BATTLE BEARS IN 11TH SHRINE TEST

AUG 27 (Milwaukee-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers will have to be extra careful in the vicinity of their own 37-yard line - especially in the waning seconds, when they meet the Bears in the 11th annual Shrine Classic in County Stadium tonight. This will be the 11th annual Shrine battle for the benefit of the organization's Crippled Children's Hospital and the Packers will be out to snap a two-game losing streak in the colorful series. Green Bay lost those two games under unusually similar circumstances - from their own 37-yard line and in the final seconds. The Steelers won the 1958 contest in a driving downpour with a field goal from (you guessed it) the 37-yard line in the last second of play. A year ago, the Bears had the ball on the Packers' 37-yard line with 41 seconds left. Zeke Bratkowski fired a pass up the middle to Rick Casares and the big fullback went all the way to give the Bears a 19-16 victory. That 1959 test was a real thriller and marked the first non-

looper between pro football's oldest and bitterest rivals, barring a few "side" games back in the old days. Packer Coach Vince Lombardi and Green Bay's Fine Friendly Foe, George Halas, would like to come in with another thriller tonight because a crowd of close to 40,000 - or even more with good weather, might be on hand. Kickoff is set for 8:05. The Shriners are planning a big night, what with full dress pregame and between-halves ceremonies. Good weather, which is promised, would be quite a switch. It has rained during four of the last six games. The Packers will open with Bart Starr at quarterback under Lombardi's plan to alternate Starr with Lamar McHan - by halves. McHan will work the second half. Starr started the season vs. the Steelers in New Orleans and McHan came on to win in the second half after a 6-6 first half. McHan opened in the second game vs. the Giants in Jersey City, and worked up a 10-7 lead in his half. Starr got across a couple of field goals in the second half. Lombardi says he'll open with veteran lineups on offense and defense. During the evening, he hoped to get a better look at Willie Wood, who will play considerable defense, and at least two of the new running backs, Paul Winslow and Tom Moore. Dick Pesonen may not be able to play because of rib injuries. Also ticketed for tests will be linebacker Joe Hergert, center Ken Iman, offensive tackle Ron Ray, flanker (right half) Garney Henley and guards Andy Cvercko and Mike Falls. The two new backs obtained in trades, Don Brown and Bob Jarus, don't figure to work on offense. However, they may operate some on kickoff and/or punt returns. They just reported Tuesday. The Packers' big hope is to score some points. They picked off 20 against the Steelers and 16 on the Giants but they'll have to average three TDs or more to win in league competition. The Bears played just one game - a 16 to 7 victory over the Giants in Toronto, and they should be pawing for action. The Halasmen will open with their three great receivers - Harlon Hill and Dewveall at the ends and Dooley at flanker. Willie Galimore will be at left half. Casares has a touch of the flu and may not play much. Johnny Morris has a leg injury and may be used sparingly. The Packers' Bill Quilan, ill with a virus for more than a week, will be sidelined.

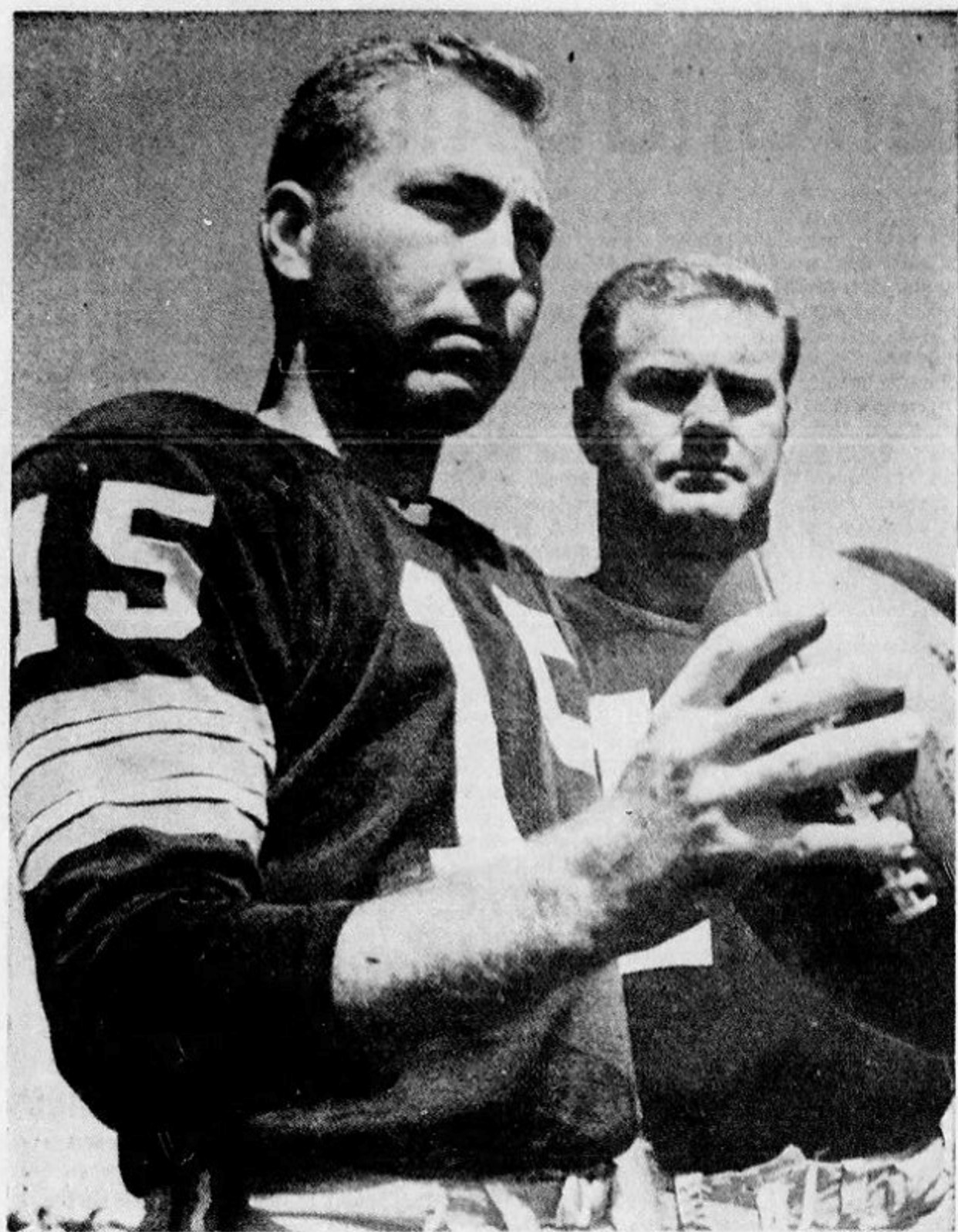


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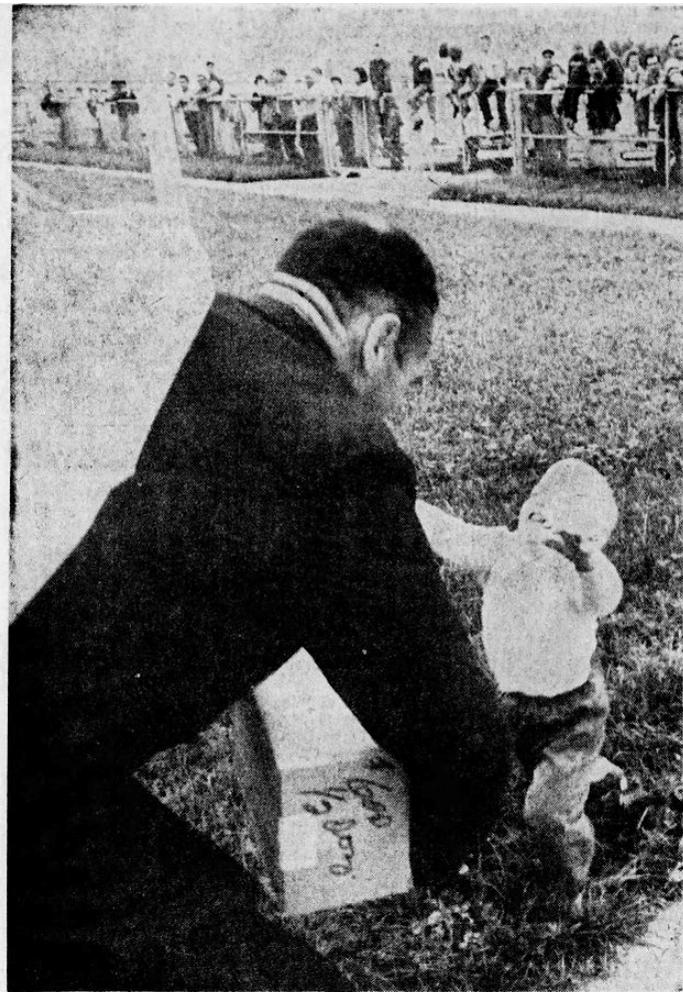
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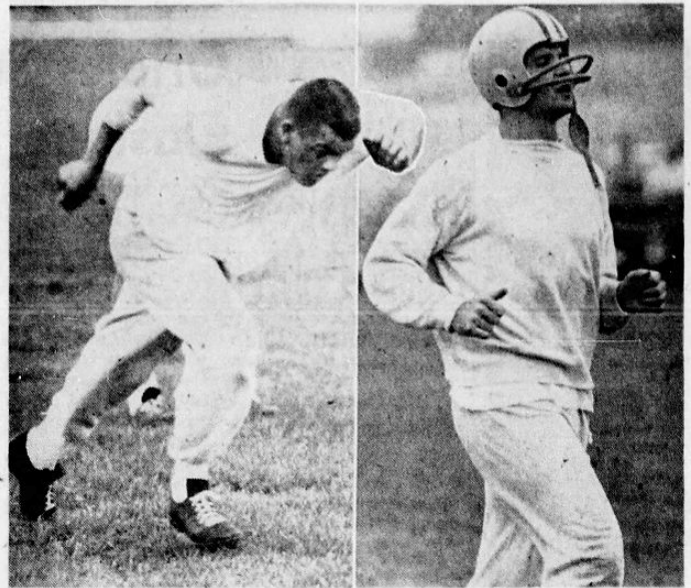
