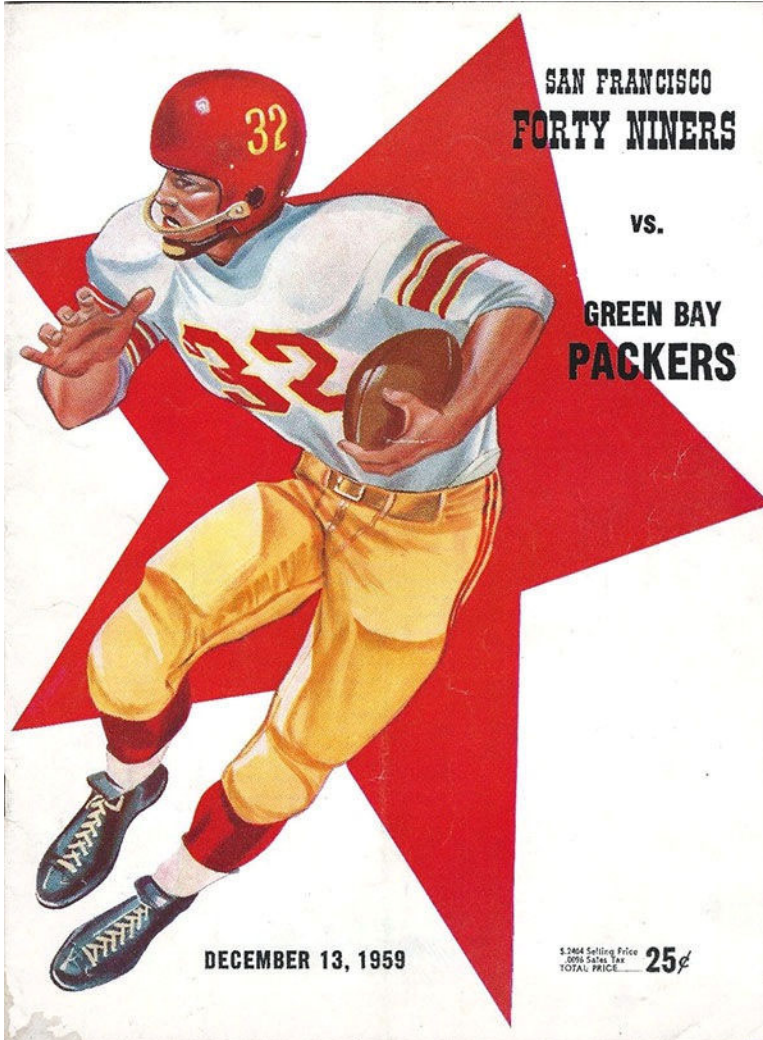

Packers Win West, Crush San Francisco 36-14

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)



(SAN FRANCISCO) - The Packers won the West and the hearts of Packerland in one mighty sweep in Kezar Stadium Sunday afternoon. They were behind 14 to 0 in the first quarter but swept back in a furious display of football to rip the rugged 49ers wide open, 36 to 14. It was the final game of the NFL, but it made you wish the Packers' miracle season of 1959 was just beginning. Green Bay had won its fourth straight victory and set the final record at 7 victories and 5 defeats. That put the Pack in a third place tie with the 49ers, who have lost four of their last five games. The Packers will be counting firsts and bests from now until the 1960 season, but the major "Yeah Team" was that the 7-5 was the best Green Bay finish since the championship year of '44 when the Bays posted 8-2. And this was the Bays' first two-game sweep of the West Coast. They licked the Rams at Los Angeles last Sunday 38-20. The Packers had won only two previous games on the west shore - over the Rams in '47 and the 49ers in '55. This victory, the third straight which the Packers played as an underdog, easily made Green Bay the super-surprise team of 1959. And it made Coach Vince Lombardi a cinch to be selected as the NFL's Coach of the Year. This was Bart Starr's finest victory and most prized possession. The head quarterback, who engineered his fourth straight win, picked the 49er defense to pieces. He had his hands on the ball 10 times and worked up five touchdowns, one drive that resulted in a missed field goal and two out-of-danger pushes, including a 9-

minute freeze of the ball at the end of the game. Starr actually pulled the Packer defense together. The Packers were behind 14-0 and its defense didn't appear sharp, but Starr engineered a 78-yard touchdown drive to make it 14-7. From then on, the Bay defenders were murder - never allowed a point. Starr completed a 22-yard touchdown pass to Gary Knafelc with 14 seconds left in the half to gain a 14-14 score. The Bays ripped off 16 points in the third period, including a safety for Bill Forester, who tackled Y.A. Tittle in the end zone, and six in the final frame...Starr put the Packers' Golden Touch to work beautifully - to the tune of 22 points. The GT, of course, is Paul Hornung, who reeled off three touchdowns and four extra points, ran 15 times for 83 yards, and caught two passes for five yards. Paul wound up as the league's top scorer for the season.

MAGIC WAND WORKING

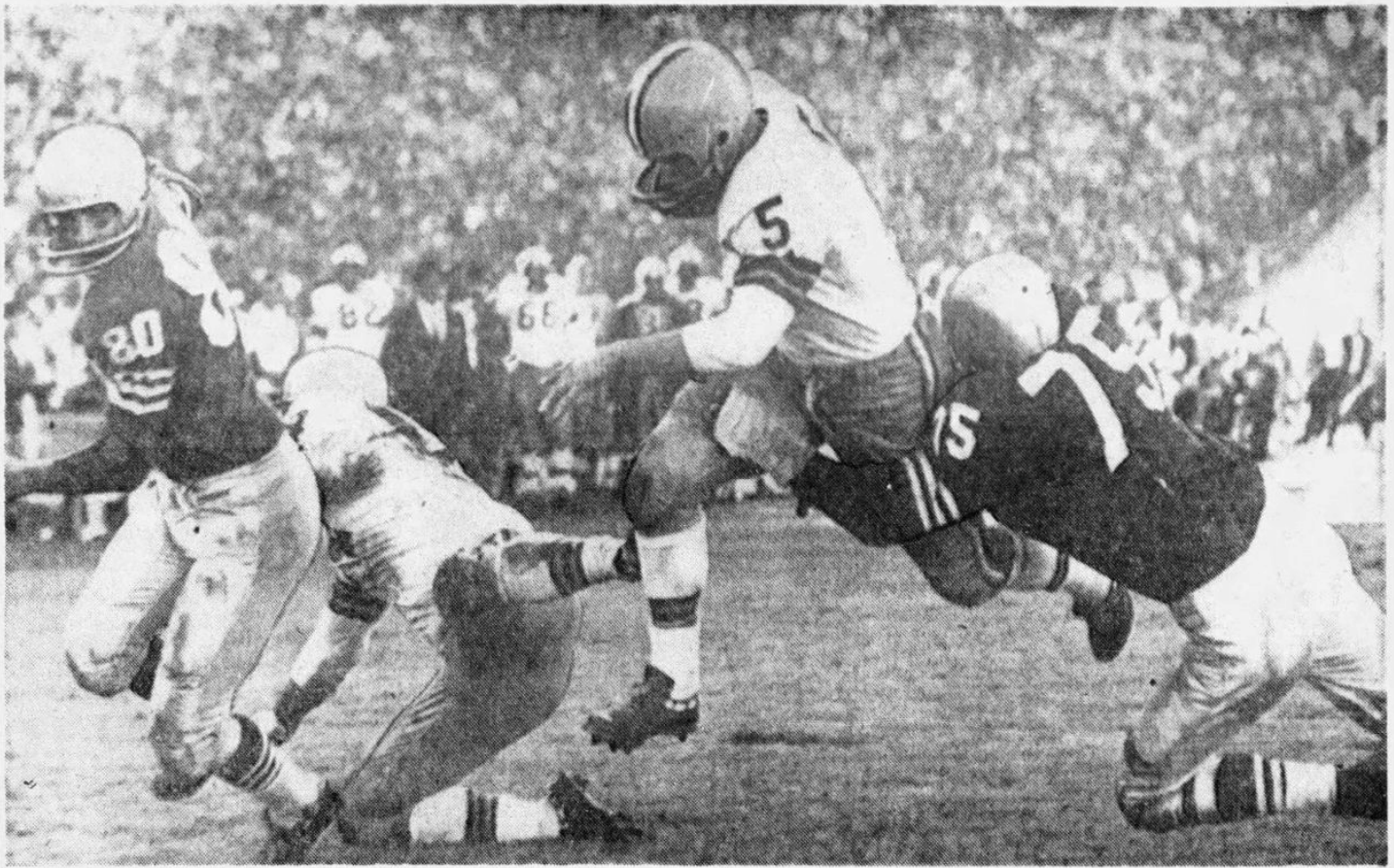
Hornung, who hurled two touchdown passes to Boy Dowler in Los Angeles last Sunday, had a magic wand working for him here. Twice he ran to his right and raised his magic right arm and each time the defenders just seemed to disappear, apparently figuring he was going to throw. He scored twice on those plays and banged over the left side for the other TD.

The other TD's came on Starr passes to Knafelc and Dowler for 10 yards...Starr had a fabulous 77 percent completion figure, hitting 20 completions out of 26 pass attempts. His pitches brought 249 yards and two touchdowns, without an interception. It certainly must have been the best percentage in Packer history. The Bay offensive line gave Starr terrific protection. Bart completed 13 out of 17 in the first half and then hit seven out of nine in the second half. The Bays' three ends caught 15, with Dowler getting six, Knafelc five and Max McGee four. Frisco's Tittle hit on 13 of 22. The Packers outclassed their foes with 479 yards, including 249 in the air and 230 on the ground. The 49ers finished with 200 less. Lew Carpenter, opening at fullback for Jim Taylor, reeled off 113 yards in 16 attempts...The Packers defense, taking early note of the Bay offense, came up with three key plays in the third quarter - the safety, an interception by John Symank, and a recovered fumble and 46-yard return by Jesse Whittenton. Forester added an interception in the fourth frame. The 49ers scored touchdowns the first two times they had the ball. They moved 74 yards in five plays after forcing the Packers to punt after the opening kickoff. C.R. Roberts, playing in place of injured Joe Perry, ripped 46 yards on a draw play, kayoing two Packers en route, for the touchdown. Davis kicked the first of two extra points for a 7-0 lead. McGee made a great catch of Starr's pass up the middle and then ran 20 yards for a 44-yard gain on the Packer turn at the ball. But the attack stalled and Horning missed a field goal from the 25. The 49ers next went 80 yards in eight plays for a 14-0 edge, as the Packer tackling looked bad. The big gainer was a 40-yard pass play from Tittle to Hugh McElhenny to the Packer 28. Four plays later, Smith ran over from the five. Starr didn't wait long, scoring from 78 yards away in 9 plays. After Carpenter made 8, Starr hit Dowler for 15 and then McGee for 23. After three running plays, Starr hurled 13 yards to McGee for 23 to the 13 from where Horning faked a pass on a right end run and then scrambled in for the touchdown. Horning's point made it 14-7 with only 50 seconds gone in the second period.

SCORE IN 55 SECONDS

After Davis and McGee each punted twice, the Packers started a touchdown drive from 62 yards out with only 55 seconds in the half. Starr really got miserly with the time. He hurled 15 yards to Knafelc to start it and then ran off three plays in 14 seconds, including two out of bounds passes for 14 yards to Jim Taylor. With 30 seconds left, Carpenter ran to the right for 11 to the 22. Starr tried one more pass before the inevitable field goal try and presto, it worked. Knafelc, on a fine catch, took the pass away from two 49ers for the touchdown. Horning's kick, with 14 seconds left in the half, tied the score at 14-up...The Bays scored the next three times they had their hands on the ball in the third period, not counting the safety. Bob Freeman nailed Len Lyles on the 49er six on the second half kickoff. The 49ers moved to the 10 in two plays, but on third and four Forester broke through and caught Tittle in the end zone for the safety and a 16-14 lead. The Bays got the ball right back on the free kick and they moved 66 yards in four plays to score. Behind a good block by Fred Thurston, Carpenter ran 26 yards and then Horning rank to his right, faked a pass, and wheeled 38 yards to the 2. After Horning lost one at the left, he ran the right side for the touchdown and kicked the point for 23-14. Tittle, rushed when hit by Bill Quinlan, threw to the right, and Symank intercepted, returning 17 yards to the 49er 18...Horning made 8 and Starr got three when somebody forgot to take the ball. After Horning lost 3, Dowler made a knee high catch of Starr's pass in the end zone. Horning hit the point and it was 30-14. Tittle got the 49ers moving deep into Packer territory, but, on a first down run, Roberts, apparently changing the ball from one arm to the other, fumbled. Whittenton grabbed the ball out of his arms and returned 46 yards to the 49er 31. Carpenter and Horning moved 11 yards in three trips to the 20. The Bays went to the fourth down to make a first down, with Carpenter making two on the final play of the period to the 9. Horning then ran 7 to the 2-yard line and then ran over Woodson for the touchdown. Bob St. Clair blocked the extra point try so it was 36-14. After the 49ers lost the ball on downs on the Packer 10, Starr froze the ball for the last eight and a half minutes of the game. He ran off 17 plays in moving from the Bay 10 to the 49er 15 when the gun sounded. He completed five passes along the way, one each to

HORNUNG IS POINT KING

DEC 13 (Philadelphia) - Paul Hornung, the Packers' all-purpose halfback, Sunday won the NFL scoring title with 94 points, four more than Giants' kicking ace, Pat Summerall. Hornung scored three touchdowns and kicked four extra points in Sunday's 36-14 win over the 49ers.

OFFENSE PLEASES VINCE MOST

DEC 13 (San Francisco) - Vince Lombardi, head coach of the Packers, said Sunday that "determination" was the difference between this year's 7-5 record and the 1-10-1 mark of last season. "We played with determination today as we have all season," Lombardi said in the dressing room after the 36-14 win over San Francisco. "It's a great feeling, I can tell you." Lombardi said he had set no goal at the beginning of the season as to the number of games his team should win. "We had one rookie come through for us big - Boyd Dowler. And we got some good men in trades. Lew Carpenter, Fred Thurston and Henry Jordan," Lombardi said. Asked what his team needed to improve to the championship, Lombardi

replied: "It's hard to say. We need a lot. We're not the Colts yet by any means, although our best game of the year was the one we played against Baltimore. We got beat, 28-24. The most satisfying thing about the season had been to know I can coach a team that can score some points," the bespectacled head coach said in answer to another question. "We were slow reacting early in the game and were only partially blocking," Lombardi said, explaining the 49ers' early 14-0 lead. "But we stayed right in there." Assistant Coach Phil Bengtson, who scouted the 49ers for whom he once coached, said the Green Bay team had surprised him. "We have a good line but we are not very deep," Bengtson said. "We have great linebackers in Tom Bettis, Bill Forester and Dan Currie. The 49ers scared us with their speed early in the game. We didn't know if we could contain them. There was nothing wrong with the 49ers today. Our kids just outplayed them, that's all." Asked to what he credited the improvement in the Packers over last year, Bengtson replied: "Coaching is number one. Vince is a great coach. And we also have better personnel than we are given credit for. We have some fine football players - but we don't have very many of them." Quarterback Bart Starr, who had a tremendous day with 20 completions in 25 attempts for 249 yards, was

Philadelphia —(AP)— Paul Hornung of the Green Bay Packers won the National Football league scoring title for 1959 Sunday when he scored 22 points in the Packers' 36-14 victory over the San Francisco 49ers.

Hornung, a former Notre Dame star converted into an all - purpose halfback this season, scored three touchdowns and kicked four extra points in his big day to wind up with 94 points to overhaul the New York Giants' ace kicker, Pat Summerall. Summerall kicked a field goal and three conversions to finish the season with 90.

full of praise for all the Packers. "That protection was beautiful...tremendous," said Starr. "Jim Ringo and Forrest Gregg are all-pros for sure. All those boys up front are great. And there were some nice grabs of passes, too." Asked about the quick 14-0 lead the 49ers took, he replied: "We didn't think too much about it. They sprung it on us so quickly we didn't have a chance to think about it." Starr said "the 49ers had a good secondary defense, but we didn't change much of our strategy. The passes we thought would go, did go. The coaching staff did a fine job of scouting them." Forester, who was outstanding on defense and tackled quarterback Y.A. Tittle in the end zone for a Packer safety, said: "The line was giving us linebackers holes. The 49ers seemed to let down a little after their first jump but they were still tough. They have still got a lot of offense. But I didn't think their passing was as good as it had been. However, those two in the backfield (J.D. Smith and C.R. Roberts) have sure got good speed." In contrast to the cheering and shouting in the Packer dressing room, the 49ers dressed silently and answered questions laconically. "We just got beat," said head coach Red Hickey. "You can't be kicked around like that and come out of it happy." Hickey said he thought the Packers have a great offensive line. "Starr had all day to pass. We never did get across the line of scrimmage against him. I don't think we touched him all afternoon."

BART STARR'S STOCK SOARS IN WEST, PACKERS EAGER FOR '60!

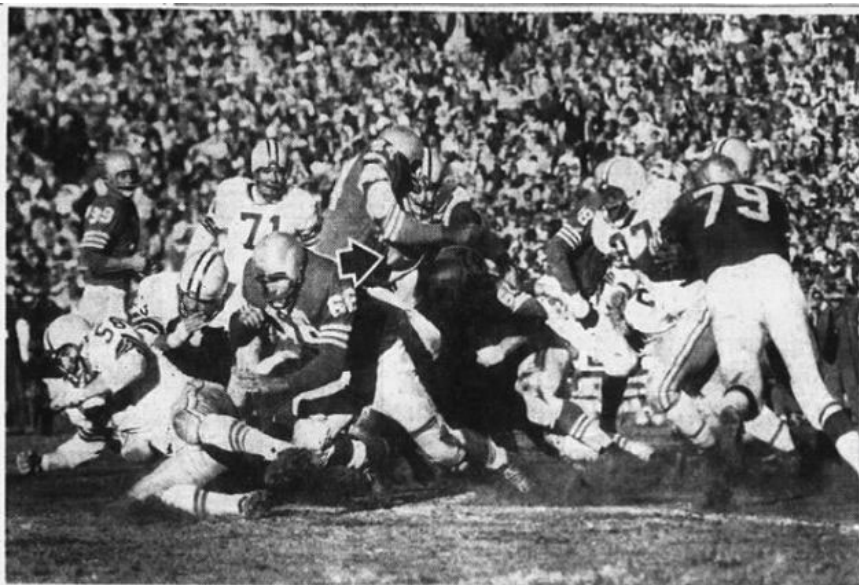
DEC 14 (San Francisco-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - A couple of kids tried to get through the gates leading to the dressing room after the Packer-49er game. They apparently wanted Y.A. Tittle's autograph because the cop guarding the gate barked at them: "You don't want Tittle's autograph, you want Starr's." The story of Bart Starr - not to mention his performance, was starting to hit in places other than Packerland. And, in the Packer dressing room, Packer coach Vince Lombardi have the Bays' "surprise" quarterback every bit of praise. "He was brilliant," Lombardi said, "and he just called that game most of the time when he got

to the line of scrimmage. He changed signals on the line of scrimmage just about every play. His passing was great. I guess he had only five incompletions out of 20." Gary Knafelc was Starr beaming, too: "He's my roommate, and I'm his biggest booster, right now he's the best in the league to Unitas. And he's getting tough in the huddle, too. He tells us to shut up when it's necessary." You got the impression that Starr was just finding holes in the 49er defense and moving through them as he pleased. He kept the ball for 66 plays against the 49ers' 49. The Bays averaged 7.26 yards per play. The big feeling in the Packer dressing room went like this. Spoken by Hank Gremminger: "Why do we have to quit playing now. We're just rolling. Wait'll next year." Jim Ringo said before the game: "This is the first time since I've been in Green Bay that the guys



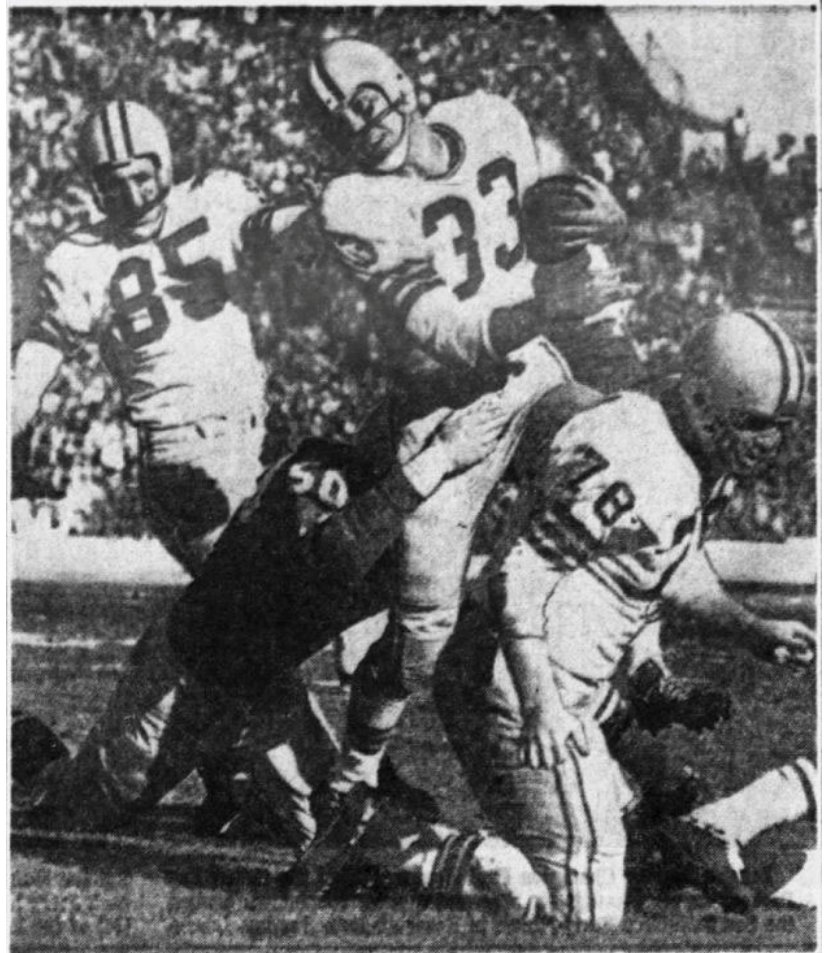

are talking about next year." Lombardi was happy that it was all over. It was a long grind and the season actually started for him when he took over the club last winter. "But I certainly am happy with the way the boys came through. As I said last week, this is beyond all expectations." Red Hickey, coach of the 49ers, was high in his praise of the Packers and "particularly that offensive line. We didn't get across the line of scrimmage once all day - much less get our hands on Starr. Your line handled us as the figures show. Twenty-seven first downs and 20 completions out of 27 passes." Hickey pointed out to this writer and several San Francisco scribed, "We just got beat outright, that's all there was to it. The fact that the Colts beat the Rams (knocking the 49ers out of a title chance) didn't have a thing to do with it. We had a chance to get a good slug of second pace money by winning and besides we've got a lot of pride." Everybody agreed that the 49ers were battling all the way - as they did in the 21-20 game in Green Bay. That's what made this such a juicy victory. The Packers not only had to overcome a 14-point spot; they had to beat down the 49ers...Starr received the game ball. He said it will be his most prized possession...The Bays had themselves a party after the game at the Sheraton Palace and Dave Hanner was given a trophy for outstanding play. It was a plaster statue of a football player - wearing No. 79, of course...The Packers are due to arrive in their United Airlines charter at 7:55 tonight. Capt. Don (Bud) Smith, who piloted Packer flights for the season, will guide the club home for the final flight of the season. The team was scheduled to leave here at 1 o'clock this afternoon, Green Bay time. Five Packers were named to the Pro Bowl team - Paul Hornung, Jim Ringo, Bill Forester, Forrest Gregg and Emlen Tunnell. Coach Lombardi announced the selections at the player party. Lou Perini, president and owner of the Braves, arrived at the Palace Hotel Sunday night from southern California. He saw the Packer game on TV and said he was "thrilled with their victory. I only hope we can have this kind of joy at the end of our season out here."

Over 50 Firms, Groups Brighten Pack Return

OVER 50 FIRMS, GROUPS BRIGHTEN PACK RETURN

DEC 14 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - When the Minute Men called a breakfast meeting last Wednesday to plan a Welcome Home for the Packers, some 50 men representing organizations and business firms in the community turned out. The group decided to present the Packer players and coaches with the official Packer blanket, which have been used here for such occasions in the past. Chairman John Somerville forthwith appointed a finance committee to raise the necessary funds. Volunteers were called for, and before the meeting adjourned those present had subscribed enough for 32 of the blankets. The other funds for putting on the welcome were in hand by Thursday. It was just another demonstration of the wide community support for the Packers, the kind of support that has kept Green Bay in the major professional league since its

inception. A total of 14 organizations in Green Bay and De Pere plus 40 business firms and individuals contributed to the fund for tonight's demonstration. The official Packer blankets were designed by George Bertrand a number of years ago. They are green with gold bordering and bearing the lettering Green Bay Packers and a large football. They are reserved for special occasions like this and are not available for public sale.

GOING TO PACK HOMECOMING? START EARLY

DEC 14 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Persons driving to the Packer Welcome Home celebration at Austin Straubel Field tonight should get there early because of the traffic. The Packers chartered airliner is scheduled to land at 7:55 p.m., but the St. Norbert College band will start playing at 7:15 to entertain early arrivals. City and county police will be out in force to move the traffic. Civil Defense Auxiliary Police will report to the airport at 6:30 to handle parking. Those attending the demonstration will park on the grassy area west of the entrance road. The parking lot near the terminal will be reserved for regular North Central passengers. The public is asked not to call the airport of North Central to check on the plane's arrival time. The switchboards must be reserved for regular business calls. Should arrival time be changed materially, announcements will be carried on all radio and TV stations. Packer wives and families will meet at the Leithold Aviation Co. office at the east end of the terminal to be given a place of honor near the stage. The F. Hurlbut Co. is contributing three large flatbed trucks to form a stage. Arena Manager Jocko Braley is arranging for the platform and spotlighting. A large address system is being installed. Sirens of all police cars will open up when the plane lands. Fireworks had to be cancelled because of the fire hazard at the airport. Pilot Don (Bud) Smith will bank the Packer plane around the field several times so the players get a look at the huge crowd.
