GREEN BAY DEFEATS PIRATES, SCORE 47-0

Packers Run Wild for Impressive Victory Before 4,000 Fans

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(GREEN BAY) - Pittsburgh's football players probably wish they had spent Sunday in the comparative peace of the Pennsylvania coal mine strike district where they throw bombs around for excitement. They couldn't have gotten into more trouble in the strike zone than they experienced here when they tried to stop Green Bay's football team in a National league game at the City Stadium. The crowd was held to 4,000 because of threatening weather. The Packers were hot - hotter than they have been in a long time. Everything they tried worked like a charm, and when 60 minutes of play, part of that time in a slow drizzling rain, was over, the score was Green Bay 47, Pittsburgh 0 - the most one-sided score the Packers ever have run up in National league competition.

DO EVERYTHING WELL

Pittsburgh looked good for the first few minutes. But that was all. After that it was the Packers and the invaders never had a chance. It was only a question of how big a score the Packers would run up. The Green Bay men threw forward passes and laterals, swept around the ends and cracked through the line with equal success. It was a day in which everything they did worked. The team clicked - and when a Bay team clicks, it goes to town in no uncertain course. The invaders tried everything in a vain attempt to stop Green Bay. They passed from every angle, hoping to connect to score at least one touchdown, but always a Green Bay player, or many players, covered the receivers. When the Pittsburgh team did complete a forward pass, it was only a short gain and the easterners never were beyond the Packer 30 yard line. Most of the time they had their backs to the wall, putting up as stubborn a defense as possible against an inspired team. They were game and never quit trying, but they were fighting a hopeless cause. Coach E.L. Lambeau sent in every available man and all went good. There was not an outstanding star in this ball fame, it was a victory that belongs to the entire team. All had something to do that gave him a place in the spotlight.

BLOCKING IS GOOD

The Packers blocked better than they have on any other occasions this year. When they swept around the ends, three men led the interference and took out everyone who got in their way. When they cut over the guards or tackles, it was the same.

SELLING BEAR TICKETS

Tickets for the Packer-Bear game in Chicago next Sunday are on sale at the Green Bay Football Corp. headquarters in the Columbus Community club building. The Packer ticket office will be open daily this week from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. The Green Bay sale of Bear game tickets will close late Friday.

The assignments were carried out to perfection and all the ball carriers had to do was to find a hole. Pittsburgh put up a determined defense in the first few minutes and they felt each other out as punts were exchanged. But before the game was ten minutes old the Packers began to punch. They played right down the field from the 50 and had a score. After that they added three touchdowns in the second period, turned in two in the third and one in the fourth quarter. Buster Mott started the march after Grove had recovered a fumble. He swept around the end to make it first down on the Pirates' 31. Hinkle, Mott and Monnett carried it to the 15-yard mark and Grove passed to Dilweg for a first down on the nine-yard line. Monnett added eight yards on a smash over right tackle and Hinkle picked a hole in center for a touchdown. Monnett kicked the goal and the Packers led, 7 to 0.

RACE AROUND END

The rest of the game was much like the first touchdown. The Packers would get the ball, march down the field and score. They would throw in passes to draw out the backs. Then they would hit the line for gains. In the second period Monnett broke around right end and then behind fine blocking by Herber, Hinkle and Comstock raced to the 22-yard line, where he stumbled and was pinned. The Packers lost the ball on downs, however, and Pittsburgh got it, punting out. Again the Packers started, this time with passes to Goldenberg, the first from Monnett and the second from Herber, put the ball on the 19-yard line. Monnett got loose to carry the ball to the six-yard line. Goldenberg was held for no gain, but Monnett got loose again, and smashed over left tackle for a touchdown. Monnett failed to convert from placement. A few moments later after the Pirates had completed a pass to put the ball on the Packer 41-yard line. Westfall tried another pass, and this time Buckets Goldenberg cut over to the right, picked it out of the air and started a race down the north sidelines. He sped down the field with three men at his heels. Two he outraced, a third, Kemp, a big tackle, nearly caught him on the 15-yard line, but Lavvie Dilweg, running with him for interference, checked his speed, smashed into Kemp, blocking him out of the play, to let Goldenberg continue unmolested to the goal. Grove then kicked for the extra point and the Packers led, 20 to 0.

GOLDBERG GOES OVER

Near the end of the half Monnett passed to Herber to put the ball on the 15-yard line. Herber then tossed another pass, this one to Englemann and the halfback ran to the two-yard line before he was downed. Buckets hit the line and it was another touchdown. Monnett's kick was good and the half ended with Green Bay in the lead, 27 to 0. The second play of the second half produced another touchdown. The Packers received the kick. Bruder took the ball on a weak side play. He found a wide hole made by Dilweg, Quatse and Evans, plowed through it and continued to run. The Pittsburgh backs were eluded by the faststepping Hank and he continued to run, going 52 yards for a touchdown. Herber then dropkicked for the extra point, and it was 34-0.

ON ONE-YARD LINE

In the same period Monnett returned a punt from his own 43 to the Pitt 24-yard line. Herber then passed to Dilweg for a first down on the 12. Monnett went around and behind perfect interference and it was another touchdown. Englemann's kick from placement failed. In the final period the Packers added their last touchdown and it was Englemann who scored. The play started as a forward pass from the Pittsburgh 49-yard line. It went from Herber to Monnett for the first stage. Monnett waited until Englemann came up from behind, then tossed a lateral to the latter and Englemann raced down the field for the score. Monnett added the extra point with a placekick. And when the game ended a few minutes later the Packers again had the ball on the Pirates' one-yard line.

PACKER GAME SIDELIGHTS

OCT 16 (Green Bay) - Rain that started to fall shortly before game time cut the crowd. Those that attended got their money's worth of wide open football and spectacular plays. Off and on during the fray it drizzled but to the fans it was just another one of those things and didn't dampen their ardor...Ben Smith got a laugh out of the crowd when he handed the ball back to one of the officials after it had gone out of bounds on the north side. The player reached around from back of the official and plunked the oval into the latter's stomach causing that worthy to grunt...There was dead silence when it was announced over the public address systems that Molesworth of the Bears had galloped some 65 yards for a touchdown in the game against the Chicago Cardinals. A hearty cheer arose when the announcer followed with: "But the Bears were offside and the play didn't count."...Monnett did some fancy stepping on his first run for more than 20 yards when he pranced along the sidelines but kept his footing and stayed within the field. He had excellent blocking all along the line but was finally dragged down when he lost his balance...The Fond du Lac drum corps paraded between halves and was given quite a hand for its maneuvers. The men were dressed in gold colored jackets, white trousers and black boots, set off with flashing helmets...Two little boys were standing near the hamburger tent on the southeast side of the grounds when the Pittsburgh team filed back on the field for the second half. "Why don't youse Pirates fight?" one of them asked. Several of the players grinned but no one answered the query...Buckets Goldenberg, as usual, did excellent work. The Milwaukee boy will be able to but the City Hall for a song if he keep up. His pass interception and long run for a touchdown was spectacular. For a huge athlete Buckets handles himself with the skill of a Pavlowa and the crushing impressiveness of a box car...Hinkle's drive over the line for the first touchdown was a power play that was a pretty thing to see. The former Bucknell star slashed into the pile of linemen and through for the counter with plenty of yardage to spare...Cal Hubbard still knows his football. One of the Packer kickoffs went sailing down the field but Pittsburgh was technically at fault and the officials were about to rule another kick. "Wait a minute," the towering tackle bellowed. "How much time is there left?" he asked. When told the number of remaining minutes he agreed to another kick. The Pirates were penalized five yards and the game went on. Cal always has the rule book in his mind, and officials have to explain it to his satisfaction before there can be a penalty against the Green Bay team...Bob Monnett flashed to the front with a brilliant performance. The former Michigan State back turned in some nifty open field running. He carried the ball 15 times, gaining 93 yards, or an average of 6.2 yards per run...Some great blocking on the part of Comstock, Herber and Hinkle paved the way for a 31 yard run by Monnett early in the game. They cleared the way around right end, taking out three men cleanly...Mike Michalske turned in the greatest block of the day when he took out tow men with one terrific lunge to let Hinkle make a substantial gain...Buster Mott had to retire early in the game when he injured an ankle. He is expected to be in shape in a few days, however...Dilweg and Smith saw most of the service at wings. Both were impressive, catching passes and on defense. Bruder figured only in a few plays. He scored a touchdown on a 52 yard run but became nauseated and had to leave the game.

LAMBEAU IMPRESSED WITH PACKER BLOCKING

OCT 16 (Green Bay) - There was much to savor for me in Sunday's decisive victory over Pittsburgh. More than anything else, however, was the blocking. When I mention blocking I don't only mean that done in the open by the backs but particularly that done in the close by the linemen. The cross blocking in our line Sunday was some of the best I have ever seen the Packers do, and explains largely perhaps why everything worked so well. As an example of blocking, I mention there was that 67-yard run of Buckets Goldenberg after he had intercepted a pass. As Buckets sped along the north sidelines he picked up a fan of interference that cleared the way for him beautifully and enabled him to cross the goal without a Pittsburgh man even close. Cross blocking in the line was at its best when Bob Monnett scored a touchdown from the seven-yard line in the second quarter. I saw that play coming and it was a pleasure to watch the left side of our line work it to perfection. Monnett started at right end but cut back. Our end smacked in and pushed their guard toward the center of the line. The tackle took care of their tackle and sent him out. This not only let Monnett cross the line standing up but opened a hole big enough for the other backs who led interference for him to cruise through. The Packers were "on" Sunday, and I

liked the way they hit. I have been naked whether it was good policy to "shoot the works" in such a game as this, particularly in view of next Sunday's meeting with the Bears in Chicago. I think it was, for several reasons. It didn't hurt a bit to run up that score on the Pirates. First of all the Packers never have much in the way of scrimmage through the week and here was an opportunity for them to cut loose. I am satisfied and the score shows that the plays clicked pretty well. Secondly, it must be taken for granted that a loafing team lays itself open to injuries. The Packers couldn't ease up without risking trouble. They had to be tense. Thirdly, Bob Monnett found himself in this game. Monnett finally has recovered from an early ankle injury and turned in some sweet running here Sunday. You can't keep that boy down. In my opinion the Packers will be well set for the Bears next Sunday.

GREEN BAY POINTS FOR GAME AGAINST BEARS IN CHICAGO

OCT 17 (Green Bay) - Green Bay's Packers began intensive practice work again today, pointing for Sunday's game in Chicago against the Bears. It will be the second battle of the year between the two teams, the Chicagoans having eked out a 14 to 7 victory in the closing minutes of the contest here a few weeks ago. The Packers believe Sunday's game will be a turning point in the National league race. Chicago's Bears are out in front with four victories and the Packers are two games behind. A defeat for the Chicagoans would put the Green Bay team only one game behind the leaders and within easy striking distance. Spurred on by two victories in the games here with Portsmouth and Pittsburgh, and the memory of that last minute defeat at the hands of the Bears, the Packers will be out to win Sunday, and win decisively...

IN FAIR SHAPE: The Packers came out of Sunday's game with Pittsburgh in fair shape. Hank Bruder is laid up with a severe case of intestinal fly, but is expected to be in shape for Sunday. Buster Mott, halfback, has broke a small bone in the lower part of his left leg according to Dr. W.W. Kelly, club physician, and will be out of action for three or four weeks. After an x-ray yesterday the leg was placed in a cast. Quarterback Johnny Blood spent Monday in St. Mary's Hospital, his hand infected, but expected to leave that institution today and probably will rejoin the squad later this week. Grove and Herber handled the quarterback assignment without difficulty last Sunday, but Blood's experience is expected to prove valuable in the Bear game. The work of Bob Monnett was particularly pleasing Sunday, and he showed that he may be depended upon for regular service during the rest of the season. Monnett's slices through the tackles were executed perfectly, and several of his dashes paved the way to touchdowns...

EXPECT BITTER BATTLE: In contrast to Sunday's wide open contest, the Packers are expecting another bitter defensive tilt at Wrigley Field, and the Green Bay line is being treated accordingly this week. The Bears have developed a disturbing tendency to rally this year, as displayed against the Packers, and as recently as last Sunday against the Cardinals. Special excursions will be offered at railroads and buses to Chicago and a large crowd is expected to follow the team. The Northwestern and Milwaukee roads are offering round trip rates for the weekend, and the Packer management expects hundreds, or perhaps thousands of fans, to be on hand from Wisconsin at Chicago.

NAME FOUR OFFICIALS

OCT 17 (Columbus, OH) - At the insistence of the Green Bay Football corporation, Joe F. Carr, NFL president, has appointed four officials for Sunday's Packer-Bear game at Chicago, he announced today. Bobby Cahn, Chicago, will referee and he will be assisted by the following men: Gordon McNutt, Milwaukee, umpire; Wildred Smith, Chicago, head linesman, and George Laurie, Chicago, field hudge. Several National league clubs have requested that four officials be appointed for their major games, and indications are that President Carr will follow this policy.

PRESNELL SETS SCORING PACE IN PRO LOOP

OCT 17 (Columbus) - Although Glenn Presnell, Portsmouth quarterback, continues to lead the National league scoring race, he has found a new rival in Charles (Buckets) Goldenberg, Green Bay fullback, official statistics released today reveal. Goldenberg scored two touchdowns against Pittsburgh Sunday, and now trails the Portsmouth star by three points. Presnell's three field goals, six extra points and two touchdowns for 27 points assure him the league leadership for at least another week. Third place is held by Ken Strong of New York, with 21 points, and fourth is a three way tie between Dade Burnett, New York, Shipwreck Kelly, Brooklyn, and Bo Molenda, New York. BAYS AT PEAK FOR TILT WITH CHICAGO BEARS

OCT 17 (Milwaukee Sentinel) - Following of the program hereabouts will again get a piece de resistance on their football menu Sunday when the Chicago Bears and Green Bay Packers play their second game of the season at

Wrigley Field. In an earlier game, at Green Bay, the Bears scored twice in the final four minutes of play to win, 14 to 7, but if they think they are going to get away with a duplicate this week they're going to be shaken - rudely so. Right now the Bays are hitting in top form. The line defensive play has been superb all season and in the last two games its offensive play has been almost as good. The same holds good with the offensive play of the backs. Right now the carriers run as if they meant it and the backs, as a whole, are the best blocking set the Bays have ever had...In Hinkle and Goldenberg, the Bays have two great fullbacks. Buckets, in college, was noted primarily as a blocker, but after watching that boy lug the leather for Lambeau & Co., the belief arises his abilities were not taken advantage of in college. Sunday, at the Bay, Buckets executed more perfect blocks than it has ever been my pleasure to see a single man turn in. Time and again he'd take tacklers - would-be tacklers out of the way with a resounding smack. And the victims would go the way of all flesh, pick themselves up, look around to see where the army mule came from and shake their heads, wiser and sadder...Speaking of blocks, it would be interesting to know what Paul Moss, all-American end from Purdue, thinks of the pro blocking. Paul was in the game practically all the way and saw most of it from his rumble seat. Evidently Paul and Buckets don't care for the same kind of hot chocolate. Buckets was giving Paul a plenty all afternoon and on one Pirate punt nailed his rival with a dilly of a block. Paul got up and Buckets gave chase and was just about to let 'er go again when Paul smacked him one on the well-known Buckets' schnozzle. But right then and there the officials broke up the personal warfare and warned both to cut out the rough stuff. And did Buckets foam and froth for the next few minutes?...One of the most pleasing things to my point of view was the fine play of Wuert Englemann, the South Dakota jackrabbit. All season it appeared that Wuert was pressing - trying too hard - and was off his game. Sunday he was the Wuert of old. He made no less than a half a dozen tackles in the open, thrice after kicking off, and one when a Pirate ball carrier got away from Herber and was headed for a touchdown. He also carried the ball with his old vim, vigor and vitality, and, in addition, showed more blocking ability than at any previous time with the Bays. If Wuert has returned to the form of two years ago it will be just that more sugar in Curly's cup - for Wuert, when right, is just the type of backs that is letter perfect against certain teams and certain defenses...Football's a funny game. The Pirates' lineup was studded with stars. FRIEDMAN, NEWMAN BATTLING HERBER FOR PASS HONORS

OCT 18 (New York) - A couple of quarterbacks who were all-America selections in their college days at Michigan, Benny Friedman and Harry Newman, are waging a close fight with Arnold Herber for the lead in forward passing in the NFL. Newman, in five games with the New York Giants, has completed 17 passes in 39 attempts for a gain of 353 yards while Herber, Green Bay star, has completed 27 in 57 for 371 yards. Friedman, now with the Brooklyn Dodgers, has a higher average than either of his rivals, completing nine out of 11 for a gain of 165 yards, but has played in only two games. Paul Moss, former Purdue end now with Pittsburgh, and Luke Johnsos of the Chicago Bears sets the pace as pass receivers. Each has caught nine, Johnsos for a gain of 153 yards and Moss for 143. Cliff Battles, former West Virginia Wesleyan flash, and Jim Musick, of Southern California, furnish two big reasons why the Boston Redskins have outgained all rivals. Battles has gained 447 yards while Musick with 273 is his closest rival. Joe Lillard of the Chicago Cardinals and Ace Gutowsky of Portsmouth, are next with 238 yards.

MUCH MORE SCORING

OCT 18 (Columbus, OH) - The new NFL playing rules adopted in the interest of opening up the game are having the desired effect. Moving the goal posts back to the goal line and permitting forward passing at any point up to the scrimmage line has resulted in more field goals, more scoring and less tie games. Only one game in the twenty so far played in the major grid circuit has resulted in a tie, whereas last fall the percentage was about one in every three finishing in a deadlock. Field goal kicking has returned so markedly that nine three-pointers have been kicked. Last fall only three were made during the entire schedule of more than 50 games. In point scoring there is also a marked increase, fully 50 percent more points being registered now than at the same stage a year ago. There have been 471 points made in 20 games...TEAM HONORS SPLIT UP: Four clubs share the lead in team statistics. The Boston Redskins, by gaining 1,190 yards, have shown the most powerful offense, while the Portsmouth Spartans, by holding their rivals to 619 yards in five games, have the strongest defensive mark. At point getters the New York Giants with 116 are leading the circuit. The Green Bay Packers with 36 completed forward passes in 70 tosses have the best aerial record.

DOERING WILL RETURN TO BEAR DRILLS TODAY

OCT 19 (Chicago) - With Bull Doehring, who was on the hospital list last week, ready for action against the Green Bay Packers Sunday afternoon the Bears' forward passing attack is expected to function at top speed. Doehring twisted his ankle in a practice game in Washington, but has been taking daily treatment. With the swelling gone he planned to join practice today. The news that Doehring will be available and the acquisition of Dick Stahlman brought a note of cheer into the Bear camp. They will be at full strength for the return engagement with the Packers. Coaches Halas and Walquist are looking for means to end Herber's success with passes. A large part of the Packers' yardage this year is directly traceable to Herber's arm. A slow start against the fast starting Packers would complicate matters, in the opinion of Bear coaches. In previous Bear-Packer rivalries the team which scored first generally has won. In 18 of their 27 games, the winner's score was only a touchdown better than that of the losers. Stahlman, a former Packers, was in uniform yesterday and went through the regular drill. He is 28 years old, is 6 feet, 2 inches tall and weighs 220 pounds. He started in the pro game with Pottsville in 1925 and the next year divided his time between Rock Island and the Chicago Bulls, which were members of the American league. Stahlman played for New York in 1927 and was also a member of the Wilkes-Barre basketball team. In 1928-29, he was on the Cleveland baseball roster. He played football the last three years with Green Bay and in baseball with Newark and Reading. Coach Halas will use Stahlman as a halfback.

INJURIES AND ILLNESS HIT PACKER TEAM

OCT 19 (Green Bay) - With the squad in excellent mental but only fair physical shape, Coach E.L. Lambeau and the Green Bay Packers headed for Chicago today for the 28th renewal of the National league's most traditional rivalry with the Bears at Wrigley Field Sunday. Henry Bruder, dubbed "Hard-Luck Hank" at Northwestern University because of his ability to pick up ailments at most inconvenient times, still is confined to his bed with a touch of intestinal flu, and it is doubtful whether he will be able to appear in uniform Sunday, let alone start the contest. Johnny Blood, who was suspended last week for breaking Packer rules, had been restored to good graces and is back in togs, ready to go against the Bears. Arnold Herber who was banged up a bit is expected to be in shape to play but Claude Perry, who injured his leg last Sunday may not be able to start. He had been missing from drills this week because of the injury...HANGURSKI WILL PLAY: Clark Hinkle, Packer fullback, will enter the game with a wary eye cast on the backfield, as Bronko Nagurski, injured in a collision with Clark Hinkle at Green Bay several weeks ago, will be back in the regular lineup, Nagurski's face was disarranged and the line of his nose re-routed, necessitating several weeks' rest. The Bears' line has been strengthened considerably for Sunday's tilt. Burt Pearson, veteran center who also was injured at Green Bay, finally is ready for more action, lifting part

of the pivot burden from Ookie Miller. Oookie has been in the thick of the fight since Pearson was hauled to the bench in the Packers game, and will welcome the return of his partner. Richard Stahlman, Packer tackle of championship days, has been signed by the Bears and will make his first appearance with the Chicago team Sunday. Stahlman is well versed in Packer plays, and his presence in the contest may make it necessary for the Bays to dip into a huddle when formulating their attack...PLEASED WITH MONNETT: Coach Lambeau did not conceal his pleasure at Bob Monnett's fine showing last Sunday. Despite the fact that Pittsburgh's team proved unexpectedly weak, the flashy halfback turned in a brilliant performance, and Lambeau hopes that the Packer line will shake him loose for a few dashes Sunday afternoon. Mike Michalske, who has played guard ever since joining the Packers several seasons ago, was shifted to the backfield in yesterday's drill, and showed up well. Mike played fullback during his undergraduate days at Penn State, and is an excellent passer, getting plenty of distance on his tosses, and backs up the line in great shape on defense. Larry Bettencourt has been working hard in practice, and the new center is certain to share the pivot assignment with Bultman and Sarafiny Sunday. Sarafiny also has been drilled at tackle this week, to replace Perry if the latter is unable to play. Odds slightly favor the Bears. Fans have not forgotten the first meeting of the teams this year when the Packers, after leading for three periods, crumpled in the last minutes of play to permit two touchdowns and a Bear victory. The 14 to 7 decision proved lucky for the Bears, who have not dropped a game since. For the Packers, the contest has taken on a crucial nature, as the Bears rest undefeated atop the National league circuit while the Bays, tripped by New York and the Bears and tied by Boston must win Sunday to remain in the pennant race.

GIANTS LEAD IN SCORING

OCT 19 (Columbus, OH) - The New York Giants by virtue of their overwhelming 56 to 0 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles last Sunday continue to lead the pack in the NFL's team scoring race. The Giants have tallied 116 points against their opponents, being the only team to have counted over 100 units. The Green Bay Packers are in second place with a scoring record of 85 points. Defensively, the Brooklyn Dodgers with only ten points scored against them in two game, lead the league, although the record of the Chicago Bears with only 16 points against them in four games is more impressive.

GIANTS BEST SCORERS

OCT 11 (Columbus, OH) - Having played four league games, the New York Giants are setting the pace in the pro league's scoring race with 60 points. Opponents of the New York eleven are credited with 47. Boston with 49 and Portsmouth with 45 follow in the point scoring table. Cincinnati in two games has failed to chalk up a point. Defensively the Chicago Bears have the best record as the Windy City Bruins have been scored on only once, that being the touchdown and the extra point chalked up by the Green Bay Packers several weeks ago.

Champion Green Bay Team***

OCTOBER 20 (Green Bay) - If there is any gang of Conservation Camp soldiers anywhere in the United States that wants a football game with the team from Camp Elcho at Summit Lake, let them first read this. The team up there is called "The Packers". Its squad consisted of a first, second and third team and a number of not uniformed second stringers. The uniforms are the best that money can buy. Or that is they once were. The headguards may be uncomfortable and the shoes might not

be perfect fits, because they're somebody else's shoes. But the blue and gold sweaters, and the high hipped gridiron kickers - there's a story to them; tradition, they're battle scarred and glory covered. Lavvie Dilweg's big "22" is poison again to shortlegged safety men receiving punts, and it screams out "throw it to me" as it is seen kangarooing over, into and through the enemy camp to bob up behind them and near the goal line. A big high school kid from far up north is wearing it again. He was an end at high school. He's a foot taller than anybody in Camp Elcho so he didn't have to roll the pants up or turn the sleeves under...WANTS TO BE CAPTAIN: "Don't you think I oughtta be captain," a broad shouldered wrestler-legged kid from Iron County asked Lieut. D.V. Johnson, the camp commanders, a West Pointer and the coach. "Ya see, I got Curly Lambeau's sweater and No. 1 on it and everything and I ain't bad at kickin' points after and all that..." "Point after what?" the coach-commander growled. "The captain should be more concerned about his team getting the first six, instead of himself getting the seventh one. But criticizing the coach doesn't work up at Camp Elcho, and any suggestions for a change in management would also be unpopular. The coach can be removed only after court material and for good and sufficient cause far beyond his tactical errors on the recreation field...EXPRESSES THANKS: Coach-Commander-Lieutenant Johnson wrote Coach Lambeau: "I cannot sufficiently express my appreciation or the thanks of my men. We certainly cannot repay you ever, but you have made at least 200 more rabid Packer fans. The large amount of equipment useful to us,

OCTOBER 20 (Green Bay) - With the squad in excellent mental but only fair physical shape, Coach E.L. Lambeau and the Green Bay Packers headed for Chicago today for the 28th renewal of the National league's most traditional rivalry with the Bears at Wrigley Field Sunday. Henry Bruder, dubbed "Hard-Luck Hank" at Northwestern University because of his ability to pick up ailments at most inconvenient times, still is confined to his bed with a touch of intestinal flu, and it is doubtful whether he will be able to appear in uniform Sunday, let alone start the contest. Johnny Blood, who was suspended last week for breaking Packer rules, had been restored to good graces and is back in togs, ready to go against the Bears. Arnold Herber who was banged up a bit is expected to be in shape to play but Claude Perry, who injured his leg last Sunday may not be able to start. He had been missing from drills this week because of the injury. Clark Hinkle, Packer fullback, will enter the game with a wary eye cast on the Bear backfield, as Bronko Nagurski, injured in a collision with Hinkle at Green Bay several weeks ago, will be back in the regular lineup, Nagurski's face was disarranged and the line of his nose re-routed, necessitating several weeks' rest. The Bears' line has been strengthened considerably for Sunday's tilt. Burt Pearson, veteran center who also was injured at Green Bay, finally is ready for more action, lifting part of the pivot burden from Ookie Miller. Ookie has been in the thick of the fight since Pearson was hauled to the bench in the Packers game, and will welcome the return of his partner. Richard Stahlman, Packer tackle of championship days, has been signed by the Bears and will make his first appearance with the Chicago team Sunday. Stahlman is well versed in Packer plays, and his presence in the contest may make it necessary for the Bays to dip into a huddle when formulating their attack. Coach Lambeau did not conceal his pleasure at Bob Monnett's fine showing last Sunday. Despite the fact that Pittsburgh's team proved unexpectedly weak, the flashy halfback turned in a brilliant performance, and Lambeau hopes that the Packer line will shake him loose for a few dashes Sunday afternoon. Mike Michalske, who has played guard ever since joining the Packers several seasons ago, was shifted to the backfield in yesterday's drill, and showed up well. Mike played fullback during his undergraduate days at Penn State, and is an excellent passer, getting plenty of distance on his tosses, and backs up the line in great shape on defense. Larry Bettencourt has been working hard in practice, and the new center is certain to share the pivot assignment with Bultman and Sarafiny Sunday. Sarafiny also has been drilled at tackle this week, to replace Perry if the latter is unable to play. Odds slightly favor the Bears. Fans have not forgotten the first meeting of the teams this year when the Packers, after leading for three periods, crumpled in the last minutes of play to permit two touchdowns and a Bear victory. The 14 to 7 decision proved lucky for the Bears, who have not dropped a game since. For the Packers, the contest has taken on a crucial nature, as the Bears rest

undefeated atop the National league circuit while the Bays, tripped by New York and the Bears and tied by Boston must win Sunday to remain in the pennant race.

BEARS BOLSTER GRID TEAM FOR PACKER BATTLE

OCT 20 (Chicago) - The acquisition of Dick Stahlman, former Packers, and the return of Bull Doehring, ace aerialist, to the Chicago Bears' lineup today considerably bolstered the Bears' hope of capturing the second of their three game series with Green Bay, which will be played at Wrigley Field here Sunday afternoon. Other teams have been underestimating the Packers' strength this season, as Portsmouth and Pittsburgh can testify, but there is nothing of this attitude in the Bears' preparation for Sunday's title. Coach George Halas is frankly afraid of the outcome, and he is making every effort to produce a combination that will halt the Bays, now definitely regarded as pennant contenders. Halas heard with some surprise that Michalske, veteran lineman of the Packers, who has been termed at various times "the guard of the century", has been shifted for the first time into the backfield. With Michalske is certain to be hampered, Halas believes, and he is about convinced that a punting game is apt to result most favorably for the Bruins...DOEHRING IN UNIFORM: Doehring, who incurred an ankle injury in the Bear-Washington game, has been limping around ever since, but he was back in togs yesterday, his left handed tosses apparently working better than ever. Some of them were being snared by Stahlman, who has been shifted from tackle to the backfield in a bold experiment. There was plenty of fever in the practice session for Bronko Nagurski, who was cracked up in a head-on collision with Clark Hinkle at Green Bay several weeks ago, and who has been more or less valueless to the Bears ever since. Nagurski is anxious to get another wallop at the Packers, and his teammates believe that there is a considerable personal element in his desire...MANY WILL DRIVE: Much of the worry which Coach Halas is spreading throughout his squad is caused by the success of the Packer aerial attack this season. The Bears are hoping for some boggy weather, which will keep the Bays mired and give the husky Chicago linemen a better chance to shine. At the same time the Bears boast a classy passing attack in their own right, and believe they can match the Packers toss for toss,

in case the game develops into an overhead contest. Word from Wisconsin indicates that all roads will be leading to Chicago. Special excursion rates offered by two railroads will bring the largest groups into the Windy City, while many others, provided the weather does not turn unfavorable, are planning to drive down to the north side stadium.

BRUDER STILL SICK

OCT 20 (Green Bay) - Although Hank Bruder still is confined to his home with an attack of the flu, he has the satisfaction of knowing that one jinx in his hard luck string has been eliminated. When the Packers' 1932 season ended., Bruder had climbed to the appropriate position of thirteenth on the Green Bay all-time scoring list. The coincidence didn't bother Bruder but he went to work just the same, and now the thirteenth spot is held by Carl Lidberg, Packer fullback of 1926 to 1930. Bruder has chalked up two touchdowns this season, and the all-time scoring table find him resting in a tie for tenth place with Wuert Englemann. Each has scored nine touchdowns for a total of 54 points. The Packers' leading scorer is Verne Lewellen, 1924 to 1932, who counted 50 touchdowns and an extra kick for 301 points.

CARR TO SEE GAME

OCT 20 (Columbus, OH) - Joe F. Carr, president of the NFL and promotional director of the National Federation of Baseball Leagues, will be in Chicago over the weekend on a double mission. Mr. Carr will be an interested spectator at the Packer-Bear football game which he considers one of the crucial contests in this year's pennant chase. Following the game, he will turn his thoughts from football to baseball and confer with the Wisconsin State league committee in regards to "every day" ball in Wisconsin. According to organized baseball executives, Wisconsin is "ripe" for the daily variety and every string possible is being pulled to have the Badger state in organized ranks next spring.

FEATURE GAMES SUNDAY

OCT 20 (New York) - Two of the keenest rivalries in the eastern and western divisions of the NFL will be settled next Sunday. The unbeaten championship Chicago Bears meet the Green Bay Packers at Wrigley Field, Chicago, while the Brooklyn Dodgers will attempt to knock their neighborhood rivals, the New York Giants, out of the Eastern division lead at Polo Grounds, New York. The rapidly improving Chicago Cardinals invade Boston and the Pittsburgh Pirates travel to Cincinnati in the other circuit tests slated Sunday. The New York Giant-Brooklyn rivalry, always a keen one, is even more bitter this year with three former Giant stars, Chris Cagle, Shipwreck Kelly and Benny Friedman in the Dodger backfield.

KURTH TO MAKE CHICAGO DEBUT IN BEAR GAME

OCT 20 (Chicago) - Joe Kurth, Notre Dame's star tackle last year, will be among the new Packers who make their debut before Chicago fans Sunday when the Bears and Green Bay meet in the second of their annual three game National league series. It is quite likely that Kurth will draw Link Lyman, giant Bear tackle, as his immediate opponent, who with Cal Hubbard of the Packers, was playing pro football when Joe was in fifth grade...HUBBARD IS GIANT: A similar contrast may be presented at the other tackle should Hubbard be opposed by George Musso. Lyman weighs 252 pounds, 50 more than Kurth, but only eight pounds separate Hubbard and Musso. Hubbard weighs 265 pounds. The Packers and Bears both are worried of aerial attacks. Green Bay always has been a good passing squad. The Bears stock soared last week when against the Cardinals they completed nine out of 18 passes for a gain of 96 yards...BEARS SHOW STRENGTH: Also against the Cardinal line, which is on par with any in the league, the Bears gained a total of 152 yards, which combined with the pass yardage made a total gain of 252 yards for 10 first downs. It was a pass play, Hewitt to Johnsos, that turned the tide against the Packers at Green Bay in the season's opener. The same play scored a touchdown on the Cardinals.

PACKERS TRAVEL TO CHICAGO FOR GAME

OCT 21 (Green Bay) - It will be Green Bay and the Chicago Bears again tomorrow afternoon at Chicago fighting in one of the traditional Packer-Bear games for National league honors. Game time is 2 o'clock at Wrigley Field, home of the Chicago Cubs. The game, the 28th in a series that dates back some 12 years, promises to be just as hard fought as any in the past. Both have old scores to settle and both will be giving everything to win. For the Packers there is the realization that they must come through with a victory if they are to continue as a contender for the 1933 title; for the Bears it will be a fight to keep their unspotted record clean. The Bruins have four victories and no defeats in competition to date. With a powerful line and backfield that is as good as any in the country the Bears will be able to give the Packers plenty of trouble. From tackle to tackle there isn't a man who weighs under 200. The ends are big, fast and capable. In fact it was the ends who caused the Bays' downfall when the teams met here the last time. Bill Hewitt, one end, tossed a pass to Luke Johnsos, who plays on the opposite of the line, as the game neared the end. It connected and a minute before the whistle blew the Bears had scored again and the Packers were beaten...

WILL SPUR PACKERS: The memory of that beating is sure to spur the Packers on. They outplayed the Bears in every department for 55 minutes, only to go sour in the final few minutes and have the Bruins come out on top. They believe they can outplay them again, and this time it will be for 60 minutes, despite the fact the team will be weaker than any time in the past few weeks, as three regulars will not be in the lineup. His absent players are Hank Bruder, Buster Mott and Claude Perry. Bruder has been in bed all week with a fever brought on by intestinal flu. Perry's leg is in bad shape and he cannot move fast. Mott has a broken bone in his leg and is out for three weeks. The injuries have brought about a few changes in the Bay lineup during practice sessions this week. The coach has been using Van Sickle, guard, and Sarafiny, center, at tackle to fill Perry's shoes. He has been working with Bettencourt and Bultman alternating at center. Mike Michalske, guard, has been getting some practice in the place of Bruder, but it is doubtful whether he will be there Sunday as he is more valuable in the line against the Bears...

THREE HALFBACKS READY: Coach Lambeau will have only three halfbacks available, and one of that group, Arnie Herber, is not in the best of shape and he may have to shift Goldenberg or Blood to a halfback post part of the game. Englemann and Monnett are the other halfbacks available. Herber has been nursing painful bruises following an altercation Monday night and may not be able to play more than part of the game. His left eye is quite swollen. The Bears will have practically the same lineup that started here. The only absentee will be Dick Nesbitt, halfback, who was sold to the Chicago Cardinals this week. They have two powerful fullbacks in Manders and Nagurski and have Johnny Sisk, Bull Doehring, Dick Corbett, Gene Ronzani and Harold Grange for halfback positions with Molesworth and Brumbaugh to call signals...**HAVE GOOD TACKLES:** Besides Johnsos and Hewitt at the ends, the club has Karr and Tackwell. It is well fortified at tackle with Link Lyman, Dick Stahlman, with the Packers last year, Musso, Richards, Buckler. At guards are Carlson and Bergerson, veterans, Kopcha and Joe Zeller, who also was with the Bays last year. Two of the best centers in the business, Ookie Miller and Burt Pearson, are ready to go at that position. Indications are that the teams will play before a crowd of 15,000 or more. With good weather several thousand fans will follow the team from Wisconsin. Special excursion trains are being run over the Northwestern and Milwaukee roads and bus lines also are offering reduced rates.

PRO GRID NOTES

OCT 21 (Green Bay) - One of the largest scores that has been chalked up in a National league game in the last 10 years was recorded last Sunday in New York when the Giants, coached by Steve Owen, walloped Philadelphia's eleven, 56 to 0...The New Yorkers clicked for three touchdowns in the opening frame; got one in the second quarter, another in the third and then spurted in the final frame for three more markers. Every goal was converted...Battling furiously, the Bears nosed out a 12 to 9 victory over the Chicago Cardinals. The Windy City southsiders had a touchdown and field goal lead at halftime but the Bears wiped this out in the closing periods...Lillard was again the whole show for the Cardinals. He ran 50 yards for a six pointer, and then booted a field goal. A pass over the goal line, Hewitt to Johnsos, made the Bears' touchdown. Manders' field goal...Cincinnati suffered its fourth defeat of the season last Sunday in Brooklyn when the Dodgers skipped through to a 27 to 0 victory. He ranks as one of the best pass catchers in the league this year...KURTH OPPOSES LYMAN: Joe Kurth, formerly of Notre Dame, will start at right tackle for Green Bay. He will be opposed by Link Lyman, who will outweigh him by 50 pounds.

BEAR-GREEN BAY FOOTBALL GAME ON WGN TODAY

OCT 21 (Chicago) - Traditional rivals of many years, the Chicago Bears and Green Bay Packers, the NFL's perennial leaders, will clash this afternoon at 2:15 at Wrigley Field, with WGN presenting the exclusive broadcast of the contest. The Packers and Bear games always have drawn great crowds, for this contest each year is one of the outstanding features on the league schedule. Bob Elson will open the broadcast before the kickoff to give his listeners advance dope on the two teams, some information about the players and the starting lineups. A special broadcasting booth has been erected in Wrigley field from which Elson will present his broadcast. Bert Metzger, Notre Dame's famous all-American "half pint" guard of a few years ago, will be presented between halves. Bert will tell some interesting stories of his experiences during his days at Notre Dame and also will give his impressions of the pro contest. Metzger, although considerably smaller than the usual run of college football players, was one of the greatest stars ever developed at Notre Dame.

R-REVENGE! CRY PACKERS TODAY AGAINST BEARS

OCT 22 (Chicago) - The Green Bay Packers, including Arnie Herber, Hank Bruder, Johnny Blood, Cal Hubbard, Lavvie Dilweg and other famous warriors are in town inspired with a double-barreled idea - to say up in the west division of the NFL race and to obtain revenge over the Bears. The latter idea probably is paramount with the Packers, for they are still trying to recover from the shock of the 14 to 7 beating they absorbed in the season's opener at Green Bay. That was an affront to the ancient Green Bay custom of crushing the enemy in the first game - one that automatically called for retaliation at the earliest possible date - and that date is this afternoon at Wrigley Field at 2:15 o'clock...NEW AND OLD STARS READY: Carly Lambeau, who is in his fifteenth year as a post-graduate coach and the only one Green Bay has ever known, has every man on the squad in prime condition. They are a mixture of established veterans and lads whose names were headlines only a short time ago in the collegiate game. Among the latter are Joe Kurth, tackle from Notre Dame; Jesse Quatse of Pittsburgh, Ben Smith of Alabama, and Bob Monnett of Michigan State. They will see action some time during today's contest. But it will be up to the old guard who in the past have waged many a terrific battle with the Bears and who, until last year when the Bears won the title, captured the National pennant three times in a row, to bear the brunt of today's attack...WATCH MR. BLOOD!: This means that once again the giant of the National circuit, Cal Hubbard, will hurl his

265 pounds into the line play; that Johnny Blood will be darting around alert for forward passes from Herber's arm; that Dilweg will be trying to outsmart Luke Johnsos, and Wuert Englemann will go crashing into the line. Whether this crew will outdo the Bears today remains to be seen, but they did so at Green Bay for fifty-five out of the sixty minutes of play - or until Bill Hewitt, staged a "Frank Merriwell" finish, aided by Johnsos and Bill Buckler. The Bears harbor no illusions as to their superiority over the Packers. They realize a distinct menace to their clean slate of four victories. Forward passing is the forte of both teams and Green Bay's in particular, for they lead the league in aerial fireworks with a record of having completed half of the number attempted. In this Herber and Blood have been outstanding...BEARS SIGN STAHLMAN: The Bears' passing attack has been strengthened with the return of Bull Doehring and Coach Halas tightened the line by signing Dick Stahlman, a former Green Bay warrior, and Bronko Nagurski, fullback, may be able to play without the annoyance of the special headgear designed to protect his broken nose, which incidentally was sustained in the first period of that Green Bay battle up north. Today's battle is the twenty-eighth of their rivalry that began in 1921. The Packers have won twelve; the Bears, eleven, and others were ties.

FIRST QUARTER

Hinkle kicked off to Clark who ran back 25 yards to his own 35 yard line. Moore was held at right tackle for no gain. Clark made four yards on a spinner at left tackle. Tesser punted and Grove returned five yards to his own 24 yard line. Hinkle punted and Westfall returned about five to the 37 yard line. Moore went over right tackle for seven yards. Westfall quick-kicked over the Packer goal line and the locals took the ball on the 20 yard line. Hinkle tried a run from punt formation and lost one yard. Hinkle punted and Westfall returned 10 to his own 45 yard line. Clark lost one at left tackle. Westfall again tried a quick-kick which was partially blocked and the ball went to the Packers on the 44 yard line.

The first play found the Packers receiving a five yard penalty for off-side. Hinkle spun through the line for three yards. Hinkle back in punt formation passed to Ben Smith for 20 yards and a first down. Mott failed to gain at left tackle. Hinkle gained about a yard on a spinner. Hinkle tried a place kick which failed and Pittsburgh took the ball on its 20 yard line. Clark went through left tackle for three yards on a spinner. Moore went around left end and was nearly swayed but was stopped by Monnett and Grove on the 42 yard line. Moore fumbled and Grove recovering. Monnett picked up three yards on a spinner and Mott followed with eight at right end for a first down on the 31 yard line.

Hinkle on a straight buck made seven yards at center. Monnett made four for a first down. On the next play he went around left end for nearly six yards. Hinkle cracked center for a yard and a half. Monnett bucked guard for another and then Herber playing behind center took the ball and passed to Dilweg for first down on the nine yard line. Monnett carried the ball to the one foot line around left end and then Hinkle crashed through the middle of the line for the touchdown. Monnett kicked the point and the score was Green Bay 7, Pittsburgh 0.

Hinkle kicked off to Westfall who returned 16 yards to his own 26 yard line. Clark failed to make any headway at right tackle and Moore had better luck, making three at right end. A pass was incomplete when Hinkle knocked it down. Tesser punted and Monnett returned 20 yards to the Pittsburgh 47 yard line. Monnett, behind some line interference ran to the 15 yard line for first down. Herber failed to gain at right end and then made three at the other end.

SECOND QUARTER

A pass, Herber to Hinkle was incomplete and a second one cost the Packers five yards and Pittsburgh took the ball. Westfall lost three on an end run and Clark was held for no gain at right end. Tesser punted and the ball was downed on the Pittsburgh 45 yard line. Monnett on spinner made two over tackle. Herber picked up one on a right end run. On what was supposed to be a forward pass Hinkle found every one covered and ran to the 31 yard line for a first down.

On the first play Pittsburgh was offside for a five yard penalty. Monnett couldn't gain at right tackle and Herber made four on the other side of the line. The backfield in motion cost the Packers five yards and then Monnett tossed a short pass to Goldenberg which put the ball on the 73 yard line just short of a first down.

A pass Herber to Goldenberg gave the Packers a first down on the 19 yard line. Monnett ran away from several tacklers to carry the ball to the six yard line for another first down. Goldenberg was stopped for no gain and then Monnett went off left tackle for the touchdown. He also tried the place kick for the extra point but the try failed and the score was Green Bay 13, Pittsburgh 0.

Monnett kicked off to Tesser who returned to the 35 yard line. Westfall failed to gain on a right end run. Clark was stopped at left tackle. A pass, Westfall to Daly was good for a first down on the 48 yard line. Another pass was knocked down by Monnett but a third one to Schaefer was good for another first down on the Packer 41 yard line. Clark made two yards on a spinner and the next play was a pass which Grove knocked down. A pass was thrown again and this time Goldenberg grabbed the ball and with some line interference ran 65 yards to the goal for a touchdown. Grove made the extra point. Score Packers 20, Pittsburgh 6.

Englemann kicked off to Clark who ran the ball back to his own 25 yard line. Westfall made only one at left end. A pass was incomplete and then Pittsburgh tried another one on which the Packers were penalized and their opponents got the ball on the 37 yard line. Another pass went into the arms of Englemann who was downed on the 48 yard line. Monnett made two yards at right end and Englemann six at the other. Goldenberg picked up four and a first down and then a pass from Monnett to Herber put the ball on the Pittsburgh 16 yard line. Goldenberg was good for three yards on a spinner and a pass from Herber to Englemann was good for a first down on the three yard line. Goldenberg went over left guard for a touchdown on a nice plunge and Monnett booted the extra point. Score 27 to 6 in favor of the Packers.

Fogelmann kicked off to Clark who returned to his own 30 yard mark. Westfall lost one at left end and Gentenbein stopped him again for no gain. On a pass play Westfall was smeared for a ten yard loss as the half ended.

THIRD QUARTER

Englemann kicked off to Moore who returned to the 26-yard line. Westfall made a yard at right end and Clark was held for no gain at center. Tesser punted to Herber who returned to the Pittsburgh 48-yard line. Bruder went over right tackle and then cut back evading the secondary defense and running for the touchdown. Herber drop-kicked for the extra point and the Packers total ran to 34 points. Englemann kicked off to Schaefer who came back to his own 31-yard line. Clark was stopped by Evans for no gain. Moore lost two when Dilweg tackled him. Tesser punted and Monnett returned 10 yards to the 31-yard line.

Monnett lost a yard but the Packers were offside and were penalized five. A bad pass from center was fumbled but finally recovered by Kurth for a five-yard loss. Herber punted and Westfall was downed in his tracks on the 31-yard line. Moore was held without gain at left end. Clark made a yard on a spinner. Tesser punted out of bounds on the 35-yard line. Englemann took a pass from Herber for a 29-yard gain and first down. Englemann couldn't gain at center. A pass to Goldenberg was incomplete and another one from Herber to "Buckets" made a yard. Herber punted and Westfall signaled for a fair catch on his own 16-yard line. Clark made four yards through center and then was stopped for no gain on a spinner.

Moore was held for no gain and Westfall punted to Herber who tossed a lateral pass over to Monnett on the other side of the field for a pretty play and Monnett ran the ball 35 yards to the Pittsburgh 23-yard line before going out of bounds. Englemann made nearly a yard at left end and a pass Herber to Dilweg was good for a first down on the 12-yard line. Monnett on a cross-cross made a nice run around right end for a touchdown. Englemann failed to make the extra point and the Packers now led by 40 points.

Englemann kicked off to Moss who returned to the 36-yard line. Westfall reversed his field for a six-yard gain and then he lost a yard at right tackle. Clark picked up three at center and Westfall punted, the ball being returned to the 28-yard line. Herber on a punt formation play passed to Dilweg for first down and a 13-yard gain. Monnett failed to gain at left end and a pass Herber to Dilweg was incomplete. Another one also was incomplete for a five-yard penalty. Herber punted and Westfall was downed on the 24-yard line. Vaughan failed to gain at left tackle.

FOURTH QUARTER

Clark was good for two yards at center. A pass Westfall to Vaughan was good for first down on the 38-yard line. Westfall lost two at right end and then he tried a pass which Herber intercepted and raced back to Pittsburgh's 32-yard line. Englemann was good for 12 yards and first down at left tackle. Monnett made six at left tackle and then Goldenberg fumbled. Pittsburgh recovering on the 12-yard line. Clark made four yards at right tackle. A pass was incomplete. Westfall punted and the ball went out of bounds on the Pittsburgh 49-yard line. Herber went out to the left end of the line and took a lateral pass from Monnett and then sent a long pass down the field towards Smith. The ball was knocked down by Westfall and the play was an incomplete pass. Then with Monnett on the left wing Herber passed the ball to him and Englemann cutting across in back of him took the ball on a short lateral pass and ran 30 yards for a touchdown. Monnett kicked the goal.

Englemann kicked off to Westfall who ran back to the 35-yard line. Westfall made six around right end and four more over right tackle for a first down. Westfall was stopped for no gain. A pass was incomplete. Westfall punted out of bounds on the 19-yard line. Herber punted and Westfall was downed on the 47-yard line. Westfall failed to gain and Reich dashed through the Packer line for 19 yards and a first down. Vaughan fumbled but recovered for a one yard line. Vaughan made five yards at left tackle. A pass was intercepted by Sarafny who ran it back to Pittsburgh's 14-yard line. Pittsburgh was penalized five yards for defensive holding. On the last play of the game Herber, unable to pass, carried the ball and was forced out of bounds on the one-yard line as the whistle blew.
