Packers Flash New Speed in Blasting Giants 31-7

Fast HB's Lead Attack as Bays Score in Every Quarter

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(MINNEAPOLIS) - The Packers bristled with speed on the ground here Saturday night. And, fellow fans, that's a revolutionary development or, to be more specific, just what the doctor ordered. The Packers enter the 1953 campaign with a potent aerial attack - the best in the NFL last year - and a prayer for fast, hard-hitting backs. Somebody's prayer must have been answered 'cause the Pack came forth with their swiftest ground game in years here Saturday night. Speed on the soil - plus a dash of the Bays' aerial magic - and a lot of that old and vital "will", helped the Packers to a 31-7 decision over the always slow-starting New York Giants before a sellout turnaway crowd of 20,560 fans in Parade stadium. Just to temper this epistle somewhat, it must be reported that the Packer appeared in splendid physical condition, while the Giants didn't exactly look the picture of condition. The Bays, besides, had a week of practice and one intra-squad game edge on their red-shirted opponents. Packer coach Gene Ronzani apparently took quick note and gave every rookie a good opportunity to display his talents. Holding a 24-0 lead, Ronzani turned the Packers over to young Dick Flowers, the rookie quarterback who played the entire fourth quarter, completing five out of nine passes. The coach used 46 of the 48 available players, Bobby Jack Floyd and Bill Forester being held out because of injuries. Ronzani, incidentally, was pleased after the game - what with the speed, etc. - but added "we've got a lot of work to do yet." Giant coach Steve Owen bluntly started that "we're not that bad" and predicted that the team would come along "very well." Easily the outstanding development of the game from the Packer standpoint was the hell-bent-for-election running of three rookie backs - Gib Dawson, Don Barton and Al Carmichael. Ronzani took a quick look at veterans Larry Coutre and Breezy Reid and then decided to turn loose the "kids". Dawson, a twisting, turn-around runner, bolted a net 33 yards in six tries and Carmichael, a steady pounder, nailed down 18 in 8. While the figures aren't boxcarish, it must be remembered that the Giants'

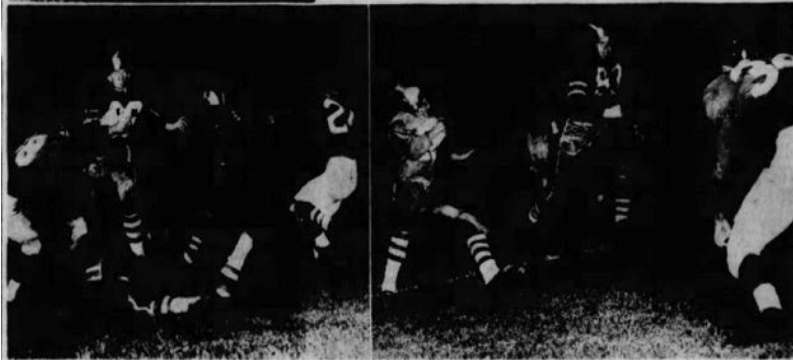

defense, always quick to jell, ranks among the best in the league. Barton never ran from scrimmage with the ball, but he caught a pass for 24 yards to set up Carmichael's short TD plunge and turned in some gallant punt returns. In fact, the Packers' punt returning was the finest since Billy Grimes went wild in '50. The only difference now is that the club has two or three with Grimes' potential. The Bays returned seven punts for 188 yards - one a 75-yard touchdown run by Dan Sandifer in the last quarter. Other returns included a 50-yarder by J.R. Boone and a 40-yarder by Barton. The Giants never actually threatened the Packers until the last quarter when Frank Gifford ran 38 yards for the New Yorkers' only score. They entered Bay territory four times all night - once in the first half. Scoring in every period, the Packers took a 7-0 lead when Captain Bob Forte caught Chuck Conerly's popped in the air pass and ran 38 yards for a TD. In the second hear, Dawson made it 10-0 with a tough-angle field goal from the 17 and Carmichael upped it to 17-0 on a four-yard blast off left tackle. In the

third, Babe Parilli and Bill Howton treated the crowd to an aerial score, the play going 34 yards. Gifford's run made it 24-7 midway in the fourth heat but Sandifer's run "nullified" the Giant TD. Freddie Cone, who missed a field goal from the 30 in the first quarter, kicked all four extra points. There were all sorts of interesting things in this affair. Big Clayton Tonnemaker showed that he definitely has returned to his 1950 status with a magnificent performance. The Gopher star, playing before his home folks, gave the line a big lift by filling holes and worked excellently on pass defense. He intercepted one and just missed another. Val Joe Walker, the new defensive halfback obtained in a trade with the Giants, saw considerable action and made a sparkling interception. Probably the finest interception was Bobby Dillon's one-armed swipe of a Conerly pass right out of the arms of Bob Hudson in the end zone. One of the Packers' key positions - the middle guard spot vacated by Ray Bray - was handled nicely by Floyd Harrawood, a converted rookie tackle whose speed permitted him to move to both sides of the middle. Bill Georges, Bill Murray and Stan Lewza put on quite a rugged match fighting for Ab Wimberly's former job at defensive right end. Just about all of the new men displayed flashes along the way and the Chicago Cardinal game next Saturday night will give them another opportunity to work for their crisp, green degrees. The Bays came out of the activity with minor injuries. Quarterback Tobin Rote hurt his leg and had to be relieved by Parilli in the first half, but the four-year veteran went back in occasionally. Center Jim Ringo was nursing a sore nose after the game. The Giants stuck with Conerly even after the game was apparently lost, a twist that disappointed the New York scribes who were anxious to see more of rookies Don Gottlob and Jimmy Feix. The Packer line didn't give Conerly a lot of time all night. Big John Martinkovic or Georges kept Chuck quite worried, thus making it easier for the Bays' pass defense. The Bay throwers, on the other hand, had considerable time. Rote completed four out of five and Parilli seven out of nine. In all, the Packers completed 16 out of 23 for 170 yards, while Conerly settled for 11 out of 30 for 105 yards. The Packers set the long-gain tempo on the first play when Cone took a pitchout from Rote around right end for 24 yards and a first down on the Giant 45. A holding penalty ended the GB threat and Parilli punted to the Giant 23 from where the New Yorks put on their first show. Conerly hurled for 10 yards to Rote but the Bays stiffened and Clay went back to pull the curtain open on the night's first excitement. Little Boone took the punt on the 12 and weaved his way 54 yards to the Giant 34. Mann took Rote's stroke on the 18 and the Packers sniffed a TD as Coutre added four to the 14. But Rote couldn't pass when the Giant line rushed and he was smeared back nine yards and injured on the play. A

Parilli-Mann pass went snafu so Cone stepped back on the 30 and missed a field goal. Three plays later, the Packers scored their first TD of the season. Conerly, on first down, was bumped by Martinkovic just behind the center. The ball popped into the air and into the arms of Forte, who ankleed 38 yards down the sidestripes to a TD. Cone's kick made it 7-0. Another rip-roaring punt return set up the Packers' second score up the Packers' second score in the first quarter when Barton took Clay's boot on the 23 and stroked 40 yards to the Giant 37. Parilli passes to Howton and Mann and runs by Cone and Carmichael moved it to the 11 and, on the first play of the second quarter, Dawson booted his field goal. After an exchange of punts, Tonnemaker intercepted Conerly's pass on the Giant 35, ran five yards and fumbled. Dillon recovered it on the Giant 25. On the first play, Barton took Rote's pass just inside the sideline on the four from where Carmichael smashed over for the score. The game remained quiet until early in the third quarter when Conerly and Hudson worked a 36-yard aerial to the Packer 40. Kyle Rote smashed to the 31, but Dillon then made his spectacular interception in the end zone. The Packers

then drove 80 yards to a touchdown. A roughing the passer penalty gave the Bays a first down on their own 44 after which Boone ran for five. Parilli hurled to Howton for 10 yards and Bill lateraled to Ferguson for seven more to the Giant 24. On second down, Howton took Parilli's throw on the 25 and broke away two Giants and ran down the sidelines for the TD. A moment later, Gifford fielded a Parilli punt on his 25, signaled momentarily for a fair catch and then scampered 75 yards into pay dirt. But the officials penalized the Giants 15 for his "fakery". Near the end of the third frame, Dawson, taking the ball from Rote who was faking a pass, wheeled around left end for 18 yards but fumbled. The Giants recovered on the Packer 42. With Gifford running off the Swing-T, the Giants reached the Packer 11 where the Packers held and took the ball on downs early in the fourth period. Billy Hair punted out of danger to midfield, but, on third down, Gifford, shopping for a hole in the line on the Swing-T, twisted over right tackle and wheeled 39 yards for a TD. Gifford kicked the point and it was 24-7. The Packers picked up a first down on a Flowers pass to Elliott and two smashes to Carmichael, but Ferguson fumbled and Albright recovered on the Giant 39. After Conerly was smeared 15 yards trying to pass, Sandifer took Long's punt on the Packer 29, sailed up the middle and cut to his left on the night's longest TD run. After trading punts, Dawson made five, Carmichael three and Dawson skidded and weaved 24 yards to the Giant 23. Carmichael belted to the 14 on the last play of the game as the Packers threatened to make it 38-7.

Pack To 'Look Like Ball Club' Against Redskins

RONZANI CALLS GROUND DRILLS

AUG 24 (Grand Rapids) - Coach Gene Ronzani called his Packer squad to two stiff drills Monday and will repeat Tuesday before breaking camp here Wednesday for the August 29 exhibition game with the Cardinals at Spokane, WA. Happy over the Packers' 31-7 win over the Giants at Minneapolis, the coaches Monday concentrated on the running attack. The squad was in better shape physically and mentally than New York, Ronzani and his aides concluded. The present squad of 48 may be culled back to about 40 before the Spokane trip, Ronzani hinted. The next cut will be to 33 after the September 19 exhibition with the Browns at Cleveland. Tony Canadeo, retired Packer halfback, will accompany the squad to Spokane as a guest.

BLOOD JOINS GOPHER STAFF

AUG 24 (Minneapolis) - The University of Minnesota added a new football assistant coach to its staff today - John (Blood) McNally, coach at St. John's college for the last four years, a former Pittsburgh Steeler coach from 1937 to 1939, and Green Bay Packer star. McNally, who attended St. John's from 1921-23, now is on leave from the Collegeville, Minn., school to work toward a master's degree in economics at the university. The university said it wasn't certain yet just what duties McNally would take over.

PACKERS MAY BE HEADED TO BEST SEASON SINCE 1944

AUG 24 (Wisconsin State Journal) - The Green Bay Packers may be headed to their best football season since they won the NFL championship in 1944. Green Bay wasn't a bad team a year ago when it finished third in its division with a 6-6 record, and the Packers should be better this fall. Last Saturday night's 31-7 exhibition game victory over the New York Giants indicated the Packers have fine possibilities. The Giants were second in their division of the NFL a year ago. The Packer have done a good job at picking players the last three years, and Green Bay may be ready this fall to make a real battle for the title. Green Bay had the best pass attack in professional football a year ago, and it may now have the material supplement that with a strong running game. Four of Green Bay's six defeats in the 1952 league race were at the hands of the two teams that tied for the divisional championship, Detroit and Los Angeles (Detroit won in a playoff game, 31-21). Given a sounder defense, Green Bay might have fared better against the leaders. The Packers scored 28 points in one game against Los Angeles and 27 in the other but lost them both. Return of Clayton Tonnemaker, the huge and efficient linebacker from Minnesota, can't help but improve the Packers' defense. There are no more loyal fans in all of professional football than those who follow the Packers, and it's hoped they may be rewarded with a championship contender this year.

PRO GRID GAME WILL TEST ROOKIES

AUG 24 (Spokane Daily Chronicle) - There's no such thing as an "exhibition" game for members of a professional football squad. Every tilt can mark the end of their hopes for a career in playing for pay. This axiom, well recognized by every member of a professional team, applies Saturday night when the Green Bay Packers and Chicago Cardinals tangle in Spokane's Memorial Stadium at 8 p.m. in a benefit game for the United Crusade of Spokane County. The Cardinals will bring 62 players into Spokane Wednesday evening, but only 42 will continue the tour to the Coast. And the same applies to the Green Bay Packers - some 20 players, rookies and veterans from each team will reach the end of the trail for this season in professional football. Dale Gentry, end coach for Washington State college and an all-Coast star in his playing hey-day, summed it up this way: "You're fighting to keep your place on your own team and the opposition is laying for you so they

can look good. I never had it so rough as in the pre-league contests when everyone is laying for you." The quarterback spot for the Green Bay Packers is an example of the terrific competition going on within each team in early season games. Vito (Babe) Parilli and Tobin Rote are standouts in NFL play - but even their positions are in jeopardy. Here are some of the fine young college players they must outplay for their positions: Dick Flowers, the finest quarterback Northwestern University has produced in the last 10 years. He holds several Big Ten passing records and has had two years with the Quantico Marines. Arnold Galiffa, Army's great quarterback, who made All-America in 1949 before two years of army service in Korea. Gil Reich, the "brains" of the University of Kansas team last season and a former member of West Point's great team. The same competition applies at every position for both the Cards and the Packers. After all, it's the end of the trail for some 40 aspiring professional football players.

GREEN BAY PROVIDES SATISFYING ANSWERS IN 31 TO 7 TRIUMPH

AUG 24 (Milwaukee Journal) - The Green Bay Packers gave a lot of satisfying answers in their 31-7 victory over the New York Giants in Minneapolis Saturday night to the questions about what they may have in this year's NFL race. It was the most promising debut in several years. Are they going to be faster than last year's team? Much faster. They ran away from the Giants. On kickoff and punt returns, especially, they made Steve Owen's apparently not too well-conditioned athletes look like so many stationary quarter poles at Arlington Park - only this was Minneapolis. Are they going to be deeper than last year's team? By 8 or 10 men at least. Additions to the squad have been given coach Gene Ronzani depth he

had never had at Green Bay before - additions like halfbacks Don Barton of Texas, Al Carmichael of Southern California, Ben Aldridge of Dallas, Gib Dawson of Texas, Ike Boone of the 49ers, and Val Joe Walker of Texas; a quarterback like Dick Flowers of Northwestern; tackles like Floyd Harrawood of Tulsa and Jack Morgan of Michigan State; ends like Bill Georges of Texas and Bill Murray of Springfield and a linebacker like Roger Zatkoff of Michigan. There was a contented look on the big boy's face as he talked about the game at the hotel later. His problem will come when he must cut those last few men of the 48 he still has to reach the player limit of 33 for the league opener with Cleveland here Sunday September 27. Are the rookies all they had been touted to be? Saturday they certainly looked so. Don Barton exceeded all expectations with his speed and poise in returning kicks. Zatkoff singlehandedly broke up a screen pass by hurling himself over a flock of blockers to nail the ball carrier for a loss. It was one of the outstanding plays of the night. Flowers played almost all of the second half at quarterback and completed five out of nine passes. He will be a particularly valuable addition if Parilli should get his army summons as he might. Georges and Murray looked acceptable in Ab Wimberly's shoes at end. Harrawood and Morgan showed highly desirable speed and quickness for linemen who weigh better than 240 pounds. And Walker, in a defensive halfback role - he can also play offense - gave an account that drew high praise from Ronzani. Will veterans like Clay Tonnemaker, Len Szafaryn, Larry Coutre, back after two years of military service, be able to pick up where they left off? Against the Giants they looked as though they never have been gone. Tonnemaker again roved behind the line like a policeman. Does the squad appear to be jelling? Decidedly so. Not only has there been rapid progress in mastery of the mechanics of play, but there has been unusual progress in achieving physical condition. You could see it when the men came into the hotel Saturday noon after their long bus ride from camp at Grand Rapids, MN. They looked almost drawn. And you could certainly see it on the field at night with the thermometer up in the eighties. "I've never been with a ball club that has run as much in practice as this one," one of the boys said. In the mechanics of play, the blocking on kickoffs and punt returns was especially deadly. Boone returned one kick 50 yards and Barton another, 38. On seven

punt returns, all told, the Packers picked up 188 yards and on two kickoff returns, 56 yards. There was only one distraction in what was otherwise such a satisfying debut. How much did the plodding Giants, obviously not in as good condition as Green Bay, contribute as a background to the performance? "We certainly weren't in as good condition as Green Bay," Steve Owen remarked after the game. "It hurt us." Undoubtedly the Giants did help the Packers look good. The Giants did a good job bumping into each other. But even with allowance for this, Gene Ronzani and his staff were highly satisfied guys at the midnight dinner they had with the squad. "It was the best opener we've had up here," Ronzani summed it up, and the score or more of Packer followers who came up to see the game uttered, "Amen!" The Packers will make their next start against the Chicago Cardinals at Spokane, WA. They will go by rail, leaving their Grand Rapids camp Wednesday night.

PACK TO 'LOOK LIKE BALL CLUB' AGAINST REDSKINS

AUG 25 (Grand Rapids) - "We won't look like a ball club until we play Washington." That was one of Packer coach Gene Ronzani's reactions after the Packers' 31 to 7 victory over the New York Giants in Minneapolis Saturday night. While the Packers stood head and shoulders above the Giants in physical condition and alertness, Ronzani reminded that "our

timing was off and we stuck fairly close to the simple plays." When the Packers answer the bell at City stadium Saturday night, Sept. 5, against Coach Curly Lambeau's Redskins, Ronzani feels that "the team will be much sharper, especially on offensive timing, then it showed against New York." Mind you, Ronzani wasn't complaining about the team's spirited performance against New York but he believes that the finer mechanics of offensive operation can be carried out in "much smoother" fashion against Washington. Win or lose, the Packers' play against the Chicago Cardinals in Spokane, Wash., next Saturday evening should be "advanced some over that in the Giant game but nothing like we expect it to be against Washington." Ronzani pointed out. Ronzani was never really able to cut loose with a razor-sharp Packer team in a non-league game at City stadium, although the club did win two out of the three games played. In 1950, the Packers defeated the Chicago Cardinals, then coached by Lambeau, 17-14, but it was only the club's second game. In 1951, the Packers defeated the same foe in their first game by the same score. A year ago, the Pack engaged the Cleveland Browns in their second game and lost 21-14. The Packers' appearance against Washington will be their third of the season. It must be reminded that the Redskins also will be playing No. 3. Washington plays at San Francisco Sunday...Tony Canadeo, experiencing that "strange feeling" as a first-year Packer alumnus, saw the club in action for the first time and stated frankly that "I never saw a Packer team with that much speed." An 11-year veteran and a real speedster in his hey day, Canadeo marveled at the work of such new halfbacks as Gib Dawson, Al Carmichael and Don Barton. Dick Wildung, the former Packer tackle who broke in in 1946, echoed Tony's views. Wildung came over from Redwood Falls, where he's in the hardware business. Canadeo and Wildung watched the early part of the game with their wives from the stands but it was a poor seat compared to the player bench. So they took off and finished out the action on the player board. In a wheelchair alongside the Packer bench was Fred Vant Hull, former Green Bay guard who was stricken with polio several years ago. Vant Hull, a resident of Minneapolis, plans to see a Packer game in Green Bay or Milwaukee this year...GAME NOTES: John Martinkovic was the first to report that "those Giants were out of shape." And Clarence Self added, "they weren't even yelling during the game." Coach Steve Owen of the Giants pointed out that "we never had a team return punts against us like the Packers did. This won't happen later in the season." Owen said that an intra-squad game last Tuesday took a lot out of his team...The Packers lost 10 balls and were down to one or two at the final whistle. They cost \$16.80 per. Fred Cone lost four on extra points and one on a missed field goal, Dawson one on a field goal and Frank Gifford on an extra point. An old practice ball was used for Cone's last PAT...Quarterback Tobin Rote was most elated with the new power at halfback, that removed all of the pain from his injured leg. "Those boys will certainly keep those defenses honest now," Tobe said. One New York scribe put it this way: "I came all the way out here to watch your two fine quarterbacks (Rote and Babe

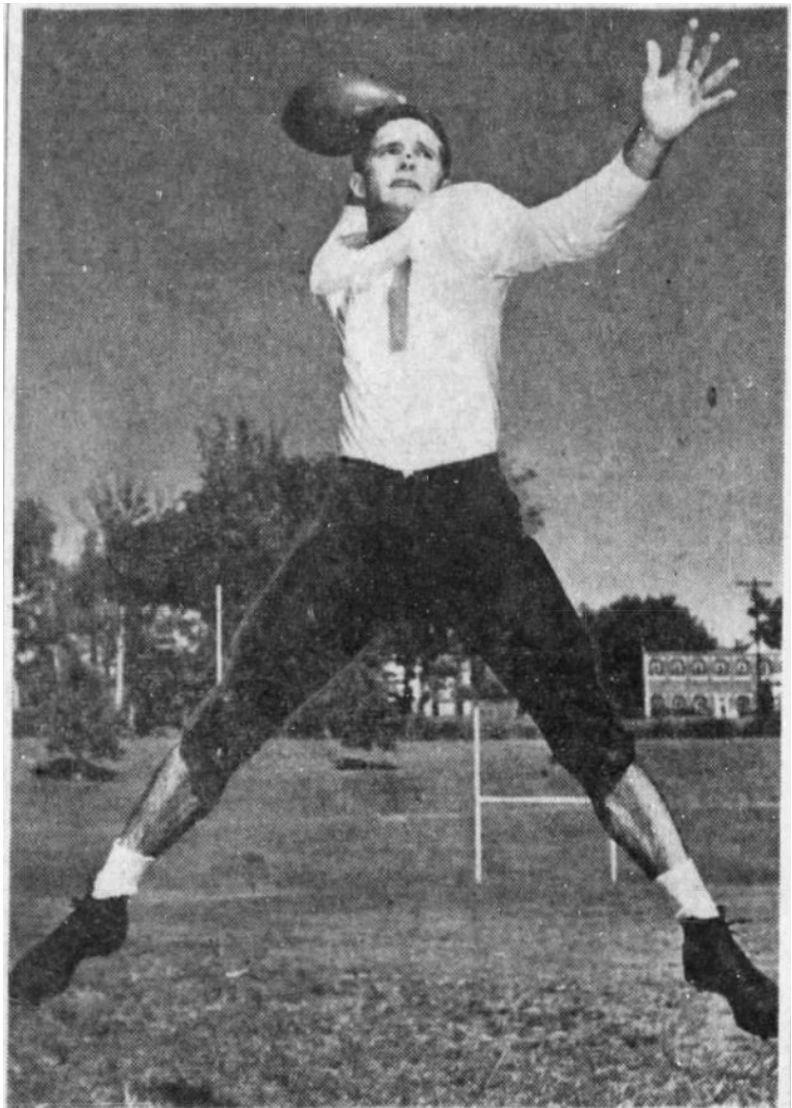

PACKERS SHOWED CLASS IN WIN OVER GIANTS

AUG 25 (Milwaukee Sentinel) - One game proves nothing conclusively and certainly doesn't make a season, especially the first game and an exhibition skirmish at that. But it would leaning over backward in the field of conservatism to say the Packers didn't show definite promise of coming up with a topnotch pro football club while handling the New York Giants like so many pee-wees at Minneapolis Saturday night. Coach Gene Ronzani's men showed overall speed, for which there is no substitute in football or any other sport emphasizing those God-given get-there-first and run-away-from-'em qualities. Fortunately, most of the speed has been added in spots where speed counts most and where the Packers needed it most - the halfbacks and downfield defensive spots. The same men who will be called on to turn it on offensively, probably will be doing the "outfielding" also, thereby hitting the enemy in two ways. Gib Dawson, Don

Barton, J.R. Boone and Dan Sandifer, the only holdover from last year, really proved they can pick 'em up and lay 'em down - start quickly and set up blocking beautifully, too. Boone and Barton looked like a particularly dazzling double safety combination. Their punt returns, totaling well over 100 yards, gained position for the first two scores of the game. Sandifer closed the scoring books with the game's longest run of 70 yards, also on a punt return. Barton, Dawson's teammate at Texas, is a real find. He wasn't on any club's draft list. Among the four mentioned, Dawson and Barton, outstanding pass receivers, are the boys most likely to be called on for offensive halfback duties. Dawson, winner of the most valuable trophy in the Chicago All-Star game, conceivably can develop into the season's pro freshman sensation. Add Al Carmichael, the

club's No. 1 draft choice, and Larry Coutre, back from service after a two-year hitch, and it's apparent the Packers' halfback picture has brightened up almost beyond belief. Carmichael, star of Southern California's Pacific Coast and Rose Bowl championship team last year, doesn't have the blinding speed of Dawson, Barton and Boone, but is bigger and more rugged. Coutre has a lot of both, ruggedness and speed, as he proved beyond all doubt three years ago. Despite some losses, the most serious of which saw Ab Wimberly bow out of active competition, the defense showed signs of improvement. The return of Clayton Tonnemaker as middle linebacker alone practically guarantees it. The two Bills, Murray and Georges, looked good at Wimberly's old spot, right end, as did Floyd Harrawood, another recruit, as middleman in the five man line. Bob Forte and Deral Teteak, as usual, did a fine job of flanking Tonnemaker in the linebacking positions. In Bobby Dillon, of course, the Bays have one of the finest downfield defensive men in football. Bobby's end zone interception, which choked off a Giant score in the third quarter, was a super thriller that was practically worth the price of admission. He has the speed, spring, and, above all, the necessary instinct - or, as it is called, nose for the ball. The squad's physical condition was remarkable, which is a tribute to the general desire to succeed as well as serious work on the part of Ronzani and his staff of coaches. There was definite indication of quick early progress, too, in the important business of getting together and looking like a football team at all times - running the ball, passing, taking up defensive stations or whatever. They were coached and obviously had assimilated coaching. They played with purpose, period. The Giants, by contrast, weren't in good shape and hadn't mastered whatever it was they were trying to do. That made it comparatively easy for the Packers - even made it impossible to evaluate their work accurately. Yet the Ronzanimen showed enough to bring hope, solid hope, that they're coming up with something. The next test comes Saturday night in Spokane, WA where they take on the Chicago Cardinals. They will leave their Grand Rapids, MN training base Wednesday, travel by bus to Minneapolis and leave that night by train, arriving in the West Coast city Friday morning.

PACKERS BREAK CAMP, HEAD FOR CARDS GAME

AUG 26 (Grand Rapids) - The Green Bay Packers closed out thirty days of intensive practice at the University of Minnesota's school of agriculture here today and headed for Spokane, Wash., where they'll play the Chicago Cardinals in a non-league football game Saturday night. Coach Gene Ronzani sent the squad through a two-hour drill this morning. After an early lunch, the team boarded two Greyhound buses and took off for Minneapolis. They are scheduled to leave there on the Milwaukee Road's Olympian at 9:50 tonight and arrive in Spokane at 12:35 Saturday morning. Joining the team in Minneapolis will be Tony Canadeo, the veteran halfback. But Tony won't be playing in the city he helped make famous as the "Grey Ghost of Gonzaga." It will be Canadeo's first return to his alma mater since he left in June of 1941. He joined the Packers that fall. The Packers are schedule to return to Green Bay next Monday when they'll start practice for the Washington-Lambeau classic at City stadium Saturday night, Sept. 5. Returning to Green Bay with scout Jack Vainisi late tonight are backs Billy Hair and Bobby Jack Floyd. Hair, though he punted some in the New York Giant victory, is hampered a leg injury, while Floyd is recuperating from an operation on his heel. Hair likely will make his debut against the Redskins.

Before leaving camp today, the Packers took up a collection for "Baldy", a little boy who does a thousand and one things for the players around the camp. Everybody was in exceptionally good spirits today as the team left. It was a long grind - two workouts a day every day except days after games, the afternoon between games and two exceptions. Ronzani gave the boys a morning off as a reward for good work and the other half day off resulted from heavy rain. As a result, the boys are in terrific condition. It showed up as they belted a sluggish Giant eleven, 31 to 7, in Minneapolis on Saturday night. Ronzani is looking forward to a rugged struggle in Spokane. He put it this way: "We beat the Giants because their pass game wasn't up to par and we stopped their running game. But the Cardinals will come out with a stronger passing game and a strong running game."

PACKERS BREAK UP TRAINING CAMP AT GRAND RAPIDS

AUG 26 (Grand Rapids) - The Green Bay Packers break up training camp here late today and head for Spokane, WA, where they will play an exhibition game before heading back for their first showing this season on Wisconsin soil. The Packers, who whipped the New York Giants 31-7 at Minneapolis last Saturday in an exhibition, will meet the Chicago Cardinals in Spokane Saturday. Then it's home to Green Bay for their 1953 home state debut against the Washington Redskins, September 5. After the New York game, Packer coach Gene Ronzani said, "we'll be a different ball club about the time we meet Washington in Green Bay." He was pleased with the lopsided victory but admitted "our timing and play execution was off." Ronzani said the Washington game "will give us a good insight on the 1953 league season." Curly Lambeau's Redskin attack is wrapped around Eddie Le Baron and rookie quarterback Jack Scarbath, and such backs as Chuck Drazenovich, Julie Rykovich, Charley Justice, Leon Heath and Harry Gilment. It will be the Redskins first appearance in Green Bay. The game will give Wisconsin fans their first look at the Packers' crop of rookie backs - Gib Dawson, the All-Star game's most valuable player; Don Barton and Al Carmichael, the Packers' number one draft choice. Ronzani announced Tuesday he is asking waivers on tackle Joe Sabol of Tennessee and ends Stan Leuza of St. Bonaventure and Nate Harland of Cincinnati.

WILDUNG LETS IT BE KNOWN HE COULD BE INDUCED TO PLAY AGAIN

AUG 26 (Milwaukee Journal) - The "eyes of Texas" will be on the Packers this fall as never before. No fewer than 10 of Gene Ronzani's hirelings hail from the land of oil: Don Barton, Gib Dawson, Carl Mayes, Bob Dillon and Bill Georges from the University of Texas, Bill Howton and Tobin Rote from Rice, Bobby Jack Floyd from TCU, and Val Joe Walker and Bill Forester from SMU...Dick Wildung, one of football's greatest tackles with the Packers until he retired a couple of years ago, has the itch again and let

it be known while Ronzani was in Minneapolis over the weekend that he could be induced to return. He is 31. A little late, it seems, to be resuming play. Ronzani didn't discourage the couriers, however. "Tell him to come and see me," he told them. Wildung has a hardware business in Redwood Falls, MN...Arnie Galiffa, the old Army quarterback, whom the Packers traded to the New York Giants two weeks ago for Val Joe Walker and a high draft choice, will get his service discharge within a week or two, says the grapevine, and will report to Steve Owen at once. He was a Packer draftee a couple of years ago. The Giants can use him...Tony Canadeo, the old Gray Ghost who retired this season after 11 years with the Packers, sat in the stands through the first quarter of last Saturday's game with the Giants in Minneapolis, then couldn't stand it any longer and moved down to the bench. "That's awful to be up there," he said later. "How do you guys stand it?" Tony figures that by November, with gradual "preparation", he will be ready to do four quarters in the stands...Green Bay still has one player coming from Detroit in the deal by which Jug Girard went to the Lions a year ago. PAUL, POLSFOOT, GAMBOLD MAY START IN PRO GRID GAME HERE

AUGUST 26 (Spokane Daily Chronicle) - Chicago's pro grid Cardinals figure on doing it the hard way Saturday evening in Memorial Stadium - if they do it at all. Coach Joe Stydahar, en route with his team to Spokane today, sent word ahead he expects his toughest preseason game when the Cards tie into the Green Bay Packers in the Athletic Round Table-sponsored grid feature. 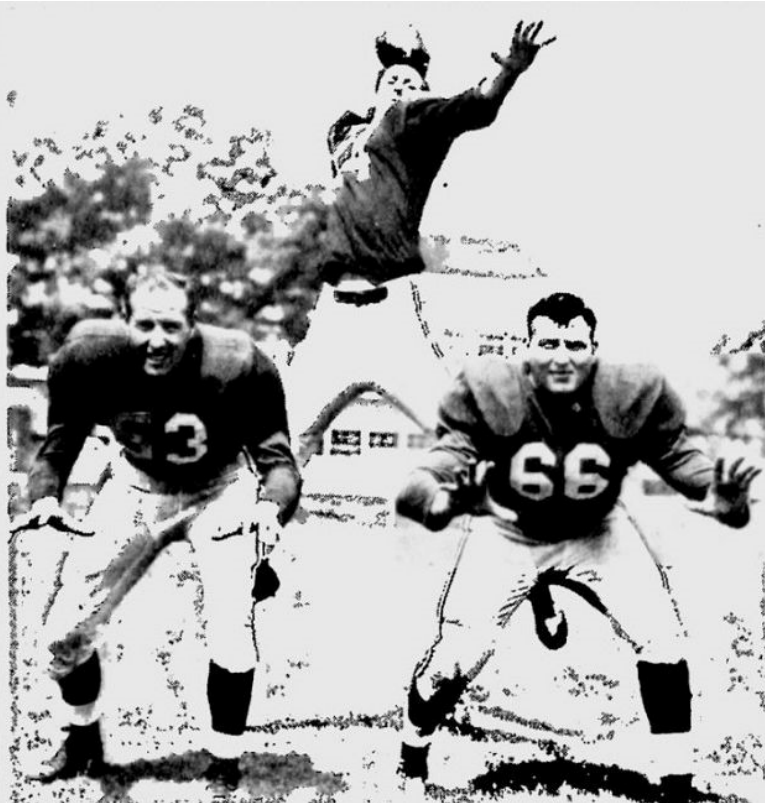

Jack Vainisi, Packer scout who returned from the Packer camp today, said "Dick was really saddened by the news." Flowers had made a lot of friends among the Packers, especially with Parilli and Rote. In addition, Flowers was aware of the "extra training" he was picking up just by playing every day behind R and P. Packer coach Gene Ronzani spent a long time with his aides, Ray McLean, Chuck Drulis and Hugh Devore, yesterday in discussing the pros and cons of the trade, after which Ronzani said he was making the deal "reluctantly."...GET CHOICE FOR FREE AGENT: One "factor" that prompted them to go ahead was one

Bob Forte, the Packers' linebacker and captain. Forte is available for quarterback duty in case of "calamity" to Rote or Parilli. Bob had considerable QB experience in college and Army ball and handled the chores for a month in camp last fall while the team awaited Parilli from the All Star game. In addition, the Packers are obtaining a draft choice for a 1950 free agent. Untouched by the draft, Flowers was signed in the spring of 1950 but was called into the Marines. At Northwestern, he broke a lot of Otto Graham's records. The Colts currently are being quarterbacked by Fred Enke, the former Detroit second-stringer. Their QB hopes got a rude shock when Bob Williams, the former Chicago Bear, was called into service for two years. Williams had been traded to the Colts for a draft choice - contingent upon his playing. Since he went into service, Williams reverted back to the Bears, and, of course, the deal is off. The Colts are free of service worries since Enke and Flowers are both veterans...Flowers was impressive in his 30 days with the Packers. Not a flashy passer or ball handler, Flowers usually got the ball where it was supposed to go. In one stretch at camp, he completed 22 straight throws. He pitched

two touchdowns passes in the intra-squad game and played part of the third quarter and all of the fourth frame against the New York Giants. Flowers left the squad as they passes through Minneapolis yesterday. The Packers are presently en route to Spokane, Wash., where they'll play the Chicago Cardinals Saturday night. Stydahar, finally getting around to talking about his Cardinals, said he sees the game Saturday as a tossup. "I've got to admit I'm pretty high on my own club this year," he said. "We have a great crop of rookies, but we're bringing them along slowly - building a solid foundation, you might say. Don Paul, Fran Polsfoot, and Bob Gambold, all ex-Washington Staters, and Marv Beguhl, formerly of U. of Idaho, all will see action here Saturday." Stydahar said he is particularly impressed with the Cardinal defensive line. He pointed out that Baltimore made only 31 yards against Chicago in the last start at Lubbock, Texas. "We were in scoring position five time and missed four field goal attempts," he pointed out. Coach Gene Ronzani and his Packers are due in Spokane by train at 12:55 this evening. Ticket sales for the game are reported excellent by D.D. McHenry, ticket manager for the contest. Many good tickets are still available, however, it was reported. Members of the Cardinal coaching staff will make guest appearances at the Lions club, Kiwanis club, and other local service organizations. Round Table officials said they intend to present Tony Canadeo, ex-veteran Packer star and former Gonzaga university ace; Bing Crosby, now vacationing at Hayden lake, and Ray Flaherty, former Washington Redskins mentor, to the crowd during halftime ceremonies. The weather outlook for Saturday night is reported favorable.

The head coach, with a deep, gravelly voice, refused to let newspapermen interview any of his players - and promptly hied himself off to bed. Walker did a tremendous job in his first pro appearance against the New Yorkers. The Packers are expected to work out tonight at the stadium. Game officials said today they expect a sellout crowd for the tilt. The BOF lodge band of 45 pieces, with Howard Moss as director, will play during the game and at halftime.

PACKERS SEEK WIN NO. 2 AGAINST CARDS TONIGHT

AUG 29 (Spokane) - Babe Parilli, the brilliant sophomore quarterback, will start for the Green Bay Packers in their non-championship football game against the Chicago Cardinals in Spokane Memorial stadium here tonight. A crowd of around 25,000 fans will watch the contest - second for each club this season and the first pro match here since 1946. Among the spectators will be the noted film star and songbird, Bing Crosby, who has a home near here. For additional color, former Packer Tony Canadeo, an all-time football star at Gonzaga university here, will be on hand to take a bow. He was known as the Grey Ghost of Gonzaga in his amateur day, 1938-39-40, and cavorted over the same turf the pros will be kicking up tonight. Packer coach Gene Ronzani apparently plans to alternate starting his two great quarterbacks, Parilli and the four-year veteran, Tobin Rote. Tobe started against the New York Giants in Minneapolis a week ago tonight - a 31 to 7 victory for the Packers - and likely will get the nod against Washington in Green Bay next Saturday. Ronzani also plans to open with veterans in the other three spots in the backfield - Breezy Reid at left half, Larry Coutre at right and Fred Cone at fullback. The line will be veterans with the exception of Jim Ringo, the Syracuse rookie at center. As the game progresses, Ronzani plans to send his new halfback power into the conflict - Al Carmichael, Don Barton and Gib Dawson. Carmichael, well known out here after a career at Southern California, could possibly start at right half. Ronzani revealed today that Bill Forester, 230-pound tackle-fullback-linebacker rookie, will get his first chance at fullback. He'll operate behind Fred Cone. Forester was unable to play against the Giants because of injuries suffered in the College All Star camp. The contest will give Ronzani and members of his staff, Ray McLean, Chuck Drulis and Hugh Devore, another opportunity to view the rookies in action. The three key spots to watch will be middle guard where Floyd Harrawood will attempt to keep up the good work against the Giants; defensive halfback where Val Joe Walker will perform, and defensive end where Bill Murray and Bill Georges will continue their first to take the job vacated by Ab Wimberly. The Packers move into action tonight in the best of spirits - physically and mentally. They are anxious to grab win No. 2 as means of preparing themselves for the Washington Redskin game. Coach Joe Stydahar's Chicago Cardinals, upset by 10-7 by Baltimore in their opener last week, are expected to furnish the Packers with more trouble than the Giants did. The Cardinals, unlike New York, have a tough passing attack and a ground game as good as the Giants. Stydahar is expected to start UCLA rookie quarterback Ray Nagel and then give Purdue small man, Dale Samuels, a try. The big guns in the Cardinal backfield will be veteran Charley Trippi

AUG 29 (Green Bay) – The word came down from Canada the other day that the Packers' Billy Grimes is seeking a position with the Hamilton "football" team. This arrived as quite a surprise in this corner because of Grimes' telephone statements – made to coach Gene Ronzani early last summer – that he wanted to stay out of football a year, he didn't want to play with anybody but Green Bay, et cetera. Grimes' jump to Canada, of course, washes all of these "good intentions" down the drain. Billy is one of 125 American players seeking football work up there. Only 73 will be retained because each club is allowed on a certain number of "imports". Other Packers up there are Al Baldwin with Hamilton; Leon Manley with Edmonton; Stan Heath with Calgary; and Jack Jacobs with Winnipeg. The Packers haven't been hit as hard as other NFL clubs by the Canadians. The five Packer players can't be considered as "key" players but the Giants, for instance, lost just what they needed – Oklahoma's great quarterback, Al Crowder – not to mention Bobby Marlow of Alabama. Gone from the Baltimores are Billy Vessels, Bob Celeri and Frank Tripucka. The Bears lost Chuck Hunsinger and a couple of others; the Forty Niners Frankie Albert. The good treatment on the part of the club and the fans in Green Bay is one good reason a lot of Packers thumb their noses at their mouth. Players around the league like to play in Green Bay because "it's like their hometown," they say.

PACKERS TO MEET CARDS IN SPOKANE

AUG 29 (Spokane, WA) - The improving Green Bay Packers, with all 43 players reported in top shape, meet the once-beaten Chicago Cardinals Saturday night in the season's second exhibition game for both. Kickoff is set for 10 p.m. The game, which will be broadcast over WEMP and WTMJ, is expected to draw 20,000 fans. The sponsoring Athletic Round Table guaranteed \$20,000 to each team and give the exhibition proceeds to charity. Coach Gene Ronzani said his Packers came through last week's 31-7 victory over the New York Giants without a serious injury. Bill Forester, 230-pound rookie from SMU

PRO GRID GAME MAY BE ANNUAL

AUG 29 (Spokane Daily Chronicle) - The possibility of a big-time professional football game for Spokane every fall loomed strong today. Directors of the Athletic Round Table, sponsor of the tilt tonight between the Chicago Cardinals and Green Bay Packers of the National league, will meet before game time to discuss the prospect of making such a game an annual attraction. The ART's hopes were enhanced by the statements of Walter Wolfner, managing director of the Cardinals, who said the team would be glad to come back to Spokane. "We've favored, for some time, getting a foothold in the Northwest," he said. The Athletic Round Tablers figure they'll break about even on this evening's benefit clash. Total cost of staging the affair has been estimated at around \$65,000 - with \$20,000 apiece guaranteed to each team. By 11 o'clock today \$55,000 worth of tickets had been sold, ticket manager Don McHenry reported. McHenry estimated that around 22,500 fans will see tonight's game. He said a near sellout is possible if the skies remain clear. The stadium contains 25,463 permanent seats, and 1,000 bleacher seats have been erected for high school boys and girls. The city was jammed with out-of-towners arriving for the game, and Round Table officials indicated the visitors might make up at least half the crowd. The Packers will leave Spokane by train immediately after the game. The Cards will stay over till Sunday and depart by air.

PACKERS RATED SLIGHT FAVORITES TO DEFEAT CARDS

AUG 29 (Spokane Daily Chronicle) - The irresistible force meets the immovable object tonight at 8 o'clock in Spokane Memorial stadium - and may the better team emerge victorious, as they say in boxing. The big Chicago Cardinal-Green Bay Packer professional football battle, sponsored by the Athletic Round Table, was ready for delivery today - to what officials of the ART hope will be a near capacity turnout. Ticket sales have been booming all week, and unless the weatherman tosses a monkey wrench in the proceedings, a turnout of 25,000 is expected to view two of the nation's top pro squads collide in the earliest major football opener this city has seen in many years. Partly cloudy - that's the prospect. Meteorologist Arwin C. Hoge was optimistic enough to report the game may get a break. But, he said, it'll be cool. Additional bus service will be available straight through to the stadium from Bernard and Riverside, City Line officials said. The game is a tough one to figure - but the general consensus has it that the Packers of Coach Gene Ronzani are favored to win by at least six points. Fattening his belief is the fact they whipped the New York Giants 31-7 a week ago. The tilt has a hometown flavor in that three ex-Washington State college stars, Don Paul, Fran Polsfoot and Bob Gambold, and one former Idaho player, Marv Beguhl, will see action. All four, as well as a flock of other rookies and veterans, will be shooting the works to keep their jobs - because both teams must cut to the league limit of 33 players by the time the regular fall schedules open. Neither Ronzani nor Coach Stydahar of the Cards will cast the smallest inkling, at the moment, on who may get the ax. The quarterback position for the Packers, for instance, is an example of the terrific competition going on for jobs. When you have talented stars like Vito Parilli and Tobin Rote battling for a spot - brother, you've got a fight. Other great names pitching for steady paychecks are Arnold Galiffa, Army's great quarterback, who made All-America in 1949, and Gil Reich, once the leader of the U. of Kansas team and a former star at West Point. The game would jell into a swell aerial duel, what with the Packers having won the NFL's passing championship in 1952. Officials say the team has strengthened a running attack that left little to be desired last season. Plenty of ground moxie will be contributed to the offense by Al Carmichael, the ex-Southern California star, and Gib Dawson and Don Barton, from the U. of Texas. The Cards are strengthened by the return of Bill Fisher, who laid out most of last season due to illness. The former Notre Damer was captain of the Cards last year, and will be the only veteran guard in the Chicago offensive line. One of the lightest but fastest men in the Cardinal lineup is 160-pound Uzziel Weeks of Iowa State. Weeks is a scatback and reportedly as elusive as a jackrabbit in 10 acres of prairie. The Card defensive line may give the Packers trouble. It yielded only 31 yards to the Baltimore Colts in a recent game at Lubbock, Texas. A halftime feature tonight will be the joint presentation to the crowd of Bing Crosby, Tony Canadeo, former Gonzaga star, and Ray Flaherty, ex-Washington Redskin mentor.

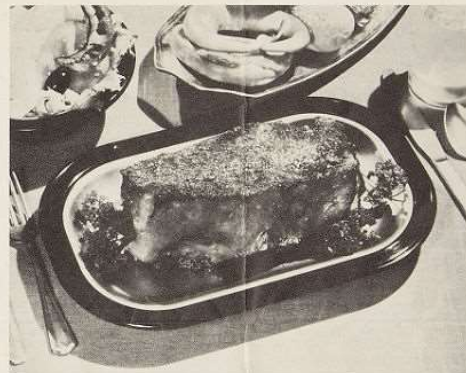
