(BOSTON) - It was like the Cardinal game back home last Aug. 16 - this 10 to 0 victory over the New York Giants here Tuesday night. Sure, the score was mite different (Lambeau's Cards fell, 17 to 14) but that flaming spirit - probably the most vital factor in the preseason campaign literally oozed out of every move the Packers made on offense or defense and more than made up for the club's point scarcity. A crowd of 12,053 cheered madly and the Packers whooped it up like a bunch of college kids as the guns barked the clincher to the Packers' second big upset. This one was particularly juicy because the Giants had bounced the Chicago Bears, 10-7, in Syracuse. The Packers' great surge in spirit was evident right from the start was the famed New York backfield led by the great Charley Conerly, bumped into the rock-ribbed Packer line. The Giants never really threatened the Packer goal line all night; they made a measly 43 yards by rushing and only 51 by passing.

OFFENSE EXPLODES TWICE

The Packer offense, still far from peak efficiency, kept the Giants on their heels. It exploded twice - first off the reliable toe of Ted Fritsch for a 39-


yard field goal in the first quarter and second in the fourth quarter for a vital touchdown by fullback Jack Cloud. The touchdown drive covered 69 yards in 14 plays, with two great pass plays from Tobin Rote to Al Baldwin eating up 48 yards. The game marked the first real debut of rookie Rote, the Rice star, who operated like a veteran in handling the entire offense at quarterback. Tobin, working carefully, outpitched his more illustrious enemy, Mr. Conerly, 103 yards to 57. Rote completed nine out of 17 and Conerly 12 out of 32. The Packers' fierce play resulted in splendid protection for Rote but on the other hand Conerly was flat on his back most of the night. Travis Tidwell, the rookie ace working under Conerly, was likewise forced to eat pigskin in his brief stay just before the halftime. The Packers kept the play in Giant territory three-fourths of the time. Walt Schlinkman made the first big break-through with a 21-yard punt return to set up Fritsch's field

goal. Late in the second quarter, Billy Grimes returned a punt 60 yards to the Giants' 20-yard line to set up two touchdown chances that backfired.

CANADEO RUNS AT FULLBACK

Green Bay's ground offense, still lagging, saw Grimes and Tony Canadeo, the latter running from fullback for the first time against a league foe, each pick up 15 yards. Schlinkman made 13 yards. Jug Girard, still unaccustomed to running through the plays at his new spot - left half, tried once for seven yards. The defensive heroes were many. The linebackers were terrific in forming a second line behind the charging front wall. Clay Tonnemaker, the Minnesota giant, Carl Schuette, Bob Forte, and Bob Summerhays made the Giant backs sorry to pierce the first line. With Rebel Steiner, Alex Wizbicki, and Cloud working effectively in the outer garden, the Packer pass defense kept receivers like Bill Swiacki and Gene Roberts from going anywhere. Living up to his promise to start Boston-bred Al Cannava, Head Coach Gene Ronzani opened with Cannava on offense at left halfback, despite the fact that he hadn't practiced for a week. Cannava promptly caught a Rote

pass for a nine-yard gain and the initial first down of the game after the Giants were stalled in three trips after the opening kickoff. The first down somehow got a rise out of the New Yorkminded fans and the Packers started drawing the cheers. The Giants tried again but again a Conerly punt 21 yards to the Giants 43 - the first time New York land has been pierced. The blood sign was out as Grimes rolled 13 yards in two carries to the 30 but Grimes missed fire in two more tries and a pass from Rote to Girard went incomplete on the goal line. Fritsch then stepped back on the 39 and sliced the uprights for three points. The Giants stormed back with a 13-yard march to their own 43 after the ensuing kickoff but three downs later they found themselves on their own 18 as the Packer line, with Abner Wimberly making two great tackles, smashed 'em back 25 yards in two plays. A 15-yard holding penalty forced Conerly to punt - a beauty to the Packer 43. Rote completed six yard passes to Baldwin and Girard. It wasn't enough to overcome a penalty, so the Giants launched a drive on their own 37 early in the second quarter. Conerly ran for 13 and then passed to Clay for 12 to move to the Packers 39. With Tonnemaker smacking Conerly for a five-yard loss trying to pass, the Packers, in a fine stand, forced Conerly to punt. Neither team could budge the other in a series of punts until Grimes caught one of Conerly's long boots on the Packer 20 and stampeded 60 yards to the Giants 20. Grimes bumped into Schlinkman after catching the pass and then skidded around seven or eight tacklers before



the heavy Giant traffic gummed him up. In five minutes before halftime, the Packers had two opportunities to score but, let's not forget, the Packers still need a lot of polish. After Grimes' run, Rote's pass was incomplete to Ted Cook and Grimes ran for two. A pass to Grimes also misfired and a fourth down heave to Baldwin was batted down. The Packers pickled the Giants back 15 yards and Tom Landry punted from his own end zone to his own 27. Again the Packers had a big chance. It started to materialize on Rote's nice nine yarder to Grimes but two more passes failed and a fourth was intercepted by Emlen Tunnell.

TWO N.Y. FIRST DOWNS

The Giants came out with fire at the start of the second quarter but the Packers were ready, quickly forcing Conerly to punt. A 15 yard penalty for holding brought on a Girard punt and the Giants rolled up two first downs to the Packer 46, where Tonnemaker, Wildung, Schuette and Pritko messed up three straight plays, bringing another Giant punt. The Packers

repeated the two-first down feat as Schlinkman and Canadeo advanced 10 yards and Wimberly caught a Rote pass for a 16 yard gain to the Giants' 49. The attack bogged down and the Giants launched a drive that started on their own 15, advanced to the Packer 45 and finally retreated (under pressure) back to their own 24. Conerly passed to Roberts for 12, to Swiacki for eight and to Roberts for 10. Then, on two successive plays, the Packer line smeared the Giants back nearly 30 yards. On third down with Swiacki practically in the clear, Steiner came out of nowhere to ambush the ball and Swiacki together. The Giants had to punt and the Packers launched their touchdown march from the N.Y. 31. Baldwin started it by making a spectacular catch of a Rote pass for 20 yards to the Giants' 49. Baldwin hooked the ball with two Giants hanging on. Canadeo banged away for seven yards in two tries and Bob Forte hit around left end for five more and health position on the 37. Grimes was smeared for a minus two but Rote got off an accurate pass to Baldwin with Giants on both sides of him, for a 28-yard gain to the Giants' 11. Canadeo cracked the left side for two and two Rote passes fell incomplete, the second skipping out of Baldwin's hands in the end zone. On fourth down, Wimberly went up on the two yard line but three Giants strangled him and the officials called interference, providing an automatic first down. The powerful Giant line all but stopped the Packers' scoring thrust. Jack Cloud was held for no gain but Schlinkman slammed within six inches of the cash register. Cloud tried right tackle for no gain but on fourth down Jack slashed over just outside left end. Fritsch kicked the ball into the stands for point No. 10. Forrest Griffith took Fritsch's kickoff on the 5 and wheeled about 50 yards to the Packers' 46 before Franklin Ellis kept him from going the distance with a sharp tackle. The attack reached the Packer 25 but a knockdown by Steiner and Pritko's smearing of Conerly for a one-yard loss gave Green Bay the ball on downs. The Packers stalled wisely but Girard had to punt. In four final tries, the Giants, or rather Conerly, were spilled back 12 yards as Wildung, Joe Spencer, Steiner and many others tore up the Giant backfield like so much tissue paper.

GAME NOTES

The Packers entered the game with a weight disadvantage. During pregame workouts in a steady downpour, the Packer uniforms were thoroughly soaked up, while the Giants kept their jerseys dry with rain jackets. The two hour rain, which ruined any possibility of a 30,000 crowd, ceased as the clubs finished their drill. Chalk lines on half of the field not covered by a big nylon tarpaulin had to be retraced shortly before the kickoff. A huge fireworks set piece in the form of a football with the wording "Green Bay Packers" was "exploded" and burned as the lights were cut off before the game...The Packers were scheduled to take off in their chartered Capital Airliner at 10 o'clock Green Bay time this morning and arrive at Austin Straubel field three and a half or four hours later.


Packers Boom Season Ticket Sale; Four Games Here

FIVE MORE SHOPPING DAYS FOR PACK SEASON DUCATS!

AUG 30 (Green Bay) - There are five more shopping days left for Packer season tickets. Five days in which the Packer office will be open to sell you the better situated seats for all four Packer games at City stadium this fall. Carl Mraz, director of ticket sales, announced today that the sale of season tickets will close at midnight Tuesday, Sept. 5. That means that sale of individual game tickets will begin Friday, Sept. 8, giving the office two days to make the changeover. And there are some good seats left for sale on a season ticket basis, Mraz said. Season tickets give the buyer the advantage of having the same seats for all games and the chance to get those seats or better ones again the following season. Mraz announced that the ticket office would remain open all day Saturday, and would be open on Monday (Labor Day) morning. It will also be open this Friday night as usual. All fans who have reserved season tickets must pick them up by that time also, Mraz warned, and the same goes for persons who have made partial payments on seats. Once the season ticket sale is out of the way the Packers will concentrate on selling individual game tickets for the Detroit Lions game here Sept. 17. As usual, it isn't expected that there will be much effort required to sell seats for the Bear game Oct. 1, but Mraz did say that the Bear game was not sold out, that there were good tickets available, and that they too can be had right after Sept. 8.



On the other hand, the coaches and players are confident that "we can score, and plenty, once we get our offense down pat." AUG 31 (Green Bay) - The lionhearted Packers didn't win the world championship in Boston Tuesday night and, risking indignant condemnation from the citizens of this community who firmly believe that the first word which appears in Webster's famous volume is "FOOTBALL", it is probably fortunate that they hadn't. Before being drawn and quartered for such blasphemy, let it be chronicled in self defense that if Green Bay's idolized athletic sons had come home with the title,

SEPT 1 (Green Bay) - Jack Lavalle, the wonderful round man who scouts for the New York Giants, was feeling mighty low after the Packers posted a 10-0 victory. Asked what happened, Jack threw out his massive chest and declared: "We beat the Bears!" Lavalle, in his own subtle way, was reporting that the Giants were on the overconfident side after gluing the Chicago Bears to the Syracuse turf, 7 to 3. Jumbo Jack paid tribute to the Packers' great spirit with: "You can win a lot of ball games with that fight, and don't forget it." The Giants had plenty of opportunity to gather their "confidence" since it was obvious in the first five minutes that the Packers were out for that proverbial blood. Before Ted Fritsch kicked his 39-yard field goal, the Giants had the ball for two series of plays and gained only seven yards. They rushed three times for a total of seven yards, incompleted three passes and punted twice. After Fritsch's field goal, the Giants started to come to life. They ran for a first down in three plays. But that was the signal for the Packers to fight a little harder. The resulting effort smashed the New Yorkers back 30 yards in three plays. And so it went. The New York writers were sick. They had no explanation for

this defeat since the Giants never came close to scoring all night. The Boston press, by the way, was quite sassy. Apparently taking side with the New York writers, the Bostonians overlooked the Packers' great play and made big news of the "fact" that the professional footballers weren't able to score (they didn't say what) as much as the hometown Red Sox, who had piled up 13, 12 and 11 runs in three straight games. Regardless, the Packers left Boston with the professional football championship of New England under the belts, the game being the first and last pro test there this season. The Packers hold a degree of superiority over the Chicago clubs – Bears and Cardinals. The Cards, of course, fell here while the Giants had whipped the Bears. Packers To Battle Colts Sunday

PACKERS TO BATTLE COLTS SUNDAY

SEPT 5 (Green Bay) - The Packers' last test case before the start of arguments in Judge Bert Bell's courtroom - the NFL - is scheduled in Milwaukee Sunday afternoon, with the Baltimore Colts furnishing the opposition. Green Bay will be seeking its third consecutive winning decision while the Colts, the league's so-called "swing" team, will be in search of their first favorable verdict, after six straight setbacks. The Packers will be playing their first and last day game of the nonchampionship season, all previous contests being conducted under artificial lights. Milwaukee may provide the Packers with their largest crowd of the non-loop program. More than 25,000 fans are expected to attend the charity event which is sponsored by the Wisconsin Shrine clubs. Of the three previous games, the crowd of 20,136 here for the Chicago Cardinal game was tops. Nearly 10,000 saw the Packer-Cleveland game in Toledo and heavy rain kept the attendance at the Packer-NY Giant game in Boston down to 12,053...SCRIMMAGE AT STADIUM: They opened firing Sunday with a red hot scrimmage at City stadium Sunday afternoon. It was Public Practice day and the crowd, at its peak, was estimated at 7,500. There was no admission charge. Labor Day's program include a workout in the morning, rest in the afternoon and a blackboard test at night. The scrimmage was not without a heartbreak. Veteran end Ted Cook suffered a leg injury and may be out of commission for a short spell. Watching the game in civilian clothes was fullback Jack Cloud, just released from the hospital. Cloud hurt his knee in the Giant game. Not one to go overboard, Packer Head Coach Gene Ronzani had no optimistic post-scrimmage statements to make but he did manage to crack a smile or two. There was no evidence of a crying towel - at least not at that particular time. Just about everybody - with emphasis on the rookies - got into the scrimmage, a controlled session with the coaches on the field...COUTRE BREAKS LOOSE: One of the highlights was the running of right halfbacks Billy Grimes and Larry Coutre. Grimes, already proven, was doing what comes naturally in the pro ranks, but Coutre was making his debut, so to speak. Coutre, the ex-Notre Damer who has been in camp only 11 days, never gained less than six yards in about seven trips. Once, he squeezed through a slit a foot wide in the line and broke into the clear for 10 yards. Another halfback who was running as if his life depended on it was Al Cannava, the rookie from Boston college. He reeled off a couple of good gains, one for 25 yards. Tony Canadeo and Ted Fritsch got in a few licks at fullback, but Bob Summerhays pounded out for the most yardage in two or three tries. On one occasion, Summerhays dented in his helmet being tackled. At one stretch, a backfield composed of Tobin Rote, Harry Szulborski, Bob Forte and Summerhays

moved 40 yards on ground plays. Rote handled most of the quarterbacking and pitched touchdown passes to ends George Benigni and Abner Wimberly. Tom O'Malley, the new quarterback obtained in a trade with the Cleveland Browns, watched the proceedings behind the offensive backfield with the coaches. With about five minutes left, O'Malley took over and displayed considerable savvy as a magician and passer. On his touchdown pass to Wimberly, a 30-yard throw, O'Malley dodged a "certain" tackle by defensive left end Claude Radtke and got the strike off...BIG TOWN: Green Bay got off a look at three NFL teams over the weekend. The Philadelphia Eagles landed at Austin Straubel field at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon and then took a bus for Two Rivers where they'll train for the Bear game in Chicago Sunday. The Baltimore Colts, the Packers' opponent in Milwaukee Sunday, arrived on the Milwaukee Road at 4:23 today

Here's the "minus" figures by quarters: First, six yards, nine; second, five, five, fourteen, four, six; third, seven; fourth, eleven, five, two, five, five and six. In the Cardinal game here Aug. 16, quarterback Paul Christman was bumped back 32 yards trying to pass. Pitchin' Paul hit the turf four times for ten, three, ten and nine-yard setbacks...Two players, both rookies, were dropped from the squad today, Ronzani announced. They are John Cahill, guard and alumnus of St. Norbert college, and quarterback Lee Pete, ex-University of Toledo athlete. Cahill, used primarily in the Packers' kickoff formations, had played in both the Cardinal and New York Giant games. Pete, troubled with a sore arm, didn't see action in a non-league encounter but did play in the intra-squad games at Iron Mountain and Elkhart, Ind.


COLTS "LOAD; ACQUIRE 5 PLAYERS

Acquired from the Bears are quarterback George Blanda, guard Jim Crawford, end Bob Jensen and halfbacks Bob Perina and Ernie Zalejski and fullback Jim Spavital. Terms of the deal were not disclosed. Blanda and Perina are veterans. Fullback Spavital and tackle Urban Odson, former Packer, were obtained from the Bears 10 days ago. The Colts are training at Alpine resort here. They'll leave for Milwaukee Saturday night.

Packers Get HB Boedeker From Browns

PACKERS GET HB BOEDEKER FROM BROWNS

SEPT 6 (Green Bay) - A battle developed on the Packer scene today - at left halfback. Head Coach Gene Ronzani, definitely not standing pat after two upset victories, dropped a left half, rookie Jimmy Clark of Ohio State, and added Billy Boedeker, a running and pass receiving standout with the Cleveland Browns for thee years. The transaction left the Packers with half a dozen left halfbacks still fighting for a 1950 job - veteran Walt Schlinkman, shifted from fullback this year; veteran Jug Girard, shifted from quarterback; Wally Dreyer, brought in from the Chicago Bears; rookies Al Cannava and Harry Szulborski; and Boedeker. Clark was one of five players cut loose today. The others are ends Franklin Ellis and Claude Radtke, guard Jim Thomas and right halfback-fullback Mike Graham. Dispatched yesterday were guard John Cahill and quarterback Lee Pete...ROSTER AT 42 PLAYERS: Thus, the Packer roster had been shaved to 42 players - 16 backs, eight ends, seven tackles, seven guards and four centers. More cuts are expected shortly to reduce the squad to the league limit of 32 for the league opener Sept. 17. This figure, however, may be raised to 35 because of the war. Ronzani is enthusiastic about obtaining Boedecker. "He can catch passes, too," Ronzani said, indicating that the former Brown is something of a runner "too". Boedeker, who stopped at his home in Pontiac, Mich., after leaving Cleveland Tuesday, will report here late today or early Thursday. Born in Milwaukee, the new back is 26 years of age. He was awarded the Bronze Star and Purple Heart for service in the Army Infantry in the last war. The newcomer, who played three seasons with the Browns after one

with the Chicago Hornets, established a record in the defunct All-America conference last year for the best average gain by pass receiving. Bill caught 11 for 371 yards and two touchdowns for an average gain of 33.7 yards. In 1948, when Boedecker saw his first real action with the Browns, Bill caught 13 for 237 yards and two touchdowns for an average of 18.2...SCORED TD AGAINST BROWNS: As a runner, Boedeker carried 78 yards for 254 yards and an average of 3.26 in 1948 and lugged 50 times for 269 yards and an average of 5.38 yards in 1949. He counted three TDs in '48 and one last fall. Cleveland Coach Paul Brown was first impressed with Boedeker in 1946 when Bill, as a Hornet, took a kickoff against the Browns and ran 58 yards for a TD. At the close of the campaign, Brown made a deal that brought Boedeker to Cleveland. The Cleveland press agent, Russ Gestner, calls Boedeker a "reckless" runner. He says Bill has good speed and is an exceptional pass receiver. Boedeker attended both De Paul university and Kalamazoo college, completing his education during the off season in the last four years. The newcomer stands 5-11 and weighs 195 pounds...The Packers continued their intensive work on offense today as they pointed for the last non-championship game in Milwaukee Sunday afternoon against the Baltimore Colts. The Packers will be going after their third straight non-loop win while the Colts have absorbed six straight losses. The Packers concentrated Tuesday on several new plays. A number of maneuvers were worked as many as 15 times in order to coordinate the timing between the quarterbacks, ball carriers, and linemen...Six more non-league games are left for NFL teams. Two are scheduled Thursday night -Los Angeles at New York Giants and Washington vs. New York Yanks at Kansas City. Saturday night, Curly Lambeau's Chicago Cardinals face Detroit at Birmingham. Besides the Baltimore-Packer clash Sunday, Philadelphia battles the Bears in Chicago and San Francisco invades Pittsburgh. One of the highlights this weekend will be the Washington-Yank game. The Redskins are unbeaten and the Yanks have a 2-1 record, their only loss being a one-pointer (34-33) to the Bears.

Washington, Green Bay's "traditional" foe, will be seeking its fifth straight win. The league's grand opening is set for the following weekend. In the main attraction, the Philadelphia Eagles and Cleveland will clash in Philly Saturday night before 100,000 fans. The next day, Detroit invades Green Bay, the Bears go to Los Angeles, the Giants play at Pittsburgh, the Yanks invade San Francisco and Washington is at Baltimore.

COLTS' FUTURE SEEMS ASSURED IN BALTIMORE

SEPT 6 (Baltimore) - All over town people are asking what is happening to the Colts and the suspicion is spreading this will be the last year for professional football in the city. Things are not that bad. Unless the fans quit completely on the Colts this fall, Baltimore will remain in the National league. It is true much of the enthusiasm and confidence built up over the last three years has been lost under the leadership of the present regime and the showing of the ball club through the exhibition season. The leadership has not been up to expectations. President Abe Watner saved the club at the close of last season by agreeing to be responsible for it after the civic group felt it had suffered sufficient financial loss over two costly season of competition between the All-America conference and the National league. But he did little after that to make the Colts an equal of the other teams after peace was established in professional football. He knew little about the game and less about the players. He listened to everyone and no one, which is both costly and dangerous among a group of football owners...TEAM NOT STRENGTHENED TO MATCH FOES: As usual, we let our enthusiasm for the club run ahead of

our judgment, with the result the six straight losses in exhibition games have had a tendency to depress us. They should have been expected. Before the squad went into training, I pointed out there were only four teams in the National League we had a right to expect the Colts to play on even terms. Only one was on the exhibition program played thus far. That was Pittsburgh and the Colts played well against them. It was a good workout and a couple of breaks could have turned it into a Colt victory. In addition, the boys performed better than expected against the Chicago Bears. We had a poor ball club last season in the All-America Conference, and the all-out drive to strengthen it far beyond normal requirements within one year to put it on a par with the majority of the clubs in the new league was not made. Why? I don't think the need was realized by the new president and I suspect the cost was higher than he anticipated before he took over. So Clem Crowe's job, the team's job, the fan's job will be harder, beginning Sunday-a-week. It will be long, uphill fight in every game, where any success will again depend spirit and determination to overcome odds...BALTIMORE NEEDS TIME TO BUILD WINNER: We must face that it is going to take us years to produce a winning Colt team, in view of the distance we are behind the leader of the game. Detroit, Pittsburgh, New York Yanks (now a consolidation of the old Bulldogs and Yankees) are fine examples. The Chicago Cardinals, Philadelphia Eagles and Los Angeles Rams have proved it can be done if a club has time, money and leadership. Unless the Colts quit on the field and the fans quit in the stands this fall, I think the club will remain in

Baltimore long enough to produce a winning team if money and leadership can be found. And I don't think the money will be a serious problem, because the Colts can now be successful financially in pro ball, with progressive leadership over a few years. The last is badly needed. In the meantime, two things must not be forgotten. I have mentioned them before. Professional football is one of the most competitive businesses in the country and a club gets help only by its own effort, smartness and money. We should not expect miracles of the Colt team, which comes home to open the new campaign with Washington at the Stadium on September 17...SOME EXPERIENCED BOYS AMONG NEWCOMERS: I felt in July that three victories in the tough National League competition ahead would be considered progress for the Colts and the results of the six exhibition games have not changed that. They were mauled by an aroused Los Angeles team, but otherwise they were simply beaten by better ball clubs. I predicted that Clem Crowe would make changes right up to the opening game as better fortified teams cut down. That is happening. The Colts yesterday got six players from the Chicago Bears, some of whom know their way around the pro fields and should help. I judge the two most valuable to be Jim Spavital, because of his defensive skill, and quarterback George Blanda. What the Colts have given up in exchange is still not clear, which is another example of the muddled way the present regime runs its affairs. You notice that when Cleveland sent Billy Boedeker to Green Bay, Jim Duncan and Charles Schroll to Detroit, it immediately announced the securing of three draft choices for 1951 in exchanges. To get men to help a club you must pay, and no player is indispensable to the Colts, provided they get sufficient talented prospects in return to fill the gaps that change a group of players into a team.

In other words, the 40-odd Packers are the best possible ticket salesmen in the business. It's no secret that the season ticket sale spurted like made after the fighting Bays clipped the Chicago Cardinals, 17 to 14, here Aug. 16 and then rook another leap after the Pack upset the New York Giants, 10-0, out in Boston, Aug. 29. Ronzani has a good reason to feat Baltimore. The shoe will be on the other foot in Milwaukee, so to speak. If you'll recall, the Packers went into the Cardinal and Giant games as underdogs – the role every coach likes. Sunday, Baltimore will be the underdog on the basis of preseason showings. Ronzani's scouts have informed him that the Colts should have beaten both the Chicago Bears and San Francisco Forty Niners. Their notations on the bottom of their reports read: "Bad breaks handicapped the Colts both times and an even break might have changed the final score in favor of Baltimore."...OBTAINED FIVE BEAR PLAYERS: The Bears ripped Baltimore, 21-17, on the strength of a last minute Johnny Lujack pass while the

Forty Niners came out in front 27-14 with a last quarter rally. Those two scores would indicate lack of reserve power but this matter was taken care of this week when the Colts obtained five Bear players – quarterback George Blanda, guard Jim Crawford, end Bob Jensen and halfbacks Bob Perina and Ernie Zajeski. Crawford, Jensen and Perina probably will see considerable action on defense. Perina was a regular Bear defenseman for two years. If the Colt T-formation is similar to that of the Bears, Blanda may get a whirl at quarterback. The Colt machine is engineered by Y.A. Tittle, a sophomore pro, and rookie Adrian Burk, the highly-touted passer from Baylor. The Colts, training up at Alpine resort at Egg Harbor, will go into Sunday's game well rested. Coach Clem Crowe's boys played their last three games in six days – the Forty Niners on Aug. 30, Los Angeles on Sept. 2, and the New York Yanks Sept. 4. Thus, they'll enter the Packer game with six days of rest...Packer Assistant Coach Dick Plasman left for Kansas City this morning to scout the Washington-New York Yank game there tonight. Assistant Coach Ray Nolting will scout the Cardinal-Detroit game in Birmingham Saturday night and on the way will eye the Bear-Philadelphia game in Chicago Sunday...The Packers welcomed Billy Boedeker, the new halfback, into camp this morning. Boedeker, obtained in a trade with the Cleveland Browns for a 1951 draft choice, came in from Pontiac, Mich., where he spent a day with his family after leaving Cleveland. Boedeker moved into the crowded left halfback competition against veterans Walt Schlinkman and Jug Girard and newcomers Wally Dreyer, Al Cannava and Harry Szulborski. The Packers concentrated on offense again this morning in an effort to step up their point production. The Bays registered seven against Cleveland, 17 against the Cards and 10 against the Giants. Considerable attention was given to a defense against the Colts' aerial machine this afternoon. Baltimore has been known to throw about 35 passes a game, with Tittle calling and throwing 'em.

A THIRD OF RECEIPTS WILL GO TO SHRINE

SEPT 7 (Milwaukee Journal) - Charity will be a full pledged partner in the Shrine sponsored exhibition football game between the Green Bay Packers and Baltimore Colts at State Fair park Sunday afternoon. The contract for the game calls for a three way division of receipts after expenses - one-third going to the Packers, one-third to the Colts and one-third to the sponsoring Shrine. The Shrine, in turn, has earmarked all of its split for the Shrine hospitals for crippled children. The expenses include 15% to the park for rental and 2% to the National league. Under Shrine promotion, the game promises to draw well in excess of 20,000, which would make this the largest crowd to watch the Packers here since the game with the Chicago Cardinals two years ago. The Cardinal game in 1948 drew about 30,000. As part of the sponsorship, the Shrine band and chanters will appear in a half hour concert before the game, and the Shrine units will perform in a pageant between halves.

An interview with Coach Crowe will precede the Packer-Colt game Sunday...Packer Coach Gene (Y.A.) Ronzani was all aches and pains today. He took over Y.A. Tittle's role for nearly an hour Thursday in drilling the Packers' defense for the Colts' air machine. Gene hadn't done so much passing since he retired as a player. Most of the Packer backs were given a crack at defense. Ronzani may be forced to insert a newcomer in Jack Cloud's place on defense since Jack is still bothered with a leg injury. Cloud, a rookie, did an outstanding job against the Cardinals and Giants. Wally Dreyer, the former Bear defenseman, may toil in Cloud's spot. Speaking on injuries, the Packers' ace right halfback, Billy Grimes, may be used sparingly because of a muscle pull. This may throw the offensive load on veteran Bob Forte and rookie Larry Coutre...SIDELIGHTS: Mutryn, a lively guy with the spoken word and apparently the football, greeted Gillespie and the writer with: "You guys come all the way up from Green Bay to see us? Gosh!" The Packers will ride the same Milwaukee Road train from Green Bay to Milwaukee Saturday evening. But Travel Agent Ed Crim has placed one team in the front of the train and the other in the rear. They'll also be separated in Milwaukee, with the Packers staying at the Schroeder hotel and the Colts at the Ambassador. The Colts came out with a novel publicity stunt in putting out a comic book style publication on the 1950 team. The book contains a "cartoon" story, in color, of the club's history and the coaches and players. The theme of the book is "Spirit". The Colts open their "swing" season against the Washington Redskins in Baltimore. The Colts will not play every team as first announced. They'll play two games with nearby Washington and one game with each of the other clubs except the Bears. The Bears, of course, lost the Baltimore game to keep their two-game rivalry with the Cardinals, Crowe finds advantages and disadvantages in coaching a swing team. "It requires extensive scouting and movies aren't too valuable because you don't meet the opponent again. On the other hand, we don't have to play the tough ones twice," he smiled.

RACINE JUMPS BACK ON PACKER BANDWAGON; THE 'CURSE' IS OFF

SEPT 8 (Green Bay) - Racine is back on the Packer bandwagon. This downstate city, just 25 miles from Milwaukee, where the Packers are playing one non-championship and two league games, already has sold nearly 400 tickets for the Packer-Baltimore game in Milwaukee Sunday, and Packer Ticket Chief Carl Mraz has received a request for more ducats. In the last year and a half, Racine's Packer ticket sale has almost been "nil". Racine fans are in a good spot; they can see the Packers or the two Chicago clubs at little extra expense. But down through the years, until midway in 1948, Racine has been Packer-minded since the Green Bay club represented the State of Wisconsin in major league football. Mraz's report on Racine brings to mind a story written by Tex Reynolds, widely-known columnist for the Racine Journal-Times, who occasionally dips into sports for his subject matter. Reynolds' column, written the day after the Packers whipped the Chicago Cardinals, 17-14, follows: "A 'curse' placed in the Green Bay Packers, and Curly Lambeau seems to have been lifted from the team itself, but still clings to Curly. This 'hex', as many will remember was invoked by a Racine fan when the Packers for two years in a row, failed to show up for a Good Fellers' dinner as per promise, and Lambeau never found either the time or the courtesy to even answer letters about it. After the 'curse' was placed, the Packers went downhill steadily, until last year they all but fell apart, both footballically and financially, speaking. Finally, Lambeau left the Packers and went as coach of the Chicago Cardinals. So last night at Green Bay, the Cardinals played the Packers. The Chicago team, on paper, and because of its record, was a top heavy favorite. But the Packers won, and Lambeau, now an invading enemy in his former old home grounds, almost wore his legs down to knee stumps, pacing back and forth. Not being superstitious, I don't think the curse had anything to do with it. But the fact is, the Cardinals (and Curly) were badly outlucked. It was good

to have the Packers win. They showed fine fighting spirit, and personally I'd like to see them go out and win a championship. But they aren't going to - not this year, at least. They had many good breaks last night. They were inspired for their first game before the home folks. They played their heads off. But they are not of the championship caliber in the National league. They'll be beaten by several of the top-notch teams, as they were beaten by Cleveland, 38 to 7, the other night. The Packers undoubtedly will play interesting football this year. They'll be a good team to watch, even when they lose. A year of two hence, with a fair amount of luck, they may be top contenders in the big time. As of now, they are a team of darned good rookies, plus some good veterans, playing under a new coach and learning a new system. You can wish them all the best of luck, as I do, but don't look for miracles."

NEW PACKERS BATTLE COLTS AT MILWAUKEE SUNDAY

SEPT 9 (Milwaukee) - The new Green Bay Packers make their first appearance of the season here Sunday afternoon, meeting the Baltimore Colts, the NFL's swing team, in the final non-championship football game for both teams. Nearly


25,000 fans - the largest crowd at a Packer game in Beer town since 1948 when over 25,000 saw the Cardinals whip the Pack, 17-7 - are expected for the 1950 opener at State Fair park. Kickoff is set for 2 o'clock. The contest is sponsored by Wisconsin Shrine clubs and has been designated as as the first annual Midwest Shrine Charity football game. Proceeds will go to Shrine hospitals which care for crippled children. Both clubs are expecting their roughest and toughest battles. The football future of approximately 25 athletes will be weighed during the course of the game. On Monday, both squads must cut to meet the league limit of 32. The Colts will enter the game with 45 players and the Packers with 42. For the first time this season, the Packers will enter a game as a favorite - strictly on the basis of 1950 performances so far. The Packers, after losing to the Cleveland Browns, 38-7, upset the Chicago Cardinals, 17-14, and the New York Giants, 10-0. The Colts have lost six straight exhibition decisions, but three of the games were played within six days. In addition, the Colts feel that bad breaks robbed them of three victories. Needless to say, the Colts want to return to Baltimore (they've been on the road two weeks) with a victory to set the stage for their league opener against Washington Sept. 17. The Colts haven't won a game since the middle of October, 1949...BANKS ON ROTE: Packer Head Coach Gene Ronzani will bank on rookie quarterback Tobin Rote to lead the Bay offense, with possible assistance from Tom O'Malley, the late arrival from the Cleveland Browns. Coach Clem Crowe of the Colts has at his disposal veteran quarterback Y.A. Tittle, rated one of the finest passers in the game, to handle his point machine. Tittle's favorite receiver, halfback Billy Stone, may be kept out of action because of an injury. Stone led the Colts in scoring last year and caught 31 passes for 691 yards. The Packers may not have the services of fullback Jack Cloud and halfback Billy Grimes, both injured. With Grimes on the doubtful list, the offense at RH may be carried by rookie Larry Coutre and veteran Bob Forte. The Packers' big fight for 1950 jobs will be waged at left half where six players are competing. The group includes veterans Jug Girard and Walt Schlinkman, rookies Harry Szulborski and Al Cannava, former Bear Wally Dreyer and former Brown Bill Boedeker. 

to the club in re-breaking the ice in Beer town, and the Packers are extremely grateful. Their backing and selling of ducats may result in an attendance of 25,000 - with favorable weather. Tonight, a group of influential Milwaukee business leaders, including Miller, will meet with Packer officials to discuss ways and means of promoting the Packers in Milwaukee. Every possibility will be advanced in the matter of making Milwaukee feel that the Packers are a definite part of Milwaukee. Packer officials, of course, are not forgetting Milwaukee. The club was forced to play some games there starting in the early 1930s when the attendance in Green Bay dropped off some. This year, the Packers are conducting an experiment - playing four league games in Green Bay and two in Milwaukee. It still is an open question as to how many games Green Bay can support. The answer to that question won't be known until after the final home game - Nov. 26 against San Francisco. Considering the fact that one more game is being played in Green Bay this year, the season ticket sale has been good. But whether the stadium can be filled for the four games (as it should be) is something else again. The Packers' success in Milwaukee will be largely up to the team itself. With one or two exceptions, the Packers' performances in Milwaukee have

COLTS GET BOB NELSON; FACE PACKERS' ELEVEN

SEPT 9 (Egg Harbor, WI) - Bob Nelson, three-time all-league center in the old All-America Football Conference, was snapped up today on waivers from the New York Yanks as the Baltimore Colts tapered off for their NFL preseason exhibition finale against the Green Bay Packers tomorrow in Milwaukee. Nelson, a Baylor University grad, was all-AAC in 1946, '47 and '48 with the Los Angeles Dons, one of three clubs to fold up when the All-America loop merged last December with the NFL. Center has always been a troublesome spot with the Colts and this year is no exception. Up to now, Coach Clem Crowe has been banking on Joel Williams and Chip Armstrong to man the post, but the play of both has been only so-so. Nelson is near the end of the line as pro gridders go, being 30 years old, but may have another season or two of football left. He is 6 feet 1 inch tall and weighs 210 pounds. Tomorrow's game winds up an ill-starred exhibition trek for the Crowemen, who are still looking for their first victory...PACKERS WIN TWICE: Packer bosses scheduled only four exhibitions, while Baltimore's front office geniuses were jamming their card with seven. In its three tests, Green Bay has crashed the victory column twice, beating the Chicago Cardinals, 17-14, and New York Giants, 10 to 0. Green Bay thus rules logical favorites tomorrow, even though it suffered a slightly worse misfortune against the Cleveland Browns than Baltimore. The Browns walloped the Packers, 38-7; the Colts, 34-7. Crowe is expected to juggle his personnel throughout

the contest in an effort to find a combination presentable enough to throw in the path of the undefeated Washington Redskins, who open the Colts' regular NFL season in Baltimore a week from tomorrow...BURK-ROTE DUEL: Backs Jim Spavital and Ernie Zalejski may see action on defense, though they just joined the club. They figured in a six-player trade with the Chicago Bears. Crowe tabs his defensive backfield his most glaring weakness in the six exhibition thumpings absorbed to date. Highlighting tomorrow's struggle will be the duel between Adrian Burk, the Colts' quarterback who is spelling the injured Y.A. Tittle, and Tobin Rote, Green Bay pass-pitcher. Rote was ex-Colt Coach Walter Driskill's No. 1 draft choice. Then Crowe was hired as Driskill's successor. He drew Burk, who had headed the list before the Buffalo Bills, whom he coached in 1949, were laid away to rest.

PACKERS RULE SLIGHT CHOICE

SEPT 9 (Milwaukee) - Bob Nelson, a tried and true pro center, will be on hand to bolster the Colts chances against the Green Bay Packers in a NFL exhibition here this afternoon. Y.A. TITTLE A BIG HOPE OF BALTIMORE SUNDAY

Tittle is a forward passer, a good one, who Sunday will throw his darts at the Green Bay Packer in the Shrine sponsored exhibition football game at State Fair park and who may, if he has one of his better days, give the Packers a really fitful afternoon. Tittle is something of a stranger to Milwaukee. He has played all of his pro ball in the now defunct All-America conference. There is no question, though, about his ability to throw a football. He can wing it, on his good old days, with the best of them. Long or short, it makes no difference. He has a rubber arm. "Yard Arm" is his nickname.
