BAYS, YANKS BATTLE TO 0-0 TIE

GAME RECAP (GREEN BAY PRESS-GAZETTE)

(GREEN BAY) - There is an old football saying that "a team that won't be beat, can't be beat". The truth of this was clearly demonstrated to some 5,000 fans at the City stadium Sunday, when the New York Yankees battled the Packers to a scoreless tie. Underdogs and on the defensive most of the time, the Yankees hung on with a bulldog determination not to be scored on - and they were not. They charged in on the Packer backfield men whenever the latter were in Yankee territory - and they were there often - breaking up plays, stopping the vaunted Packer pass defense almost completely and doing other almost Herculean tasks to prevent the Bays from crossing their goal line.

CLOSES HOME SEASON

It was a great battle put up by these two powerful teams and a fitting climax to one of the most successful seasons of football here. It was the final appearance at home of the year for the Big Bay Blues, and they accredited themselves like the heroes they are, although not able to win. The Packers never stopped trying. From the opening whistle to the end of the game, they were always threatening, always charging and tackling clean and hard. But they could not win for the Yankees also were good. Several times the Packers with Lewellen and O'Boyle carrying the ball charged through their opponents' line for gains to bring the ball into the Yankee territory but there they were stopped, and forced to take to passes that seldom if ever were completed.

O'BOYLE TRIES KICK

The nearest the Packers came to the goal was the 18 yard line which they reached in the third quarter when Lewellen and O'Boyle alternated in carrying the ball down from their own 41 yard line. It was a sensational march with Lewellen making 18 yards in the first plunge over right tackle and then he and O'Boyle alternating in making slashes of 4 to 8 yards on almost every try. The linemen did some great work at opening holes and blocking in this march. The Yankees line stiffened at this point however and O'Boyle in two tries could add but four yards more. A pass to Kotal then was tried but it was incomplete. As there was still about four yards to go for first down, the Packers elected to try a place kick, but the boot attempted by O'Boyle was both low and wide, and the Yankee gained possession of the ball on their own 20-yard line and punted out of danger. A few moments before the end of the game, Kelly hurled a long pass to Welch, and the former Pittsburgh flash caught it and started off on a sensational run down the field. He passed two Packers but finally was spilled on the 12 yard line by Baker and Kotal, when it appeared as if he was going to get away for a touchdown. Both Baker and Kotal caught him from behind to save the game.

LEWELLEN'S PUNTING PERFECT

The first period saw the Packers have possession of the ball most of the time in Yankee territory, Lewellen's accurate punting frequently putting the Yankees on the offense behind their own 20 yard line. Perry and Minick did some great tackling in this period to throw Yankee men for no gains and losses on frequent occasions. The second period was a repetition of the first to some extent with the play still mostly in the Yankee territory, and the Packers trying to get going in the forward pass play. The Yankees had a good defense for the aerial game, however, and but two were completed. One was a heave to Dilweg who ran to the 30 yard line before he was downed, and the other was to Lewellen for a first down on the 42 yard line. Jug Earpe and O'Donnell did some good work in this period for the Packers while Grube, Yank end, was the

outstanding performer for the Yankees. This was not the only time that Grube's work was outstanding, however, as the Yankee end was a constant threat to the Bays, frequently dropping Red Dunn in his tracks as the latter received punts. The march to the 18 yard line as related previously was the outstanding feature of the third period when the Packers did most of their ground gaining. The fourth period was much similar to the other three with Welch's run an outstanding event. Both teams tried frequent passes in this period with few being completed.

Giant, Packer Game to Be Shown Here On Gridgraph

From the moment of the kickoff at the Polo Grounds in New York at 1 p. m. Green Bay time tomorrow until the whistle donating the end of the game between the Packers and Giants, Green Bay fans will see the entire game replayed here on The Press-Gazette Gridgraph at the Columbus Club.

Every detail of the game will be re-enacted on the giant board while fans sit in comfort in the spacious auditorium of the Columbus club. It will be flashed to them direct from the Polo Grounds by a special leased Western Union wire to the auditorium.

The plays will be re-enacted on the board but a few moments after they happen in New York, with every detail given, including runs, off-side penalties, touchdowns, goal kicks and other details of the play.

As an added attraction, one of the newest types of electric phonographs will play several popular selections before the game and between the halves for the entertainment of fans witnessing the encounter here.

The Gridgraph has proven popular with fans in past years and for the Packer-Bear game at Chicago this year, and preparations have been made to provide seats for 2,000 fans.

First reports will begin coming in about 12:45. The doors will be opened at 12:15 p. m. for early arrivals. All of the sidelights of the game will be broadcast to spectators before it gets under way at 1 p. m. Green Bay time.

PACKER TEAM DEPARTS ON EASTERN TRIP

SIDELIGHTS

NOV 12 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - An idea of how completely the Yankees stopped the Packer pass attack is given in the records of heaves. The Bays tried 21 passes and completed but five of them for a total gain of 35 yards...The Yankees completed three of nine passes tried for a total gain of 90 yards. Salemni, Welch and Grube were the men who received Yankee passes successfully...The Packers gained 10 first downs by scrimmage and two by passes, while the Yankees completed five first downs by scrimmage and two by passes...Nash did some sensational running and tackling soon after he entered the game in the second half. On one play, he tore down after Lewellen punted, knocking over two Yankee men who tried to block him and nailed Welch dead in his tracks with a flying tackle...Soon after Tiny Cahoon got in the game in the fourth quarter, Flaherty punted and Tiny partly blocked the ball so that it only traveled about twenty yards, Dunn recovering it on the 42 yard line. Tiny did some good work at his position...Baker intercepted a Yankee pass on the New Yorkers' 40 yard line soon after he went in the game when O'Boyle was injured, but on the first play after it, "Red" Smith intercepted a Packer pass and the Yankees again had possession of the ball...Captain Lambeau went into the game a few seconds before the game was over and tried a pass of about 40 yards which was grounded just as the final whistle blew...Perry, Jones, Minick, Earpe and Dilweg played the entire game on the line and all turned in fine accounts for themselves in the final game at home. Ashmore went out in the last period after he was hurt. Ashmore also was in on almost every play before he was injured and gave way to Cahoon...The Packers will practice in Green Bay until Thursday then depart for New York where they take on the Giants next Sunday. The Yankees also will remain in town until Thursday then leave for Detroit...Welch gave fans thrills on frequent occasions when he broke through the Packer line. He wasn't able to get off on many long runs, however, as the Packers' secondary defense man usually nailed him...The Yankees used a spinner play that gained considerable ground in the early stages of the game with Pritchard and Welch carrying the ball, but Earpe got on to it after awhile and then smeared the play whenever it was tried, throwing the Yankee men for losses.

FIVE PACKERS HANDICAPPED BY VARIOUS AILMENTS

NOV 14 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Despite injuries which struck the Packers in their final week at home, the squad went through another hard workout today preparing for their Eastern invasion which begins next Sunday at New York when the team takes on the Giants. Five of the Packer backfield men are suffering from ailments of one kind or the other. Capt. Lambeau wrenched his leg last week and still is feeling some effects of it. Harry O'Boyle, who hurt his ankle in the game against the Yankees, still is hobbling about. Lewellen's injured knee still is giving him some trouble and Larry Marks is suffering from a lame back. Red Dunn also is among the ailing stomach for more than a week. None of the injuries are serious enough to keep any of the men from going East, however. All of the linemen are in good shape and set to begin the Eastern invasion. The team will go through a final workout Thursday morning then depart over the Northwestern road Thursday afternoon. They will go direct to New York from there. The Yankee team, which had planned to leave Thursday also, changed their plans early in the week and left Green Bay Tuesday morning. The game Sunday will be shown here again on the gridgraph at the Columbus club. All of the details of the encounter will be brought out on the giant board.

Then they will go to Providence, R.I., to take on the Steamrollers Dec. 2, and from there will return to Chicago, where they meet the Bears on Dec. 9 in the final game of the year at Wrigley field. All of the game except the Yellowjacket contest will be shown here on the gridograph at the Columbus club auditorium. Several of the backfield men were suffering minor ailments before they departed today, but are expected to recover before they take on the Giants Sunday. None of the injuries are of a very serious nature. The linemen all are in fine shape, and expected to do some great work against the strong eastern teams. NOV 16 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The race for the NFL championship is developing into a red hot affair. Aside from four clubs, a team can be considered in the running for the gridiron pennant...Games this weekend should go a long way towards deciding whose who in Pennantville as the one-two clubs, Frankford and Providence, meet in a crucial home and home series...Saturday, Jimmy Conzelman will take his Providence Steamrollers into the Hornets' nest and immediately after the game both teams board a train for Providence where they will mix on Sunday in the Cycledrome arena...A contest for third place will be staged at the Polo grounds in New York where the Green Bay Packers are to have it out with the Giants. These clubs are even in the percentage column with four wins, two losses and a tie...This will be the Badger state champions first gridiron appearance along Broadway. Following the encounter with the Giants, the Bays are booked for engagements in the east with Pottsville, Frankford and Providence...The Chicago Bears seemed to have hit their stride again as their victories over the Yanks and Dayton were impressive. This game with the New York Yankees will be the last 'home appearance' of the Big Bay Blues for the 1928 season. Following the Nov. 11 fracas, the Green Bay team heads east to play the New York Giants, Pottsville Maroons, Frankford Yellowjackets and Providence Steamrollers. On Dec. 9 in Chicago the Packers close their schedule with another game against the Bears.

PLAY BY PLAY

First Quarter

New York won the toss and Capt. Michalske elected to defend the east goal. O'Boyle kicked off to Welsh who returned to the 53 yard line where O'Donnell spilled him. On a snarl mix-up, Welsh knifed off left tackle and ran 14 yards. Pritchard cracked the center of the line for two yards. Welsh pided over right tackle for 3 yards on a crisscross. Welsh followed up with a crash at center for a scant yard. Flaherty sliced his punt and the ball rolled out on the Packers' 46 yard line. Lewellen ran around right end for a 2 yard gain. Kotal lost a yard at right tackle. Lewellen was tossed for a two yard loss at right end. Lewellen punted and Dilweg downed the ball for the Packers on the 11 yard line. Perry nailed Pritchard for no gain and then Jones drilled through and set Salemmi down for a two yard loss. Flaherty punted on the next play but Grubbe was off-sides and the Packers elected to take the penalty. Flaherty punted the ball out of bounds on the Packers' 45 yard line. O'Boyle was muffed up for a yard loss. Lewellen cut back over center and hurried to the 56 yard line. Lewellen passed and Dunn dropped the toss. Lewellen dropped back and kicked over the Yanks' goal line. Minick stopped Welsh before he could get started. Salemmi made a yard at right end. Flaherty punted out on the Packers' 49 yard line. O'Boyle was stopped at center but the play was recalled and the Packers lost 5 for off-sides. Dunn passed wildly to Kotal. On an erratic pass from center, Lewellen was dropped for a 5 yard loss. Lewellen punted to Welsh who received on his own 14 yard line and brought it up to the 25 yard line. A Yankee pass was incomplete. Welsh was smeared by Ashmore for a 2 yard loss. Flaherty punted to Dunn who ran out of bounds on his own 49 yard line. O'Boyle added a yard at center but the Packers lost a few yards in motion. Lewellen ripped through center for a 2 yard advance but fumbled and McLean covered for the Yankees on the 26 yard line. Welsh was thrown by Minick for no gain. Welsh attempted to pass and Kotal intercepted for the Packers. Kotal dove over right guard for a 2 yard gain. Lewellen plunged over center for three yards. Kotal hit left guard for two more. O'Boyle cracked the same hole for 4 yards. Lewellen crashed over left guard for 5 yards and O'Boyle followed up with a shove that netted a yard on an attempted forward pass. Dunn fumbled the ball but recovered on the 40 yard line. Dunn's pass to Lewellen was grounded. Lewellen punted out on the Yanks' 19 yard stripe. On a fake play, Salemmi tossed to Smith who broke through right tackle for 5 yards. Pritchard bundled over right guard for three yards. On a reverse play, Pritchard made 3 yards at center. Score at the end of the quarter: Packers 6, New York 0.

Second Quarter

Welsh dove over right guard for four yards. On the same play Smith lost four yards. The Yankees lost 5 yards for backfield in motion. Welsh attempted a long heave to Salemmi which was just out of his reach. Flaherty punted and Dunn fumbled the kick but the Yankees lost 5 yards for backfield in motion. Flaherty punted and Grubbe tackled Dunn in his tracks on the 41 yard line. Kotal passed to Dilweg and "Larvie" hurdled over one New Yorker and gained 9 yards. On the next play, Dunn missed the toss from center but the Yanks were penalized 5 yards, giving the Packers a first ten. Dunn carried the ball out without a gain. Lewellen's pass to Kotal was incomplete. A pass to O'Donnell was fumbled by "Red" Smith who finally dropped it. Lewellen punted over the goal line. A pass Welsh to Flaherty was knocked down. On a sparrer Pritchard made 2 yards at right guard. Smith plunged over right guard for 2 yards. Flaherty punted to Dunn who ran out on his 45 yard line. Time out for the Yankees. O'Boyle nudged the ball over left guard for 2 yards. Kotal's pass was with. Kotal's second pass to Dunn was incomplete when the latter dropped the toss. The Packers lost five for the second incomplete pass in the series. Lewellen punted to Welsh who returned to his own 25 yard line before O'Donnell nailed him. On a trick pass Pritchard cut over right guard for a yard gain. On a reverse play Welsh passed to Salemmi who was tackled on the Packers' 42 yard line. Pritchard carried the ball out of bounds for no gain. Welsh's pass was intercepted by O'Donnell who brought the ball back to his own 45 line. Kotal made three yards at right guard and then added 3 more on a reverse smash over right tackle. Kotal passed to Lewellen for a first down on the Packers' 42 yard line. Dunn attempted a long pass to Dilweg and Flaherty intercepted on his 35 yard line where Perry tackled him. Pritchard hit center for two yards. On a reverse play Welsh lost a yard at left end. Flaherty was stopped at right end for no gain. Flaherty punted to Dunn who went out on his own 42 yard line. Kotal smashed the center of the line for 2 yards. O'Boyle hit right guard for six and then followed up with a thrust over left guard for 3 yards. Kotal was smeared at right end for no gain. A pass Dunn to O'Donnell was incomplete. Another pass by Kotal was grounded and the Packers lost five yards. Lewellen punted over the goal line. On a reverse play Welsh was smeared by Earpe after he had added two yards. Perry stopped Welsh without a gain. Welsh made 3 yards at right end. Flaherty punted and the ball was grounded on the 49 yard line. The Packers lost 5 yards for stalling. Lewellen's pass to Kotal was knocked down by "Red" Smith. Lewellen passed wildly to Kotal. The Packers drew a 5 yard penalty on the 45 yard line. Welsh was nailed by Minick for no gain. A pass Welsh to Salemmi was incomplete as the half ended. Score at the end of the half: Packers 6, New York Yanks 0.

Third Quarter

Grube kicked off to Kotal who returned to 31 yard line. Lewellen on cut back over right guard made 6 yards and O'Boyle went through center for 3 yards. Lewellen made 5 yards at left end and O'Boyle again found the middle of the line for a 2 yard gain. Lewellen made 2 at right guard and then Grubbe intercepted a pass by Lewellen on the Yanks 33 yard line. He was tackled by Jones. Smith made 4 yards at center and then Pritchard fumbled the ball being recovered by O'Boyle on the 40 yard line. Kotal made 4 yards at right end and then stepped out of bounds after a gain of two yards. O'Boyle made a yard at right guard. Here the Packers took a chance and sent Lewellen through the line to make a first down but Lew failed, the ball going to the Yanks on their own 20 yard line. On the first play the Packers were off sides and were penalized 5 yards. Welsh was stopped by Earpe after a gain of 1 yard. Smith made 2 at left guard and then was held at center without a gain. Flaherty punted and Dunn ran it out of bounds on the 26 yard line. Kotal tried left-end but failed to gain and Lewellen went through the middle of the line for 2 yards. Lewellen tried a pass to O'Boyle which was incomplete. Lewellen punted to Welsh who was downed in his tracks by Nash. This was one of the spectacular instances in the game for Nash dumped Welsh hard on the play. The ball on the 22 yard line. Kelly was spilled by Perry for a 2 yard loss and the Yanks were set back 5 yards for delay in calling play. Kelly passed to Welsh for a 10 yard gain. Pritchard hit center without a gain and Flaherty punted to Dunn who was downed on the 41 yard line. Lewellen made 18 yards over right tackle and O'Boyle made 4 at center and Lewellen followed with 4 yards in the same spot. Lew hit right tackle for 5 more and O'Boyle made 3 through the middle of the line. Lewellen made 4 yards at right guard and in two tries O'Boyle made 5 yards through the middle of the line. Pass from Dunn to Kotal was incomplete. O'Boyle tries a short kick from difficult angle and the kick was both short and wide the ball going to the Yanks on the 26 yard line. Welsh was spilled by Earpe for a 2 yard loss. Kelly passed to Grubbe for a first down on the Yanks own 20 yard line. Welsh made 1 at left end as quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Smith made 1 yard at left tackle. Kelly tried a pass to Welsh which the latter dropped amidst a loud "Iron!" cheer by the patrons on the north bleachers. Flaherty punted and the kick was partly blocked by Cahoon but travelled to the 43 yard line where Dunn recovered. O'Boyle made 2 yards and a pass from Dunn to Nash added 6 more. Kotal went through center for a first down. Dunn made 4 yards at right end. O'Boyle made 4 around right end. Lewellen failed at center and then punted the ball going out of bounds on the 9 yard line. Welsh made 2 yards at left guard and another at left end. Flaherty punted and Dunn took the ball out on the 43 yard line. Kotal lost 2 yards at left end and O'Boyle was hurt on the play and took time out but could not resume play and Byer took his place. Lewellen made 2 at center and then completed a pass to Dilweg which was good for only a yard. Lewellen punted the ball rolling out of bounds on the 9 yard line. Jolinda made 2 yards at right tackle and then tried center for no gain. Flaherty punted and the ball was dead on the 36 yard line. Kotal was spilled by Michalske for a 3 yard loss and Dunn tried a pass to Dilweg which was incomplete. Dilweg was tripped on the play. Pass from Lewellen to Dunn good for a first down. On the next play Dunn tried a pass but fumbled a low throw from center and was lucky to get rid of the ball without being tackled for a big loss. Lewellen made 6 yards at right guard. Lew picked up 3 more at center and then just failed to make it a first down, the ball going to the Yanks. Welsh made 6 yards at left tackle. Kelly thrown for 4 yard loss. Kelly's pass intercepted by Baker on the 40 yard line. Lew's pass intercepted by Red Smith on the 41 yard line and tackled by Nash. Molenda pided through the middle of the line for 18 yards. Welsh was spilled by Dilweg for 8 yard loss. Molenda was spilled for 1 yard pass by Earpe. Kelly passed to Welsh who traveled to the 12 yard line before Baker and Kotal stopped him. It looked like Welsh might get away for a touchdown on this play. Rush went in for Mac Arthur. Kelly made no gain at right tackle. Kelly tried a pass to Welsh which was too short for Gidoy to get. Yanks were penalized 5 yards for delay in getting play started. Grube tried a place kick the ball being blocked by several Packers. Minick recovering on the 29 yard line. Marks went in for Dunn and Lambson for Lewellen. Lambson threw a long pass to Kotal which was incomplete as the whistle blew.
