

Packers Maul Cowboys 41-7, Stay in Contention

(GREEN BAY) - The Packers had no trouble with the lively Dallas Cowboys at City Stadium Sunday afternoon. Green Bay rolled up a 27 to 0 halftime lead and then coasted to an easy 41 to 7 victory. And the big Bays came within seconds of taking over undisputed possession of first place in the Western Division. The Packers exploded for 20 points in the second quarter and finished the day with five touchdowns and two field goals to match the 41-point splurge against the 49ers Oct. 23. This was the Packers' fifth triumph against two losses and they are not a half-game behind the champion Colts, who have 6-2. The Packers were on the edge of first place until the Colts nipped the Bears in the final 27 seconds in Chicago. Green Bay can move into a first place tie by whipping the Rams in Milwaukee next Sunday, while the Colts are left with a bye. The Packers play their next two games in five days, following the Ram game with an invasion of Detroit Thanksgiving Day. A record crowd of 32,294 saw the Packers close the Packers' City Stadium card of four games. The Vince Lombardi-fired Bays now have won seven out of eight league games in the last two years here. The gate passed the normal 32,150 because the portable seats used for between-halves entertainers were sold. Packer alumni, who took part in the halftime show, were seated on the sidelines. There was some suspicion the Cowboys might rise to sky heights and give the Packers a king-sized scare. The visitors went all-out but the Packers, stung a week ago by the Colts,

were elegantly methodical. The Packers recovered two fumbles, intercepted three passes and blocked a punt. They scored five of the first six times they had their hands on the ball - for that 27-0 halftime edge. Every Packer except Jess Whittenton, who was held out due to an injury, had a hand in the fireworks - and that goes double for rambunctious Raymond Nitschke, the No. 4 man in the Bays' Fearsome Foursome. In the process of relieving his fellow linebackers, the colorful Nitschke intercepted a pass intended for Billy Howton (of all people) and raced 43 yards for the Bays' third touchdown and a 21-0 lead in the second quarter. He intercepted another pass in the third quarter to set up the fourth touchdown, recovered a fumble in the third, and during his stay tackled with crowd-pleasing abandon. The Bay defense blanked the Cowboys until midway in the fourth quarter when Don Meredith passed 13 yards to Walt Kowalczyk for their only touchdown. The Cowboys gained 275 yards but it was well scattered and the Bays finished with three rookies in the secondary - Dale Hackbart, Dick Pesonen and Willie Wood. Hackbart went the route in place of Whittenton and only two passes were completed on his side. Dan Currie performed the other interception. Hank Jordan recovered the other fumble and blocked

the punt. Bill Quinlan re-injured his shoulder and his successor, Jim Temp, also hurt his shoulder. Ken Beck finished up at defense end. Jarrin' Jim Taylor scored the first three offensive touchdowns on blasts of 28, 4 and 23 yards, and Paul Hornung scored the windup six. Hornung added two 21-yard field goals inside of 1 minute and 1 second just before the half. Taylor finished with 121 yards in 15 carries and amazed the audience. He hit and "run" and ricocheted off groups of Cowboys on his two longer TD runs. Jim passed the 100-yard mark on a 19-yard scamper on the first play of the fourth quarter. Hornung rolled up 17 points to give him an even 100 for the first seven games. He is now just 38 points shy of tying the all-time league record of 138 by Don Hutson in 1942. Paul won the scoring title last year with 95. Bart Starr, making his second straight start at quarterback, completed 9 out of 16 for 149 yards and a 34-0 lead before giving way to Lamar McHan late in the third period. McHan worked up the fifth TD on a 9-play, 57-yard drive in the fourth quarter. Starr engineered teedees on 82, 89 and 44-yard drives. The ex-Packers with the Cowboys gave it a merry go. Billy Butler and Nate Borden on defense were fiery. Howton caught two passes but didn't play in the second half, while Don McIlhenny gained 40 yards in 9 attempts. The Cowboys received the opening kickoff and Hackbart almost became an early hero. He batted down and almost intercepted a Don Heinrich pass aimed at Howton, with a clear field ahead. This forced a punt and the Packers were on their way. Starr's first play of the game was a 28-yard pass to Max McGee to midfield. Five plays later the Bays had a 7-0 edge. The Bays had fourth and one on the Cowboy 28 and Taylor was sent off the left side of the line. He bounced into the pile, slid to the left and scooted all the way, evading an ankle grab by Tom Braatz. Hornung kicked the first of five extra points. The Cowboys snapped back, rolling up three first downs chiefly on a 20-yard pass to Howton, and reached the Packer 17. At this point, Quinlan shook the ball out of Kowalczyk's hands with a jarring tackle and Jordan recovered on the 25. The Packers charged back with Starr throwing to Gary Knafelc for 12, Taylor with a great catch for 16, and Taylor for 14 to the 12 on the last play of the first quarter. The attack bogged down and Hornung missed a field goal from the 18. The Cowboys picked up two first downs, but the Bays got tough and took over. This time Starr moved the club 89 yards for a 14-0 lead. Two quick passes from Starr to Dowler for 21 and McGee for 20 moved the ball midfield. Butler intercepted a long Starr throw aimed at McGee but Bishop was nicked for interference on McGee and the Bays had the ball on the Cowboy four. Taylor smashed over from there for 14-0. Two minutes later, Nitschke took Eddie LeBaron's pass on the 43 and dashed down the west sideline for a touchdown and a 21-0 edge. In quick order just before the half: Jordan blocked a punt and Bill Forester returned seven yards to the Cowboy 24, setting up Hornung's 21-yard field goal from the 21. With second left, Currie intercepted a pass on the 47 and rumbled 34 yards to the 13 and Hornung booted another field goal for 27-0.

FIRST PACKER PUNT

Boyd Dowler delivered the first Packer punt in six quarters (since the end of the Pittsburgh game Oct. 30) at the start of the second half. After another exchange of punts, Nitschke intercepted on the Packer 35 and ripped to the Cowboy 44. The Bays scored from three in five plays. Taylor went two and Hornung three. After Starr tossed nine yards to Hornung, Taylor hit the left side for seven to the 23 and then went the distance from a big group of Cowboys for a 34-0 lead. The Bays got another shot when Nitschke recovered Dupre's fumble but McHan had a pass intercepted in front of Knafelc. McHan, however, got a TD drive going on the last two plays of the third period. After Taylor and Hornung made six yards, Taylor slammed 19 yards to the Packer 37. Three plays later, McHan exploded the bomb - a 47-yard toss to Dowler who took the ball on the 10 and raced to the four. Hornung galloped off left guard for the touchdown with 2:19 gone in the final quarter. Meredith mixed short running gains with two passes to Mathews for 33 yards and worked up a touchdown in 13 plays. The score came on a fourth down and nine pass to Kowalczyk for 13 yards and the TD. Fred Cone made his only appearance to kick the point. With half the period

left, Packer replacements flooded the field. including Ken Iman, the rookie center, who gave Jim Ringo the first rest of the league season. McHan had a touchdown drive going by a pass bounced out of Ron Kramer's arms for an interception by Gene Cronin. Meredith passed for two first downs and the Bays finished it off with two runs by Paul Winslow.

Pack 'Weren't Very Sharp,' Vince; Easy TD's Hurt: Tom

PACK 'WEREN'T VERY SHARP,' VINCE; EASY TD'S HURT: TOM

NOV 14 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Vince Lombardi, as his coaching pedigree eloquently attests, is a militant perfectionist. Thus, while the Packer faithful could find little fault with Sunday's 41-7 rout of the Dallas Cowboys as they departed sunny City Stadium, the erstwhile Fordham Block of Granite was not impressed. "We weren't very sharp today," he said somberly with a critical eye as he spoke. "It's nothing you can put your finger on but we were just not up to par." His tigers, the forthright head man declared, "were especially not sharp defensively. And offensively, we bobbled and bobbled. Defensive, we did make some big plays, however, some great plays." The tone was set, he said, when the visiting Cowboys were introduced just before the game. "I guarantee you if the Dallas team went to Baltimore, the fans would boo them. They cheered 'em here," he chuckled wryly, marveling at such hospitality. "And that's the way our team played today." Although not satisfied with the overall performance, Vince felt there were some pleasant developments, among them the defensive debut of Wisconsin's home grown Dale Hackbart. "I thought Hackbart did a real fine job," Lombardi said. "I was real pleased with his performance. That's what happens when you get a man from a big college. That's why we draft 'em from big colleges." What about Ray Nitschke? The NFL's reigning coach of the year grinned and declared, "That Nitschke was really something today. Taylor had a fine day, too, and Hornung made two big gains, too, that were called back." Hank Jordan also had a large afternoon, it was ventured. "Yes, he did," Vince conceded. "Jordan and Hanner are the most consistent

Al Carmichael Breaks Leg, Out For Rest of Year

DALLAS, Tex. (P) — Former Green Bay Packer Al Carmichael, Denver's right halfback suffered a broken left leg Sunday in the game with the Dallas Texans. He is out for the remainder of the American Football League season.

The former Southern California player, who is a movie stunt man in the off-season, suffered the injury in the second period. He had caught three passes for 51 yards, carried twice for 11 yards and carried back one punt and one kickoff before the injury came.

Denver said Carmichael's loss was a severe blow as indicated by the Broncos showing in the last half when they failed to score.

Carmichael has caught 29 passes for 565 yards and five touchdowns, run back 21 kickoffs for 558 yards, returned 14 punts for 101 yards and gained 239 yards on 39 carries.

football players we have." Any injuries? "Yes, Jim Temp has a shoulder dislocation," Vince said soberly. Offensive tackle Bob Skoronski also suffered a charley horse and did not play in the second half. He declined comment on the Western Division-leading Baltimore Colts' last minute victory over the Bears, but later asserted, "They separate the boys from now on - three games in 10 days." Lombardi obviously had reference to next Sunday's match with the Los Angeles Rams in Milwaukee, to be followed within four days by their traditional Thanksgiving invasion of Detroit. What about the Rams? "I don't know about that," Vin smiled. "This is only today."...Tom Landry, the Cowboys' headmaster and former coaching comrade of Lombardi when both were with the New York Giants, "was not at all surprised" over what had just happened to his athletes. "The Packers played about the game we expected them to," said the youthful defensive expert, who appeared bruised but unbowed. "We felt if we could eliminate our mistakes, we had a chance to stay with them. But you can't give a team easy touchdown on fumbles and interceptions like we did and expect to beat 'em. Not in the NFL, anyway." How did he evaluate the Packers? "They do a workmanlike job," the Texan replied. "They have as good a running club as there is in the NFL - at least they are as good as we have seen this year." But not yet great? "To be great they would have to have a Lenny Moore - to be explosive. They don't have that quality right now. But," Landry admitted, "the Giants don't have it either and they win their division pretty often. They're a good

hardnosed club and so are the Packers - they're much alike." "The Packers block very well, their techniques are good," he added. "I suppose that is because they put so much emphasis on running. And they have real good linebacker play, which helps them so much defensively." The Packers' Nitschke, it was observed, had exemplified this quality. "Some days you are in the right spot," Landry said. "Nitschke was in the right spot today."...PRAISES MEREDITH: Ex-Packer Bill Howton, who did not play in the second half, hadn't been injured, Tom revealed. "We just wanted to see Ray Mathews play. He hasn't been playing too much and he's a pretty good player. As a matter of fact, we have quite a few good ends." The Pack's Dave Hanner had been high in his praise of Don Meredith, the Cowboys' 100,000 rookie quarterback. Did Landry agree? "Don is a youngster and has a lot to learn," Landry said, "but I think he will be great some day." It must be a long season and his Cowboys (0-8) it was suggested. Tom nodded and added

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

NITSCHKE AT PEACE: HE 'CAPITALIZED' ON BIG OPPORTUNITY

NOV 14 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - His ruddy countenance still aglow, Raymond Ernest Nitschke was a man at peace with the world. The bruising University of Illinois alumnus, lolling back on a chair in front of his locker, drank deeply from a bottle of coke before imparting with great sobriety. "When you get an opportunity, you have to capitalize on it. When you work hard in practice, it's got to pay off." And "capitalize" he did - to the vocal delight of a record Packer house (32,294), intercepting two passes and recovering a fumble to garnish the biggest afternoon of his three-year pro career. The beefy blond, whose every heroic drew thunderous cheers, rumbled 43 yards to a touchdown with the first of those interceptions and set up another with the second. It was a poetic, and ironic, climax to a memorable day that had begun with the rugged linebacker, who has seen infrequent employment referring to himself cynically as "Judge." (This, lockermate Dan Currie explained, stemmed from an article Ray has read "about a player who was Judge because he spent so much time on the bench.") All of that was forgotten now. Nitschke, perspiration still glistening on his massive chest from the rigors of the





afternoon, accepted congratulations from ex-Packer great Verne Lewellen and quipped, "Did I look like a fullback on that TD run?" "Pretty sharp," Lew assured him. "I knew I was going all the way," he admitted. "It was on the weak side and there was nobody there." At this point, his hands shot in the air and a football, wafted from the other side of the room, settled in his hands. It was the game ball. "Thank you, Bubba," he called to Bill Forester, the team's defensive captain, who had made the "presentation." Turning to newsmen clustered about him, he said proudly, "I really appreciate this," Analyzing his performance critically, Ray volunteered, "I made some mistakes, but I was trying. I was embarrassed once because I was supposed to be on the punting team and I wasn't there - I was gassing on the bench. It was my fault they scored their touchdown," he confessed. "It was my man." At the other end of the Packers' quarters, Dale Hackbart confided that he, like many another before him, had discovered, "It's a lot tougher up here than it was in college." "We never played the man in college, just zone defense," explained the rookie from Wisconsin, who had just gone the distance in his pro debut holding forth for the injured Jesse Whittenton at cornerbacker. "You have a tendency to lay off the receiver because of that." The former Badger quarterback had had a successful baptismal, despite this disadvantage, it was suggested. "I don't know," Hackbart responded. "I can't tell until I see the movies." He had almost gone the distance on a near interception of a Don

Heinrich pitch to ex-Packer Bill Howton early in the first quarter. What had happened? "I just got excited," he grinned. "I just dropped it. I was looking at the goal line instead of the ball." "I needed to pull my average up - it was way down," said Taylor, who bulled, danced and slid for 121 yards in 15 carries. Hank, who said, "It was the first time I've blocked one as a Packer," added, "Nobody blocked me. All I had to was walk in there." Jordan, who also recovered a fumble, also wanted it known, "I really didn't have such a good day." He pointed to a big, burly blond three doors down and said, "Dave Hanner was the one today - he was all over the field." New Role: Everyone Up for Packers Now

NEW ROLE: EVERYONE UP FOR PACKERS NOW

NOV 15 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers are experiencing something new. Coach Vince Lombardi mentioned it today: "We're classified as contenders now. Everybody will be up for us. That's a new problem for us." Lombardi pointed out that the champion Colts have been "going through that for two years." The fact that the Colts

have been able to win week after week in the face of highly-keyed opposition is to their credit! They downed contenders Green Bay and Chicago in the last two games. Fortunately for them and unfortunately for the Pack, the Colts draw a bye next Sunday. Nobody's really complaining, of course, on the Pack's contendership rating. It's wonderful, but Lombardi's logic is that the Packers' final five opponents will all have their muscles especially ready for Green Bay. The Packers face those final five (Rams, Lions, Bears, 49ers and Rams) with full knowledge that they can tie the Colts for the Western title by winning all five. This is based on the assumption that the Colts win their remaining four - 49ers, Lions, Rams and 49ers. Such happiness would create a divisional playoff. But enough of that. No. 1 on the "hit parade" is Los Angeles. The glamorous Rams, smarting from a 12-10 loss in Detroit last Sunday and anxious to get even at the expense of a contender, will battle the Bays in Milwaukee County Stadium Sunday. The Rams figure to make an extra-special all-out effort because they draw a bye the following Sunday. The Packers, on the other hand, play their next two games in five days - in Detroit Thanksgiving Day. The Packers, however, have a chance to make some real hay, while the Colts are resting. The Bays, with a win on LA, can tie the Colts for the Western lead. Then, they can take over the top chair for a few days along with a win in Detroit. Also, in the five days starting Sunday and ending mid-afternoon of Thursday, the Packers can tie last year's phenomenal seven-win record. Unhappily, the Packers are approaching this particularly strenuous period in an achy condition. "There isn't one of the 22 players who isn't hurting some place. We have a couple of ankles, some shoulders and just about everything," Lombardi said. Defensive end Jim Temp dislocated his shoulder in the victory over the Cowboys and may be out three weeks. Temp had relieved Bill Quinlan, who had hurt his shoulder in the Baltimore game. Quinlan discovered his shoulder was in good shape, one time forcing a fumble with a solid hit. Jess Whittenton, whose loss was such a damaging factor in the Colt game, was held out of the Dallas battle. He'll play against the Rams if he's okay. He has muscle pulls. Dale Hackbart, the ex-Badger hero, now qualifies as Whittenton's top aide at the key right cornerbacker spot. Lombardi and defense aides Phil Bengtston and Norb Hecker spoke highly of Hackbart's performance against the Cowboys. Vince pointed out that "he played against some of the good ones, Howton and Mathews." The Packers went back to work today and a light workout after which they heard the weekly report from Scout Wally Cruice, who looked in on the Lions' 12-10 win over the Rams in Detroit. Detroit won a 13-yard field goal by Jim Martin with 4:04 left in the game.

WANT TO START TEAM IN NATIONAL LEAGUE?

NOV 15 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - So you want to start a team in the NFL? The Packer-Cowboy game at City Stadium Sunday should be a warning to all you prospective squadmakers. Every member of the Cowboy cast is an experienced pro, with the exception of two or three. Yet, the Dallas lineup can't expect to win this year - unless, perhaps, by accident. The Packers and their followers had to be fearful of such an accident Sunday. But it became apparent quite soon that Dallas was no match for your Packers. Dallas doesn't like to lose but people like Tex Schramm, Tom Landry and Larry Karl of the Cowboys' official group feel that if the Cowboys went out and won, it certainly wouldn't say much for the other clubs in the league. The best thing that can be said about the Cowboys is that they didn't roll over and play dead. They were blasting away right down to the final wire. That's to the credit of Coach Landry and we hope the fans in Dallas don't get too impatient. Karl, the Cowboy publicity chief, was feeling low after Dallas lost a real tough 12-10 decision to St. Louis. He recalled last week: "Tom was feeling low,

too, but he lifted me up. He quietly told me that we can't expect to cut into anybody and then he told me where we need help. The morale of the team is wonderful despite our weekly losses and that's part of the battle right there." One of the problems is that Dallas has no tradition to lean, fall or look back on. The Cowboys don't have a solid fan following. Really, they seem like pro football orphans. Yet, there wasn't a Cowboy on the field Sunday who didn't think that, with some good breaks, they could defeat the Packers. That's the basis for the "hope" the Cowboys and Landry have for the future of pro football in Dallas. They hope to parlay the current doormat into a representative squad in three years. The Cowboys were politely cheered by the audience when they scored late in the game. That could only happen in Green Bay, which really has a soft heart. This is the only town in the league where the fans don't boo the home team when things go haywire. The Cowboys and Packers may have been 34 points apart on the scoreboard but they were smack even in the total number of offensive plays (rushes and passes). Each club tried 64 plays but the Pack put the emphasis on the ground, the Cowboys in the air. Dallas had 35 passes and 29 rushes; the Packers 37 rushes and 27 passes. While the Cowboys leaned toward the pass, they called a left end pitchout on the first play of the game, Don McIlhenny gaining eight yards. The Packers went to the air on the opening play, Bart Starr throwing to Max McGee for 28. The Packers, incidentally, didn't pass again until after taking a 7-0 lead and the principals and the gain were the same, Starr to McGee for 28.

TOP 1-2 PUNCH: TAYLOR AND HORNUNG!

NOV 16 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung! Don't mention one without the other. Look what these two Packer heavyweights have done between 'em in the first seven games this season: Rushed for 1,086 yards, scored 160 points, and caught 26 passes for 202 yards. One picks the other up. Last Sunday, for instance, Hornung was off his usual track, what with 17 yards in 13 rushes. Taylor responded with 121 yards in 15 trips. In Baltimore the previous Sunday, the Colts held Jim down to 56 yards in 20 trips. But Paul flashed with 99 in 17. Taylor and Hornung have a "lock" on Packer rushing and they tank as one of the two best ground twosomes in the league. Jim Brown and Bob Mitchell of the Browns have totaled 1,106 yards in seven games, but most of that bulge came last Sunday when Brown reeled off 173 yards in 28 attempts vs. the Cardinals. Brown's big day moved him into first place in the league with 694 yards, while Taylor is second with 661 - 33 behind. Mitchell is seventh with 402; Hornung 10th with 395. Hornung and Taylor have rushed for all but 209 of the Packers' 1,295 yards by rushing. Moore is next with 91, while Lamar McHan has 56, Lew Carpenter 24, Larry

Hickman 18, Bart Starr 15, Boyd Dowler eight and Paul Winslow minus 3. Taylor isn't too far from Tony Canadeo's all-time single season rushing record of 1,052 yards. close to the Packers' Twin Scorers. Hornung has scored 100 marks on eight TD's, 25 extra points and nine field goals; Taylor 60 on 10 touchdown. Jim got three TDs and Paul 17 points on Dallas. These two have scored all but 42 of the Packers' points, and Tom Moore has 24 of those. Hornung is just 39 points short of breaking Don Hutson's record of 138 set in 1938. That would seem like a sure bet but it will depend on the Packers' fortunes on the rocky road ahead. The Packers aren't listed in the pass receiving, punting, punt and kickoff returns and interception departments, but they have two representatives in passing -Starr, who has leaped from 15th to 13th place, and McHan, who is 17th. Starr has a completion percentage of 58.0, which ranks second only to the 69.3 by Milt Plum of Cleveland, 58.3 by Ralph Guglielmi of Washington and 60.8 by Bill Wade of Los Angeles. Of those three, only Plum is with a winning team. Bart has completed 51 out of 88 for 626 yards. The Packers' opponent in Milwaukee next Sunday, Los Angeles, has a key performer on the pass catching board - the slick Red Phillips, who ranks fourth with 30 catches for 571 yards. Wade is sixth in passing, while Frank Ryan, who likely will start vs. Green Bay, is 14th. Phillips is rated by some as the best end in the league. (More on that later.)...CATCHING BALANCE: Green Bay's pass catching corps has exceptional balance. Dowler is leading with 21, while Max McGee is next with 20. The next three

Jess Whittenton, Hank Gremminger, Em Tunnell and Ray Nitschke each stole two; Bill Forester and John Symank one each...BRIEFS: Packer Scout Wally Cruice told the Packers yesterday that the Rams are "ready to break loose." LA was held to 10 points by Detroit Sunday, but scored 44 against Detroit in the earlier game. Rams' Red Phillips Better Than Berry? Fears Says So

RAMS' RED PHILLIPS BETTER THAN BERRY? FEARS SAYS SO

NOV 17 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Red Phillips better than Raymond Berry? Here's what Tom Fears, Rams' assistant coach, thinks of Phillips: "There are none better in the league right now - not even Ray Berry of the Colts. Teaming up with a passer like John Unitas, Red would catch a jillion passes." Fears is an all-time pass catcher in his own right and his prize pupil is Phillips, who is now in his third season with Los Angeles. "Red fools you in a lot of ways. He's faster than he looks

and you'd be inclined to guess his weight about 10 pounds under. He's the most deceptive 195-pounder I ever saw. Most of it is his legs and thighs and is he tough," Tom told a Los Angeles writer last week. This, of course, is all very interesting to the Packers, who play the Stars in Milwaukee Sunday. And it's especially noteworthy to Packer defense backs and Packer offensive ends. Fears is well acquainted with Green Bay ends since he coached the Bay wingmen most of the training season a year ago. Fears' prize prospect was Boyd Dowler, who didn't disappoint. Boyd caught 32 passes and was a shoo-in for rookie of the year honors. Phillips better than Berry? Let's look: Red caught 28 passes for 447 yards in four game against the Packers in his first two years, 1958-59. Raymond, and this will slay you, nailed 21 passes for 232 yards in four games in those same two years. Red will have to really go some to duplicate Berry's feats against the Packers this year. The dazzling Raymond snared 15 in the two 1960 games. Phillips, former Auburn star, is in a hot streak. He ranks fourth in the league with 30 catches for 571 yards in eight games, but he nailed 14 of those for 315 yards in the last three games. He picked off five for 108 against the Lions in LA, seven for 151 against Dallas, and two for 56 against the Lions in Detroit. He caught five touchdown passes in those three games and now has six scoring throws, which is equal to his 1958-59 total. Fears' favorite normally plays right end, which

The two ends, under Coach Bob Waterfield's system, are generally spread wide and the "third end" is a slot back - usually Clendon Thomas. Behind Thomas are Tom Wilson and Dick Bass. AFL Commissioner Joe Foss said the draft would be conducted through his office with results to be announced Monday. Each club will make six selections. Although the draft will be conducted before the closing of the collegiate football season, Foss said he has warned club owners not to sign players who have not completed their college eligibility. "I personally will void any AFL contract signed before the player has completed his collegiate football eligibility," Foss said. "And this includes bowl games." Purposes of the early draft, he said, was to allow clubs to make their top selections and enable them to concentrate on scouting players of less well-known ability. The remainder of the league's draft will conducted "sometime in December," Foss said.

PACKERS ADD MILLER; JIM TEMP OFF

NOV 18 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers rolled up 65 points and 817 yards in splitting the last two games against the first place Colts and the last place Cowboys. Those figures indicate a new offensive trend that reflects the change in quarterbacks. Bart Starr worked the first game - a 17-14 loss to the Bears, and Lamar McHan then pitched the next three wins. Starr

came off the bench in the third quarter and hurled the Bays to a tight win over the Steelers. Starr handled the last two games - a 38-24 loss at Baltimore and a 41-7 win over the Cowboys. McHan worked up one of the touchdowns in relief in the last quarter of the Dallas game. The Packers lead the league in rushing yards and rank ninth in passing stripes. A week ago they were 11th in the air. The big offensive splurging in the last two weeks shows the change. The 817 yards in the two games is just about one-third of the yards (2,426) gained in the first five games. The Bays gained 501 air yards in the two games and that's nearly half of the seven-game total, 1,131. Rushing dropped below the average. The Packers gained 316 yards on the ground in the two games - an average of 158; the average for the seven games is 185...Despite the Colts' 38, the Packers' defense is still tops in the league on points. Green Bay has permitted only 119 marks - an average of 17. Green Bay can expect a wide open offensive onslaught from the Rams Sunday in Milwaukee County Stadium. The Rams scored 86 points in two successive games, beating the Lions 48-35 and the Cowboys 38-13, and then had trouble with the rugged Lion defense last Sunday while

attainments in advanced mathematics. The records at UCLA show that Ryan ranked third in his class in a study known as combinational topology. The third year QB, who hurled six touchdown passes thus far, represents what the NFL calls a refreshing trend. Pro football insists the "dese, dem, dose" guys are fading away. Ph. D is no longer the symbol for "phenomenally dumb." Ryan was a brilliant physics student at Rice and graduated with honors. All the pro clubs knew he could throw a football. Ryan wasn't drafted until the fourth round because scouts through he was too ambitious intellectually. The Rams made their pitch by clearing the way to graduate school at UCLA. Jack Teele, Ram publicity chief, says Ryan works math problems in the bus or hotel lobby "just like most fellows do crossword puzzles." It's not unusual for Ryan to be taking courses involving high mathematics well beyond the comprehension of the layman not it is unusual for Ryan to do well in highly technical courses, in or out of football season. Since joining the Rams, Frank never has been away from the classroom. Even during the Ram playing season, he has met classroom requirements at UCLA in the morning, attending Ram practice and skull sessions in the afternoon. And, even when on the road, Ryan has kept up with his UCLA classes...THIRD IN CLASS: The circumstances of the combinational topology course, however, were unusual, even for Ryan. The course actually was two consecutive semesters in length, with one single examination at the end of the full years. The grade on the examination constituted the entire grade for the entire course. Ryan entered the class at mid-year, following the 1959 football season. With the help of advisors, he managed to get caught up so well that on the final exam his grade was the third highest in the class. In pursuit of his masters in mathematics, Ryan, so far, is dead even with his projected timetable. He says, "This degree normally can be

obtained in two years, by simply concentrating on it, full time. However, since the Rams have first call on my time for almost half of every calendar year, I've figured all along that it will take me three years. I should get the degree in the spring of 1961."



Baltimore, leading the Western Division with a 6-2 record, has a bye tomorrow. Green Bay, a half-game behind with 5-2, could pull into first place by defeating the star-studded Los Angeles Rams. The Packers can actually take over undisputed possession of the lead in the next five days. After the Rams, the Packers play the Lions in Detroit Thanksgiving Day. A double win would give the Pack 7-2, a half-game lead on the Colts. This situation would force the Colts into a must-win situation against the 49ers in Baltimore a week from Sunday. "These two games are our season," Coach Vince Lombardi pointed out Friday, explaining, "It doesn't make much difference what we do against Detroit if we don't beat the Rams." The Packers are favored to beat the Rams by about 13 points, which is comforting if you have complete faith in the experts' opinion. The experts have been wrong. A crowd of about 35,000 is expected to give the Packers plenty of support. This will be the Pack's last scheduled home game. The Bays hope to make a clean sweep of the two west coast clubs in the two games here. They whipped the 49ers 41-14 in the league opener here. But the Rams can be troublesome here or anywhere. Green Bay hasn't beaten the Rams in County Stadium or Green Bay since 1956. The Packers face the

possible loss of their offensive strong man, fullback Jim Taylor, who is still bothered with a pulled muscle. he did very little running this week and, barring a complete recovery today, he may be handicapped some Sunday. Taylor, the league's No. 2 ground gainer at the moment, would be relieved by Larry Hickman, a sophomore heavyweight. All of the Packers are bruised and aching with some sort of injury, although Taylor is the last of the serious cases. Jess Whittenton, held out last Sunday, is raring to go and he'll have a real problem on his hands - one Del Shofner, the Rams' great left end. Quarterback Bart Starr's attack will depend somewhat on what the Ram defense develops but there's a good chance he'll uncork an active aerial attack. The ends are all in good physical condition and the Ram secondary has two rookies and a sophomore - plus the veteran Will Sherman. Taylor will start in the regular backfield with Paul Hornung and Boyd Dowler and Starr - plus

Max McGee and Gary Knafelc at ends, Bob Skoronski and Forrest Gregg at tackles, Jerry Kramer and Fred Thurston at guards and Jim Ringo at center. The Bays will have a new relief on defense - tackle-end John Miller, a 260-pounder who replaced injured Jim Temp on the injured list. He joins Ken Beck as replacements for defense linemen Bill Quinlan, Willie Davis, Dave Hanner and Hank Jordan. Quinlan is recovering from a shoulder injury and may need some help. The Packer defense will look at the slants of Bill Wade who is making his first start at quarterback in six games. He'll be in a backfield with Jon Arnett, Dick Bass and Joe Marconi in addition to ends Shofner and Jim Phillips. Los Angeles likely will do a lot of flying since the Bays have been consistently tough against rushing. Wade can be excited with a good rush and linebackers Tom Bettis, Bill Forester and Dan Currie will be anxious to test him. Whittenton, John Symank, Em Tunnell and Hank Gremminger make up the secondary. The Rams are expected to be quite "high" after a real tough 12-10 loss to the Lions. The Rams will be able to cut loose Sunday because they have a bye the following Sunday before they close at home with three games. Los Angeles' only hope of making a success of their 2-4-1 season is to knock off the leaders. Of the Rams' final four games, three are against the Packers and Colts. They host topsters Green Bay and Baltimore and toughie San Francisco after Sunday's game...BRIEFS: The Packers are staying at the Astor Hotel here. They'll return right after the game on two Greyhound buses, arriving at the North Western depot about 7:30 Sunday night.



Parting of Ways—Packer fullback Jim Taylor (31) and quarterback Lamar McHan (17) head in opposite directions after completing transfer of ball




