(SAN FRANCISCO) - The Packers are just 60 minutes and 38 revitalized Rams away from the Western Division championship. They took over undisputed possession of the Western lead by blanking the San Francisco 49ers in Kezar Stadium Saturday afternoon 13 to 0. And they never lost first place - thanks to the Rams' 10 to 3 upset victory over the world champion Colts in Los Angeles Sunday afternoon. The Packers now have a 7-4 record, the seven wins matching the 1959 output, while the 49ers, Lions and Colts trail by one full game with one game left. The formula is now pure and simple. They can win the first division title for Green Bay since 1944 by defeating the Rams in Los Angeles Saturday afternoon. Or they can be plunged into a tie. The Packers watched the Rams' big victory on television in their rooms in Rickey's Studio Motel in Palo Alto.. Promptly at 4:06, the players burst out of their rooms and started to whoop it up. Most of them (many were in San Francisco for the weekend) gathered at the motel's main office to revel in the good news. Coach Vince Lombardi was beaming like a cat that just stole the milk right after the game. "First place," he let loose, and then remembered: "We have 60 tough minutes ahead of us yet. And it's all up to our kids right out there. If they want it, they can have it." He pointed to the cottages below his "tower" room. This was a fabulous position and a fabulous comeback. "And now it's all wrapped up in one weekend - weeks of preparation," Vince said. Jim Ringo, who co-captains the Bays along with Bill Forester, vipped: "Isn't this something? We get a second chance and we won't blow it. We blew that first chance but not this one." Jim referred to the Bays losing the lead on two straight losses to the Rams and Lions. John Symank said he could not believe it. "Who would have thought the Colts would lose three straight games? They didn't even score a touchdown. They really got beat." Today's

big surprise from sunny southern California added sugar and spice to the celebration


over the Bays' tremendous victory over the 49ers before 53,612 in the rain and slop. It was a record-breaking triumph and easily one of the club's finest wins of the season because of the horrible playing conditions. The center of the gridiron was a sea of mud and the players were covered from head to foot. Quarterback Bart Starr emerged with a uniform dirtied only by the other players wiping their hands off on his jersey. The two dirtiest belong to Paul Hornung, who scored all the points, and Jim Taylor, who gained 161 yards. The Packers dug their noses right in the mud and fought it out. They were tough and strong. The 49ers, with their shotgun offense, never got beyond the 50.

'GAVE THEM MIDDLE'

"We gave them the middle and rushed hard from the outside," Lombardi said in explaining the Pack's handling of the weird spread formation. Lombardi and his defense aide, Phil Bengtson, both praised the entire defense and noted that Willie Davis did an "excellent job." The quick Davis is "made for that spread," Bengtson said. Eleven men went the distance on defense, with Ray Nitschke playing his




second straight game at middle linebacker. This tough unit held the 49ers to a total of 81 yards, including only 10 by rushing, and six first downs. The 49ers were forced to punt nine times and the Bay intercepted two passes by Hank Gremminger to set up Hornung's first field goal and Jess Whittenton. Despite the conditions, there wasn't a fumble by either team. The Packers scored three points in the first half, added the game's only TD and another field goal in the fourth quarter. Only two replacements were made by the offense - Tom Moore, who replaced Hornung on a few plays, and Ken Iman, who went in for Ringo for several plays at the end of the game. Taylor stepped on Ringo's hand in the action and three stitches were required to close the wound. The Packers' story was Hornung and Taylor, who gained 247 yards of the Packers' amazing 251 yards rushing. These two guys were great. Hornung had a bad knee to start with and he had it twisted during the game, and Taylor lugged 27 times. And don't forget each was carrying an extra 20 pounds of mud and water. Taylor developed a leg cramp on the last play of the game. Taylor gained 60 yards in the first half and then turned the mud for 101 in the second as Starr deserted the forward pass. The 161 total broke Tony Canadeo's all-time rushing record of 1,052 set in 1949. Jim now has 1,059. The 27 times he carried and his 213 rushes for this season broke Canadeo's records of 26 and 208, both in '49. Hornung's 13 points boosted his record total to 165, which is only 17 less than the 49ers' scoring total of 182. "We adjusted our offense in the second half and put the emphasis on running. The




receivers just couldn't get in good position to continue passing," Lombardi said, adding: "We have a quick line and got in our blocks faster than the 49ers."

A PICTURE PLAY

Hornung's 28-yard touchdown run was a picture play. Guards Fuzzy Thurston and Jerry Kramer were five yards in front of the ball carrier and Gregg and Taylor also added good blocks. So did Boyd Dowler around the 10-yard line. Hornung leaped the last three yards. "His leg was hurting him," Lombardi quipped. That touchdown came on the end of a 84-yard drive that consumed just nine plays. It started on the Packer 16 near the end of the third quarter. Here's how the Bays ran: Hornung





three, Taylor six, Taylor three, Hornung six, Taylor 25 off left end to the 49er 41, Hornung 3, Taylor nine, Hornung one and Hornung 28 to the touchdown.

MCGEE-DAVIS DUEL

Hornung missed his first field goal attempt from the 30 on the opening kickoff. He booted a soggy ball for a 3-0 lead from the 38 with 51 seconds in the half. Gremminger intercepted on the 20 and raced to the Packer 38 with three minutes left. The Bays moved to the 49er 31 on seven plays and Hornung hit from the 38. Other than the TD drive and the Bays' final field goal drive, the game was a punting duel between Davis and McGee. Hornung made his second field goal with two minutes left in the game. The two backs blasted from the Packer 48 to the 49er 16 in 10 plays where a third and one situation brought out a field goal success from the 23.

AMAZING BALL CONTROL

The Packers did it with amazing ball control. Starr called 48 rushes, all but two by Taylor and Hornung, and they averaged 5.2 yards a crack. Including passes, the Packers averaged four yards a play compared to a measly 1.6 for the 49ers. The 49ers tried 25 passes, mostly off the spread, and completed nine. Brodie went until near the end when old Y.A. Tittle came forth with no success. The Packer defense was amazing and old Em Tunnell played one of his finest games - sore shoulder and all.

A PLAYOFF? IT STILL COULD HAPPEN - HERE'S HOW:

DEC 12 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers could simplify matter greatly by dispatching the Los Angeles Rams in Saturday's season finale on the West Coast, in which case they would automatically become the NFL's Western Division champions, but if they should not, five possibilities exist for a divisional playoff. There are, for example, two three-way tie possibilities. One could find the Packers finishing in a knot with the San Francisco 49ers and Detroit Lions. This would develop if the Packers lose and 'Frisco and Detroit win. A three-way tie also would result if Baltimore and Detroit win Sunday, in


the wake of a Packer defeat. In the first instance, the Packers would meet the Lions in a playoff at Detroit, with San Francisco drawing a bye. In the second, the Packers would also invade Detroit, with Baltimore drawing the bye. There also are three chances of a two-team tie, both likewise predicated on a Packer loss Saturday. Two of these would involve the winner of the Baltimore-San Francisco game. Detroit also could qualify in this situation, should Baltimore and San Francisco tie. If either Baltimore or 'Frisco should tie, the playoff game would be staged in Green Bay; if Detroit should tie, it would be played in Detroit.

PACK'S SUPERB CONDITION PAID OFF: VINCE

DEC 12 (San Francisco-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packer dressing room in Kezar Stadium is living room size, with a shower room and latrine attached. It is hardly enough for 38 players - much less five coaches and the streams of press, radio

and TV people. It was really something to remember - these quarters. Look: The players were dripping with water and mud. They were tugging to get off their uniforms. Reporters were asking them questions. They ran out of towels because so many were used during the game. Coach Vince Lombardi was jammed in the "bathroom" behind a dozen writers. He had to yell above the players who actually were quiet because of all the problems involved in getting undressed. Jim Ringo was stretched out on a table in the middle of the room. He was grimacing in pain. Dr. Jim Nellen was putting three stitches in his hand which had been cut under Jim Taylor's cleats in action. Some of the boys couldn't watch the "surgery." Others writhed with Jim. Somebody figured Jim Taylor might have set a new rushing record but the statistics weren't down yet from the press box. Tony Canadeo, who set the old record in 1949, grabbed muscular Jim and hugged him. "I'm glad you got it, Jim, it helped us win. Congratulations," Tony rasped. Tom Miller fought his way in with a pack of statistics. "He (Taylor) got 161 yards and that's a new record," Miller yelled. And everybody ran over to pump Taylor's mud-caked hands.


He was mud from head to foot. Hornung finally found a seat. "It hurt my leg again. Twisted the same one," he said. Paul wasn't a pretty picture. Half his face was mud." Lombardi got loose from the big group of Scribes and tried to get some of the "strangers" out of the room. He finally sat down with the statistics. The biggest mud pie was Fred Thurston, the guard. He couldn't be recognized - for the mud. Forrest Gregg admitted that "we had a little fun near the end." "Jerry Kramer and I were throwing mud at each other," he said. The Packers' superb condition helped win the game. "They had to be in great shape to carry around all the water and mud. I think we were stronger than the 49ers as the game wore on," Vince said. Taylor gave credit for his runs to "those blockers. They were standing up there and knocking 'em all over. We just followed behind them. And they were trapping them all day." The 49ers dressing room wasn't so dismal as you might expect. They had no alibis. Coach Red Hickey, a real fine gent, put it this way: "They beat us on a dry field, too. I take nothing away from them. But a good solid power team like Green Bay would win every game it played on mud like that. I'm not trying to alibi, but I wish we could play them again on a dry field." The 49ers all had praise for Taylor and Hornung and for the Pack's fine blocking. Hog Harrison put it this way, "I planted my feet solidly, wide apart when Taylor came at me one time. He hit me so hard that he knocked me right off my feet and on my back. That never happened to me before. Then he picked me up." Phil Bengtson was particularly excited after the game, having coached the 49ers for so many

27 carries to set a new all-tinte Packer rushing record of 1059 yards, breaking Tony Canadeo's mark of 1058, set in 1944. The Packers' 13-0 victory gave Green Bay undisputed possession of first place in the Western Division with one game to go. They invade Los Angeles for finale Saturday.

years. We remarked to him that it was our fourth straight win over 'Frisco, Phil corrected: "That's five," referring to the exhibition win here in '59. It's an equalizer. What no: The Packers had a meeting scheduled for today. "I don't think we'll work on the field. We're a tired bunch, you know, with that kind of game and maybe it would be better if we just relaxed," Lombardi said. The squad will see movies of the game today and the coaches will dive into preparation for the "game of the year" next Saturday.

PACKERS' HOMECOMING PLANS ROAR INTO GEAR

DEC 12 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packer Homecoming celebration, scheduled for Austin Straubel Field next Sunday evening, stepped into high gear over the weekend. Even the most dedicated Packer Backer couldn't have visualized the team in sole control of first place in the western division three weeks ago and the dizzy heights is doing fantastic things for all Packerland. A special session of the Packer Homecoming Committee met at the Beaumont Hotel this morning to assess the situation and to make adequate preparation for a "welcome home" that the team and the community will not soon forget.



Packers Chant \$6,000 Countdown, Request Special Drill

PACKERS CHANT \$6,000 COUNTDOWN, REQUEST SPECIAL DRILL

DEC 13 (Palo Alto, CA-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers continued a \$6,000 countdown today. It was 5 Monday, 4 today, 3 Wednesday, 2 Thursday, 1 Friday and "fire away" Saturday when they battle the star-graced Rams in the Los

Angeles Coliseum, with the Western Division championship in the balance. The Packers win the prize outright if they whip or tie LA. The win would send the Pack into the title playoff in Philadelphia Dec. 26 - a chore that could bring each Bayer around \$6,000. As Hank Jordan shouted out during the murderous sprints Monday, "Let's go, go, go, this is the big money game." And the Packers, incidentally, didn't have to sprint. Coach Vince Lombardi had planned to give the Bays Monday off but the Packers requested at breakfast that "We practice today." Lombardi was pleased to grant their wishes and they were on the fog-shrouded drill field at Stanford University promptly at 10 o'clock after watching films of the 13-0 victory over San Francisco last Saturday. Monday practice was no picnic. The coach sent them through those lung-cracking sprints and he got after a few of the boys who weren't stretching all the way out. And they liked it. Lombardi asked them to do their best in Monday's light drill "so you're ready for Tuesday." Tackle Dave Hanner remarked that the unscheduled practice was "good for everybody because I guess we've all been 'celebrating' a little bit over the weekend." That was an understatement. The Bays went through a brief offensive passing drill, with Bart Starr and Lamar McHan hitting the target exceptionally well. Joe Francis is back throwing now and gets in his licks even though he's not eligible to play. Green Bay's aerial game may be a major factor against the Rams. The Packers' few victories over LA in the last few years have been accomplished by great passing - by Starr in LA in '59 and by Tobin Rote in 1954-55-56. Green Bay has beaten the Rams only four times in the last 22 games since '49. To make it worse,

the Rams have come up with a big pass defense lift - one Ollie Matson, who was a key figure in the Rams' 10-3 upset victory over the Colts Sunday. Packer assistant coaches Phil Bengtson, Norb Hecker, Red Cochran and Bill Austin were in LA for the Ram-Colt battle. They praised the Rams' stout defense and gave Matson credit. "Matson replaced Sherman (a defensive

veteran) and was all over the field. He finally got Berry out of there," Bengtson said. Matson was playing defense for the first time since he went both ways for the Chicago Cardinals in 1953. Ram Coach Bob Waterfield had this to say, "When Shofner went out (for the season) early in the game, it put more pressure on Ollie. He not only was terrific on pass defense but he belted a few guys, too." Matson was playing defense for the first time this season. Ram QB Bill Wade, who went in when Frank Ryan suffered a shoulder separation, called Matson's play "the finest individual showing I've ever seen." Matson was stationed at right safety, which means that he'll be looking after Max McGee, possibly Gary Knafelc - plus the pass receiving backs. Two Packers stayed out of the hard running Monday and they're both fullbacks - Jim Taylor and Larry Hickman. Taylor suffered several muscle pulls in the 49er game, in which he gained 161 yards, and is limping some. Hickman never played fullback but got a charley horse returning the opening kickoff 17 yards. Hornung, the Packers' major injury case last year who was still limping with a knee bruise on Friday, had no trouble with them Monday. Despite some misery in San Francisco, he ran 19 times for 86 yards, caught four passes for 25 yards, kicked off four times, kicked two field goals and an extra point and scored 13 points. And just to show you Hornung's really versatile, he jogged the two blocks from the dressing room to the field with a bag of footballs over his shoulder. The fog was really bad at the start of practice. Lombardi laughed: "I can't see how many players are out here." It lifted shortly and the sun was out the rest of the

AD IN 'FRISCO PAPER HELPED TO SPARK PACK


DEC 13 (Palo Alto, CA-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Pro football players like to feed on something, as it were. "Anything will help, any remark," John Symank said one time. They got one made to order for the occasion. On the morning of the game, there appeared in the San Francisco Herald-Examiner an advertisement by a local radio station. It read: "Congratulations 49ers for beating the Green Bay Packers." The Bays didn't need much keying but things like that always help. That was the tone of the heavy press last week. It just didn't seem that the Packers had a chance. The Monday papers made interesting

reading. Thought you might like to see some of the headlines: "Bang! 49ers Shot, 13-0." "Hornung and Rain Drench 53,612 Fans" "49ers' Shotgun Offense Goes Poof" "49ers' Name: Mud" "It Came Up Mud and Taylor" "How Special Defense Won Game" There were many others. And they were all appreciated by the players who ate up every word while relaxing Sunday. It would have been interesting to see how the Bays' defense worked against the 49ers' spread attack on a dry field. Various Packer players thought

the final score would have been around 28 to 7, Green Bay, with the 49ers getting a touchdown or field goal. Coach Vince Lombardi gave special credit to the three linebackers, Bill Forester, Dan Currie and Ray Nitschke, with holding the 49ers to only 81 yards, including only 10 in the air. They spread out with the spread and Nitschke roved between one or the other. The 49ers tossed out a teaser on the first play of the game. They spread practically the width of the field, with the center having five-yard open spaces on each side of him. The guard, tackles and ends were each spaced about three yards apart. John Brodie hurled to Hugh McElhenny on the first play, for a four-yard gain, with Hank Gremminger making the stop. The 49ers never spead that way again. They used the "normal" spread 30 times, the straight T 23 times. The Packers still like to talk about the mud and slop of Saturday's game. Forrest Gregg said, "Bart's clean uniform was just like waving a red

flag in front of a bull." Bart Starr never hit the turf once - his protection was so good. "They wanted to get at Bart if for no other reason than to blacken his uniform," Gregg said. The only dirt QB Starr got was when the other players wiped their

hands on his jersey. Gregg said he once blocked out Dave Hanner - "thought it was a 49er." The mud was real sticky. Lombardi lost his shoes three times on the sidelines. "They just stuck there," he said. Paul Hornung lost one shoe. Late in the game, a punt came down and never took a bounce. Maybe the Packers will bring the rain to Los Saturday? Angeles "Perish thought," Starr said. Speaking about LA, the Colts were held to only three points on the fine green of the Coliseum. What would have happened to them on the slop of Kezar Stadium? The two games on the West Coast only produced two touchdowns and four field goals - just 26 points. The Packers scored 41 themselves in Chicago and they'd like to get that many in LA next Saturday.

PLANS SET FOR POSSIBLE DIVISION PLAYOFF HERE

DEC 13 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - Should there be a playoff game in Green Bay for the western division title

in the NFL, it would be played at City Stadium Monday, Dec. 26, with kickoff time at 12:06 p.m. Tentative plans for such a game, including ticket prices and sales, were announced this morning by Packer President Dominic Olejniczak after conferring with Commissioner Pete Rozelle, General Manager Vince Lombardi and the Packer executive committee. The game would be played under the supervision of the league, but the Packers would be in charge of the ticket sale. Prices would be the same as for league games at City Stadium, including the children's section. Priority on tickets would be given season ticket holders for league games in Green Bay and Milwaukee, except for duplication. Season ticket holders can reserve all or part of their number of tickets now by mailing or bringing in a check or money order to the Packer ticket office in Green Bay. There would be a deadline of Tuesday midnight, Dec. 20, after which any remaining tickets would be sold on a first-come, first-served basis. In the event no playoff game is necessary, checks or money orders would be returned. Orders cannot be taken over the telephone and cash will not be accepted. Columbia Broadcasting System has cleared the earlier starting time of 12 noon because of the early darkness this time of the year. FOUR RAM REGULARS LOST FOR PACK TILT

DEC 13 (Los Angeles) - The Los Angeles Rams are badly hobbled for their final game of the NFL season Saturday against the Green Bay Packers. Four regular will be out of the action. Frank Ryan, starting quarterback, is in St. Joseph Hospital, Burbank, suffering from a serious shoulder injury, sustained last Sunday in the 10-3 Ram victory over Baltimore. Both Ram ends, Gene Brito and Del Shofner, are out with leg injuries, and lineman Lou Michaels has a bad ankle that is not responding to treatment. The Rams will go all out in an effort to upset the Packers and present them from winning the clear cut championship of the Western Conference. They upset the Packers 33-31, in Milwaukee, mainly because of Packer errors. If the Packers win Saturday in the Coliseum, they will meet the Philadelphia Eagles for the NFL championship. If the Rams win, a postseason playoff could be necessary. Green Bay, Detroit, and either San Francisco or Baltimore could be 7-5 for the regular season.

PACKERS CONFIDENT THEY HAVE POISE TO CLINCH TITLE

DEC 14 (Palo Alto, CA-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The business of winning a championship during a given game can be ticklish. This is a pressure-packed battle - that tangle between the Rams and our Packers in Los Angeles Saturday night. As Jim Ringo put it "that's 22 weeks of work all wrapped up into 60 minutes." Thirty-two of the 38 players have never been through this sort of wringer. Six of them have fought in a championshipclinching game - Fuzzy Thurston, Lew Carpenter, Em Tunnell, Hank Jordan, Bill Quinlan and Willie Davis. Green Bay can take the Western Division title outright by winning or tying Saturday. Thurston, for one, doesn't think it make any difference "to our gang" that they're playing for all the Western marbles. "We've got the ability and we all way to win it. They can't stop us now," Fuzzy said in defense of those who never picked up a championship game check. He added: "All you need is poise and we've all got that. It's like old times for Em, Hank and the others who made a playoff. We didn't have much poise last year. Well, we lost five games in a row. We showed we had poise in Chicago and out here. It won't be easy Saturday, but we'll win." Thurston played with the title Colts of 1958 and then came to Green Bay in a trade for linebacker Marv Matuszak. The other five were all involved in the Eastern Division playoff that year between the Browns and Giants. Tunnell, not to mention Coach Vince Lombardi, was with New York and Jordan, Quinlan and Carpenter were with the Browns. Quinlan actually missed the playoff because he had broken his leg. "I got my money, anyway," Bill said. The Giants won the playoff and then battled the Colts in that historic overtime game. Carpenter has been through title shots with two different teams - Detroit in '54 and Cleveland in '57. "If experience helps, I've got it and I'm sure the others (without playoff experience) will have no trouble Saturday," Lew said. "If anybody's excited before the game, they'll get over it right after the kickoff," Quinlan added. Jordan reminded the squad during a noisy drill Tuesday that "this is a money game, let's go." He rings it out all over the field in his Virginny drawl every day. Packer practices have always been high-schoolish in spirit. These this week are more so. If anybody drops an easy pass, the rest of the squad will let him know about it on the spot. The same goes for a good play...PASSING CALLED KEY: The Packer defense is making the offense work for every completion. The emphasis is on passing since the Packers' major hope is based on scoring a hatful of points. It is expected that the Bay defense will react to its greatest performance Saturday. The more-complicated offensive machinery is being oiled and fed. Passing is the key and this is based on the assumption that the Two Horsemen, Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung, will be averaging close to four yards per attempt or more. Green Bay's aerial game had to be set aside in last Saturday's mud bath against the 49ers in San Francisco. Only 17 passes were tried, in the first half. Bart Starr is expected to increase pass production considerably against LA. The Packers, incidentally, received a late compliment on their performance vs. the 49ers. It came from 49er coach Red Hickey who spoke thusly after watching films of the game: "Mud or no mud, we were outknocked both ways and there was no excuse for it. Unless we changes we won't have a chance against the Colts." Earlier, Hickey had been inclined to blame the field conditions, for the most part, for the shotgun offense breakdown. Packer injuries are now one - fullback Larry Hickman, who jogged by himself around the field while everybody else strained hard. Hickman has a charley horse and bruise. Taylor is back running hard, including the sprints, and Ringo isn't bothered by his bandaged hand. Taylor stepped on Ringo's hand late in the 49er game and three stitches were required to close the gap. In fact, Taylor ran so hard on one play in practice, everybody cheered him. They're getting ready! The Packers left after practice today by United Airlines charter for the Los Angeles area. They'll headquarter and train at Santa Monica.

TAYLOR CAN OVERTAKE BOWN, CAPTURE NFL'S RUSHING TITLE

DEC 14 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) -Bruising Jim Taylor, the Packers' record-breaking fullback, who has moved into the exclusive class of players who have gained more than 1,000 yards in a season, with luck may overtake Jimmy Brown of the Cleveland Browns for the NFL rushing championship. Brown has gained 1,147 yards, compared with 1,059 for Taylor. But in the season finale Sunday, Brown runs into his jinx team, New York, while Taylor faces the Los Angeles Rams Saturday with the added incentive of the Western Division championship at stake. The Giants held Brown to only 29 yards in his latest game against New York. Taylor slogged into the "1,000 Club" at San Francisco's muddy Kezar Stadium last Saturday, churning for 161 yards in 27 attempts. The bayou bronco set three records in the process. By running his grand total to 1,059 yards, he eclipsed by 7 the old Packer standard of 1,052 set by Tony Canadeo in 1949. He also broke Canadeo's records for most attempts in a season, 208, and most attempts in a single game, 26, likewise set in '49. Taylor now has carried 213 times, including that record-breaking 27 thrusts last Saturday. In scoring, Paul Hornung added 13 last Saturday and swelled his record total to 165. He has scored 14 touchdowns, kicked and conversions and 15 field goals. Neither Taylor nor Hornung is a slouch in the other's most successful endeavor. Taylor is ranked eighth in NFL scoring

with 66 points, while Hornung is the sixth rated ground gainer with 649 yards. John David Crow of the St. Louis Cardinals was third in the ground-gaining standings with 868 yards, followed by Nick Pietrosante of the Detroit Lions with 768 and J.D. Smith of the San Francisco Forty-Niners with 689. Bart Starr and Willie Wood are two other Packers who rank among the league elite. Starr, though grievously handicapped by a muddy ball at San Francisco Sunday, ranks eighth among the passers with 90 completions in 163 attempts for 1,157 yards and two touchdowns. His average gain per pass has been 7.10. Wood's punt returns gained 100 yards, to place him sixth in that category. Cleveland's Milt Plum still leads the league's passers with a 62.9 percentage, is first in average gain with 9.53, and in percentage of interceptions with .05. having had only one pilfered all year.

RAMS TO USE DEFENSE THAT UPSET COLTS

DEC 14 (Los Angeles) - The Green Bay Packers have one of the soundest ground games in the NFL, but the Los Angeles Rams hope to upset them here Saturday and scramble the Western Conference race. If the Packers win, they are divisional champions and face the Philadelphia Eagles in the NFL playoff. If they lose, there will have to be a playoff, with the Baltimore Colts, San Francisco 49ers, Detroit Lions and Green Bay in the picture. Green Bay was better in the mud than

San Francisco last Saturday, but the Baltimore, upset playing superlative defensive football. "We're getting our defense set for the Packers," said Line Coach Don Paul. "Jim David and I figure on using somewhat the same defense we employed against Baltimore - lots of hard tackling and a hard charge." David, defensive backfield coach, said Ollie Matson, veteran ball carrier, will be called upon again for defensive duty. Matson's play against Baltimore was instrumental in crimping Johnny Unitas' passing. Head Coach Bob Waterfield is convinced that the Rams are going to be winner in another year or so, but he is pessimistic about the Green Bay game. 

He played the entire Dallas game. Pesonen plats as a general utility man in the defensive secondary. Moore is king of the rookies, as it were, in that he has played and starred. This fine No. 1 draft choice plays behind Paul Hornung or Jim Taylor. In the first Ram game, he took up for injured Taylor and ripped off 105 yards, including a 60 yard touchdown romp. "Oh yes, I'm ready at all times to go in there," Tim said. Otherwise he added, "I just keep up the chatter on the bench. I guess I'm like a fan, getting up and down and yelling to help our cause." Moore is also back on kickoff returns. Wood, who fills in anywhere in the defensive backfield, goes back with Lew Carpenter on punt returns. "I just have to make sure nothing goes wrong on returning punts. Was scared to death with that slippery ball at Sam Francisco. We keep busy on the bench, helping anywhere we can." Iman



The Packers could be the opposite of this, which would be tight. Hate to even mention it but this disease has stricken clubs in similar positions. Ram Coach Bob Waterfield made some interesting observations today, comparing the Pack with the Colts: "Against the Colts our chief concern was to stop the passing of John Unitas. If we are to beat Green Bay, we must stop their running game - the soundest in the league as far as I'm concerned. Don't get me wrong. The Packers have a real potent aerial attack and we always have to respect it or most assuredly we'll get burned trying to load up against the bread and butter phase of their offense - their powerful running game." Waterfield noted that the Packers were not at full strength in their earlier meeting, adding: "But all of the Packers are disgustingly healthy now." Actually, reserve fullback Larry Hickman is the only injured player. He still has a bruised knee and charley horse. Em Tunnell is really aching - that right shoulder. He could hardly move in practice yesterday and threw the ball left handed - or kicked it. "This damp weather kills the old man," he laughed. Em vows he'll be ready for the Rams. You can bet on that. The Packers are staying at the Miramar Hotel in Santa Monica...BRIEFS: Paul Hornung hit the left upright in a practice 40-yard field goal Wednesday and it bounced over the crossbar. Somebody yelled, "Keep that luck." Hornung, incidentally, received the game ball after the Packers' 13-0 victory at 'Frisco...Coach Aide Red Cochran went through the before leaving Rickey's motel and reminded the boys to turn in their keys. TUNNELL TO PLAY 145TH STRAIGHT GAME SATURDAY

"Is that so?" Tunnell said. "I knew I had some sort of a streak going, but I don't bother to keep track of the number of games. I doubt if even my family knows the exact number." But Green Bay publicity director Tom Miller said Tunnell had played 153 games since he started the streak in his rookie year in 1948 with the New York Giants. He was traded to Green Bay two years ago...TOP PASS STEALER: The former University of Iowa star, however, says he has played games when he was sore and bruised but not because he wanted to preserve the consecutive game streak. "I played because I felt I could help the team and the coaches believed I could also," he said. "I wouldn't want to be in there just to keep a streak going if I would hurt the team." NFL in pass interceptions with a career mark of 79. And he has returned those interceptions almost a complete mile, 1,282 yards to be exact. Another mark held by Tunnell is that of returning the most punts in one season, 38 in 1953 when he gained 924 yards although he did not play a minute on offense, getting his yardage on interceptions and kick returns. Tunnell started out as as an offensive halfback with the Giants. but the New York club soon found he was not a passer and the single wing system it employed then required him to pass. "But they got a pretty good man to take over the passing job," Tunnell chuckled, "the great Charlie Conerly. So I shifted to the defensive squad and I've been on it ever since." "People ask me if there's as much satisfaction playing on defense as on offense. And my answer is that there's an inner satisfaction over doing a job well as a team effort. Every one of the guys back there on defense gets the same feeling of satisfaction when any of us makes a good stop." Tunnell doesn't like to admit his age and when asked he replied, "I'm 35, going on 41." As to his future, he says he would like to keep playing pro football "another 30 years if they would let me. I know that isn't possible, but I'll keep on as long as the team feels I'm of value."

Lou Michaels, tackle, guard and-or linebacker, can barely walk because of a leg injury. Linebacker Jack Pardee has a badly bruised and pulled foot muscle and cannot walk, and Waterfield said he sees no chance of him playing. Fullback Joe Marconi has a deep thigh bruise and is confined to bed. John Baker, who was scheduled to start for Brito, has a shoulder point and a pinched nerve and hasn't been able to practice. Defensive tackle John Kennerson has a hip injury. These injuries have necessitated these changes, Waterfield says. Tom Wilson will start at

fullback for Marconi. Charley Janerette will start at defensive left end. Bob Long, acquired from Detroit, will take over at Pardee's linebacking spot. If Wilson cannot play (he has some stitches in his left arm, hurt in the game against the San Francisco 49ers), Ollie Matson may have to be taken from the defensive backfield and returned to fullback. "If I sound gloomy, I am," said Waterfield...General Manager Elroy Hirsch of the Rams announced the addition of two semi-pro players to the Los Angeles roster to replace Shofner and Ryan. The two are fullback Charles Longo and guard Angelo Brovelli. Longo attended the San Jose State College and has been playing with the Montebello Rhinos. Brovelli went to Glendale

FIRED PACKERS DUEL RAMS, SCENT TITLE

DEC 16 (Los Angeles-Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers are all fired up for Saturday's "championship" game against the Rams in the Coliseum. But so are the Rams. Los Angeles isn't going anywhere. Green Bay can win the Western Division title by winning or tying. Packer Coach Vince Lombardi learned, via a good source Thursday night, that the Rams are "all fired up." This is a rather unexpected development although it always was figures that the Rams would do their best to sidetrack the Packer pennant party. The Rams have their reasons. Chiefly, they want to repay the fans who have been extremely loyal. This will be the Rams' third straight home game and their third 70,000-plus crowd. They drew 77,359 in a loss to the 49ers and filled 75,461 in beating the Colts last Sunday. That's fabulous attendance for a team out of the running and the Rams are grateful. Kickoff is set for 3:35, Packerland time. Millions will view the battle on national television and the Packers, in the doldrums for so many years, will be a sentimental favorite to win here and then go on to a triumph in the championship game in Philadelphia Dec. 26. The game also will be broadcast over radio station WJPG. Playing in that classic could mean anywhere from \$4,500 to \$6,000 to each player, lose or win. What's more, the Packers would be getting a shot at the College All Star game in Chicago next summer. That's worth a game salary to each player. A good way to start the '61 season. The Packers will play it "straight" in their crucial bid. Lombardi has indicated no drastic changes in the boom-boom Paul Hornung-Jim Taylor cannon fire, except to fit the Rams' particular style of defense. Bart Starr picked the Rams to death out here last year and in the 33-31 loss in Milwaukee this season rallied the club from a 30-10 deficit to a 31-30 lead. The Rams won in the last 22 seconds on Danny Villanueva's field goal. The heady signalist expects to keep rocking the Rams with Hornung and Taylor and then throw strikes to Max McGee, Boyd Dowler or Gary Knafelc. The Packers' offensive line, pivoted by Jim Ringo, has been exceptional in the last two games, giving Bart an easy chair. This protection is the offense's key. The Rams gave the Bay offensive line a tough time in Milwaukee - at least for three quarters. Starr has a "surprise" up his sleeve the passing of Hornung. Paul has not thrown at all in the last three games and it's possible the Rams might have forgotten. Tsk tsk. Hornung drove the Rams crazy out here last year, completing two our of two to Dowler for 56 yards and two touchdowns. The Rams defense has a new spark, one Ollie Matson, who drilled the Colts' air and ground game. And then there's big John Lovetere, who split the Bay offensive line many times in Milwaukee. The Packer defense will have to wreck an old Packer tormentor - Bill Wade, and all his stars, including Jon Arnett, Red Phillips Wilson...REASON FOR REVENGE: Green Bay's defensers have a perfect reason for gaining revenge. This unit was

The ringleaders on defense are tackles Dave Hanner and Hank Jordan. This group has permitted only 14 points in the last two games. Two members are aching -Tunnell, who has been bothered by a chronic bad shoulder, and Tom Bettis, whose twisted knee started kicking up worse than ever Thursday. He injured it in Monday...HICKMAN ONLY CASUALTY: There is one injury on offense - fullback Larry Hickman, who has a knee bruise. He was scheduled for platoon duty. The top replacement for Taylor or Hornung will be Tom Moore, who gained 105 yards, including a 60yard TD run, in the last Ram game. He filled in for injured Taylor that day. The Rams have yelled "injury" all week but the only sure thing is the official action of Coach Bob Waterfield, who put Frank Ryan and Del Shofner on the injured list for this last game. Will History Repeat? The '29 Champs Come Home




THE '29 CHAMPS COME HOME

DEC 17 (Green Bay Press-Gazette) - The Packers are coming home to another civic welcome tomorrow night, and by the time most subscribers get around to unfolding today's Press-Gazette they will know whether it is a greeting to the city's first Western Division champions since 1944, or a club still facing a battle for the Little Casino. Jack Yuenger, chief drum beater for the airport welcome, is talking of the "greatest" homecoming in the team's history and hoping for a crowd of "10,000 or more." I have news for Yuenger who, apparently, could use some of the "historical fact and fancy" he loves to needle me about. If he doesn't produce more than twice 10,000, he's fired a blank. Although Green Bay was only about half its present size and the Packers hadn't attained the institutional status they now enjoy, a yelling mob of over 20,000 turned out in freezing weather 31 years ago when Green Bay's first pro champions came home the night of Dec. 9, 1929. The city has staged a number of spectacular celebrations in its long history. None compared with the greeting to the first of its six world championship football teams. And the best thing about that 1929 welcome was its explosive spontaneity. Green Bay had been a member of the NFL since 1921, and had more than held its own in competition, but it hadn't been accorded big league status by the rest of the circuit. As the organization grew from sandlot to major league proportions, the smaller cities had been shoved aside by metropolitan centers until Green Bay was the only little guy left...ATTITUDE RANKLED: Gradually the Packers had been relegated to the status of country cousins, and the patronizing of the larger members rankled. The undefeated champions of 1929 changed all that - small wonder the citizenry was popping its shirt buttons all over the place. Nobody - unless it was Curly Lambeau - had seriously entertained championship visions when the season began, but eyes began to open as the Packers bowled over one opponent after another. The town was in a fine frenzy when the club went east late in November, undefeated and headed for a showdown with the unbeaten Giants in New York. As every fan old enough to recognize a picture of Vince Lombardi knows, the club met the challenge, but the championship wasn't in the bag yet. Green Bay still had three games to play, and the Giants five, and a single defeat coupled with a Giant sweep could still cost the Packers the title. New York did win them all, while the Packers almost came a cropper against the Frankford Yellowjackets and were lucky to escape with a scoreless tie. The championship wasn't nailed down until the final conquest of the Bears in Chicago on Dec. 8. By that time, the city was ready for a rousing whing. The team was due home via North Western train at 8:30 p.m., Monday, Dec. 9. Long before then the crowd began to converge th4e station, and by 8 o'clock

every street leading to it was solidly plugged by an estimated turnout of 20,000 cold but cheerful citizens and 6,000 automobiles...IMMOVABLE MASS: People was packed in an almost immovable mass around the station, overflowing into

the yards and perching on tops of roofs, box cars, in every available window - some even climbed telephone poles. The size of the crowd took the police by complete surprise and if it hadn't been for its goodnatured cooperation things would have been an utter mess. As it was, traffic was at a standstill for blocks in every direction. The train rolled into town through lanes of blazing red flares and an ever increasing bedlam of sound. People welled at the top of their lungs, sirens wailed, locomotive and industrial plant whistles screamed, and every one of those 6,000 auto horns was going full blast, too. Between Mason Street and the station, the crowd was so dense the train had to crawl along behind brakesmen and volunteers walking ahead to clear the right of way. The press was thickest at the station, and police had a lot of trouble moving the players from the train to waiting buses. The platform lighting being no better than it is now, it is doubtful if more than a handful actually saw the players get off, but that made no difference. Every movement brought another round of cheers. Finally, the transfer was completed and the American Legion band and Battery B leading the way the cavalcade swung slowly over to Broadway, south to Walnut and across the bridge. The parade turned down Washington to Main, over to Adams, back to Walnut and thence to city hall. The entire route was lined with cheering people. At city hall, which was also surrounded by a whooping mob, the players were escorted to the council chambers where Mayor John V. Diener greeted them with the unprecedented gesture of the "freedom of the city" -




whatever that meant - for 24 hours. There were congratulatory speeches back and forth, although the player spokesmen were so choked up, the oratory wasn't very sparkling, and the ceremonies closed with a rising vote of thanks from the city council to the team for bringing the championship to Green Bay...ONLY THE BEGINNING: That was only the beginning of a round of celebrating that lasted for three days. The following evening the team was given an elaborate banquet at the Beaumont Hotel, attended by over 400, at which each player received a watch and \$220 from a hastily subscribed purse of over \$5,000. There were, inevitably, more speeches and this time the players gave as good as they received, especially the irrepressible Johnny Blood, the Vagabond Halfback's talk nearly stole the show, something of a habit with Johnny under most circumstances. The banquet was also noteworthy as the first current events program by radio station WHBY with Harold T.I. Shannon at the microphone. Harold still has the papier-mache football that topped the elaborate cake baked as a centerpiece by the old Bohemian Bakery - one of the very few if not the only souvenir of the event still in existence. There wasn't much serious business transacted in town the rest of the week. People went through the motions but their hearts weren't in it. Everybody had more fun adjourning to the nearest oasis, there to assure each other they had known all the time the boys would come through. The celebration even stopped the rugged Packers, whose ability to win football games exceeded only by their enthusiasm for the roles of conquering heroes. Traveling jauntily down to Memphis, Tenn., the following Sunday for an exhibition game against a pick-up team, the new champions were dumped unceremoniously on

The Eagles, who clinched the Eastern Division title two weeks ago, will be rooting for the Packers to win so they can get down to the business of the title playoff as soon as possible. Coach Buck Shaw of the Eagles felt that a long delay awaiting the settlement of the Western Division race would cause his players to lose their fine edge...The Lions, if tied with either San Francisco or Baltimore, get the Miami bid because they hold a 34-14 point edge in a seasonal split with the 49rs and a 2-0 games won edge over the Colts. A two-way first-place tie in the West forces the title game back to Jan. 1, a three-way finish makes it Jan. 8. Sunday's favorites are the Colts (by 5 points), the Lions (by 4), the Browns (by 1), the Cardinals (by 1), and the Eagles (by 7). Paul Hornung of Green Bay (165 points) is a cinch for the league scoring title. And also virtually certain of individual crowns are Jimmy Brown of Cleveland (1,147 yards) in ground gaining, teammate Milt Plum, the passing leader, and Raymond Berry of the Colts in pass receiving (72). Jerry Norton of the Cardinals and Abe Woodson of the 49ers can take two individual titles. Norton leads in pass interceptions (10) and punting (45.6) yard average.

One, chosen by Max Stiles, included Hornung, Taylor, Jerry Kramer, Forrest Gregg and Jim Ringo on the offensive team and Hank Jordan on defense. The Hearst service picked an all pro team last week and left Hornung out of the backfield. Can you imagine that?...Let's give a thought today to Jack Vainisi, Packer business manager who died shortly before noon Sunday, Nov. 27. Death has robbed him of realizing a championship moment for which he aimed all of this work...Howie Blindauer, the Packers' travelingest fan who popped up in New Orleans for the Bays' first non-leaguer, arrived at the Bays' hotel in Santa Monica last night. All good Packer alumni on the West Coast are gathering in the Coliseum today...We had intended to write this note earlier on an incident aboard the United Airlines charter coming down from San Francisco Wednesday. The crash out east reminded us. About two-thirds of the way, the crew spotted an Air Force plane flying the same altitude as the Packer charter. It was off to the left - a distance that seemed like a couple of blocks. The AF plane was going north, the Packers south. We happened to be up front at the time, and remarked in no uncertain terms: "What in blazes is he doing in our altitude? Did you know he was coming?" The co-pilot admitted that the charter crew didn't know it was there until actually seen and, by way of explanation, added: "That's one of life's little imperfections."...The Packers have this distinction. When they say everybody back home is pulling for them, they mean

it. A scribe out here got this quote from Dave Hanner: "The Packers have waited too long for this chance to blow it. Besides, everybody in Green Bay is counting on us - and when I say everybody I mean all 65,000 of them, every man, woman and child."...Win or lose today, the Packers will train in Green Bay next week. And Lombardi would like for the weather to stay moderate. Most of the Bays already have taken their families home and, of course, won't be home for Christmas. "It'll be worth it if we win," said Bill Forester Friday night...The Packers are scheduled to leave here via United Airlines charter, with Capt. Don Smith of Green Bay at the controls, at noon Sunday, Green Bay time, and arrive at Austin Straubel Field at 6:40 p.m...Paul Hornung is a good bet to receive honors as the league's most valuable player. It could be a tossup between Paul and the Eagles' Norm Van Brocklin. Let's hope that argument can be settled right out at Philadelphia Dec. 26. Two of the many rookies of the year prospects could be battling in Philly - the Pack's Tom Moore and Ted Dean of the Eagles. Dean got famous when he filled in for injured Clarence Peaks, pacing the Eastern champs to three straight wins...Sunshine and warmth is scheduled for today's game. The natives add: "As usual." Rain is so rare out there that the transplants from our east actually like to see a good old thunderstormer. It's been cooler ocean-front at Santa Monica where the Packers are training.

The field was a quagmire, but hard-charging Green Bay ran over San Francisco to take first place in the West



THE Green Bay Packers, a rather small pro football team with admirable balance and boundless determination, very likely will play the Philadelphia Eagles for the National Football League championship December 26.

Green Bay has only to defeat the Rams in Los Angeles Saturday to assure this. The Rams, an unpredictable and often emotionally unstable football team, on Sunday won an almost unbelievable 10-3 victory over the Baltimore Colts, the tired and jittery defending champions, but suffered grievous injuries which should make them easier game for the Packers.

In San Francisco, the day before, Green Bay waded ankle deep through mud and 49ers to whip the third of the three teams that went into this weekend tied for the Western Conference lead. Now, with only a game to go, the Packers are a game ahead. "We are positive thinkers," says Packer Coach Vince Lombardi. "We can't see defeat ahead."

Nor can anyone else who watched Green Bay plaster San Francisco 13-0. The 49ers, depending for offensive thrust on a wide-spread triple wing designed to take advantage of fast backs, excellent pass catchers and accurate passing, never recovered from

the dismay they felt when they came out to test the footing in Kezar Stadium. They found they could barely stand in the goo. But they found later that standing was preferable to being dumped in the mud—as they were, often and violently—by one or another of the Packers.

The 49ers' passing was completely nullified by the weather, and the 49er running backs, who are gifted more with mobility than power, were hobbled. On the other hand, the precise, power-operated Packer offense moved surely, if slowly, when it had to score. Bart Starr, the Green Bay quarterback, eschewed any artfulness in favor of pure, straight-ahead force.

"The field was so sloppy we decided to forget most of our passes and sweeps and trust to draw plays and traps," Lombardi said. "Paul Hornung busted their left side and Jim Taylor their right. We trapped their tackles, Leo Nomellini and Monte Clark. We have a quick line and we moved a little faster on that rainsoaked bog than the 49ers and we got our blocks in quicker than they could react. On Hornung's touchdown run, we cleared out the whole left side of their defense."

Taylor, the stocky, immensely strong Packer fullback, paddled for 161 yards during the afternoon. Paul Hornung, who has already set a league scoring record this season, slithered 28 yards for his touchdown—the only one of the game—and added two field goals. Said he: "That offensive line of ours—what a pleasure to work behind it, even in the mud. Those guys give you a little room."

"They were standing up the defensive line," Taylor said. "In this kind of goo, if you stand 'em up they slip and slide when you're running past 'em."

The Packer defense, which has developed this season into one of the best in the league, so thoroughly plugged the San Francisco shotgun offense that the 49ers crossed midfield

only once-and that time to the Packer 49-yard line. Indeed, this Packer team is notable for its almost flawless combination of talents on both offense and defense. The defensive line is quick; the linebackers are among the best in the league, and, with the development of Ray Nitschke, Lombardi now has four of them, which means he can rest one all the time.

The only soft spot discernible recently in the Packer defensive unit is against long passes. The Chicago Bears completed two, but the game was already won by the Packers when the Bears managed this. If this is truly a weakness, it spells trouble for the Packers should they represent the West against the Eagles in the championship game-and against Norman Van Brocklin, the most accurate long passer in football.

But before Green Bay begins devising means for stopping the Eagles. they must face the Rams, and the Rams-on the basis of the resourceful, spirited game they played in beating Baltimore-are not exactly dead yet. Bob Waterfield, the stoical Ram head coach who was quarterback on four Ram championship teams, came up with one big surprise for Baltimore. He put Ollie Matson, his fine fullback, on defense. Matson performed there with verve and enthusiasm, if not with consummate skill.

"The only way to beat the great Colt pass catchers is with speed and defense," Waterfield said. "Matson has the speed."

Matson, tackling with abandon and effect and consistently outrunning the Colt receivers on deep passes, once jarred the ball loose from Lenny Moore with a rousing tackle. When the Colts drove down to the Ram five early in the game, it was Matson who smashed through the Colt line on successive plays to tackle Moore and Fullback Billy Pricer for short losses. A third-down pass fell incomplete in the end zone and the Colts settled for their only score of the game, a field goal, thus ending at 47 the string of games in which John Unitas has thrown touchdown passes.

Waterfield took a calculated risk in designing his defense. He noticed in the pregame warmup that the Colts' league-leading pass catcher, Raymond Berry, was not moving well. He decided to cover Berry with one man while assigning two to the very dangerous Moore. The crippled Berry -he has a pulled hamstring muscle -caught only one pass all day and that for just 11 yards.

The Ram touchdown must be regarded as something of a fluke. Frank Ryan, who has been shouldering most of the Los Angeles quarterback chores, was injured early in the game. He was replaced by Billy Wade, a big, pigeon-toed, rather awkward passer. Wade has been known to trip himself while retreating to pass. For obvious reasons, he almost never runs.

On this day, however, he ran 66 yards to score the touchdown which brought victory. He rolled out to his left on an option play, with Fullback Joe Marconi and End Red Phillips protecting him.

"On that play, if the linebacker drops back, the quarterback runs," Waterfield said. "If he comes up, the quarterback throws. It's not a new play but it sure worked like hell."

The Colt linebacker, well aware

that Wade very seldom runs, dropped back. Marconi, leading the way for the Ram quarterback, motioned frantically for Wade to run and the big, gangling passer lumbered downfield. Marconi erased one would-be tackler and Wade galloped down the sideline behind Phillips. As they neared the Colt goal line, Milt Davis came over to make the tackle. Phillips, herding his ungainly charge along with all the protective concern of a sheep dog, managed to stay between Wade and Davis almost to the goal line, when Davis made the tackle-too late.

"The Packers present a little different problem," Waterfield said thoughtfully, after the game. "We got four key players hurt today-Gene Brito, Lou Michaels, Del Shofner and Ryan. And they are a very tough club."

They are indeed. In the Packer dressing room, after their victory over the 49ers, Nitschke, the linebacker, patted Taylor, the fullback, on the shoulder. "You," he said, "are as tough as a rat."

So is he.
